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## **Legislator Appointed to National Committee**

Liberty, NY - Sullivan County District 6 Legislator Luis Alvarez has been appointed to the influential Health Steering Committee of the National Association of Counties (NACo).


NACo President James Gore this month notified Alvarez of his appointment, following prior service on the national advocacy organization's Immigration Reform Task Force, Programs and Services Standing Committee, Rural Action Caucus, and Veterans and Military Services Committee.

"The expertise and engagement of our steering committee members like you is a major reason why Congress and federal agencies often look to NACo for feedback on legislative policy decisions being made in Washington, D.C.," Gore wrote in Alvarez's appointment letter.

Alvarez has served on a variety of NACo committees since he began participating with the organization in 2017, when he was Chair of the Sullivan County Legislature. A longtime (now retired) Sheriff's deputy, Alvarez also sits on the board of the NYS Association of Counties (NYSAC).

"I strongly believe in NACo's mission and am proud to represent Sullivan County at the national level," Alvarez related. "I remain committed to my neighbors as their legislator, but it's important to recognize that we're part of a larger system of government that constantly needs review and improvement."

Founded in 1935, NACo serves nearly 40,000 county elected officials and 3.6 million county employees, advocating county priorities in federal policymaking, promoting exemplary county policies and practices, nurturing leadership skills, expanding knowledge networks, optimizing county and taxpayer resources and cost savings, and enriching the public's understanding of county government.

## Ulster County Successfully Secures \$1.6M for Pine Hill to Restore Historic Hotel



KINGSTON, NY - Ulster County Executive Jen Metzger today announced that the County has received a \$1.6 million Restore New York grant for the restoration and adaptive reuse of the historic Wellington Hotel in the hamlet of Pine Hill, in the Town of Shandaken's statecertified historic district at 310 Main Street. The project, which is being developed by RUPCO, will create 10 affordable residential units, a café, and a food market for the area.

Returning the former 12,000 square foot Ulster Park/Wellington Hotel to productive use is a major priority of the community, and plans for its adaptive reuse fills vital needs for housing in an underserved area and for food-related services for residents and visitors within an area characterized as a "food desert." ## **LOOKING BACK**

On looking back to the years of the 1930's, no matter where folks lived during the big depression, family togetherness and hard work got them through those hard times. My husband, Dan, cut four foot wood for acid factories in order to make a living. Moving our family from Neversink to Corbett, from Corbett to North Harpersfield, from North Harpersfield to Lawyersviile, from Lawyersviile up to Hammondsport on the Finger Lakes and to Horseheads near Corning. He worked real hard to keep. food on our table and I used ingenuity to make meals from the most basic ingredients including leeks, brakes, and milkweed that we found in the woods and fields. No depression dishes were fancy but those simple dishes helped keep us going. They were not like our fancy foods of today but tasted mighty good when we were hungry and nothing was wasted. During the depression, I learned to make bean burgers as they were a good substitute for meat. I still make them occasionally.

It took a lot of courage, togetherness and love for a family to pull through those lean years. I don't look back on those years with a sense of sadness, only with a sense of pride. Sure, times were tough and there were rumors of suicides and folks freezing from the cold and being kicked out of their homes because there was no money to pay bills. But we all tried to pitch in and figure out ways to make things as bearable as we possibly could.

From the depression I learned that family is more important than money, that we could live by our wits and patience, and at times, sheer guts. That's why I feel not sadness but pride as I look back to the depression of the 1930's. I was there along with our family and a great many more lucky survivors.

Let us all hope and pray we will never see another depression. 35% of our people were out of work. Banks closed, insurance companies failed and some businesses locked their doors.

I still have a good many memories of things we "made do" during the depression.



## Why "Dog Days"?

We've been feeling the heat lately. We have seen heat advisories several times this past summer. These days are often referred to as the "dog days of summer." But why "dog days?"

According to the Old Farmer's Almanac, the Ancient Greeks and Romans believed the "dog days" to be a time of misfortune plagued by a time of drought, bad luck, and unrest as ani-



mals and people alike were driven mad by the unbearably hot temperatures.

Dog Days bright and clear Indicate a happy year; But when accompanied by rain, For better times, our hopes are vain.

While it may be really hot outside, the phrase no longer holds such a negative connotation and instead solely refers to the peak temperatures we see, especially in late summer.

For the ancient Egyptians, the star Sirius's dawn rising (known to them as Sothis) also coincided with the Nile River's flood season. They used the star as a "watchdog" for that event.

The exact dates of the Dog Days can vary from source to source, and because they are traditionally tied to the dawn rising of Sirius, they have changed over time. However, most sources agree that the Dog Days occur in mid-to-late summer.

Derived from the ancient belief that the star Sirius, known as the dog star, which is part of the constellation, Canis Major, the Greater Dog, is the brightest star in the night sky. Literally Sirius means "scorching". Ancient civilizations noticed that the star began to rise with the sun after the summer solstice, thus, they thought the sweltering days were caused by the Earth's proximity to the star.

Even though we now understand the science behind summer heat, the term "dog days" has stuck around to describe those oppressively hot days. So next time someone mentions the dog days of summer, you'll know it's not just about dogs lounging around—it's about ancient stars and summer heat.

A tidbit of trivia – the Earth continues to slightly wobble as it rotates, thus shifting the planet. One day, Sirius will instead rise with the sun during the last months of the year. Thankfully, that's very far in the future, so we won't have to start saying "dog days of winter" anytime soon!

Sirius is the brightest star in the sky if you don't count our own Sun. Under the right conditions, it can even be seen with the naked eye during the day. It's not hard to find. Learn how to find the Dog Star in the night sky here.



Whenever CWA Grand Master and Guggenheim Fellowship recipient James Lee Burke brings forth a new work of fiction, the world of mystery, thriller and crime readers and writers sits up and takes notice. We know it will be

lyrically written and thought provoking . . . as well as exciting, violent and philosophical . . . all at the same time. Mr. Burke's ability to compare beauty and squalor, kindness and violence, as well as the struggle to do good by committing evil in the world – all in exquisite beautiful prose – is nothing less than magical



In his newest release (and 40th novel) entitled:

A Private Cathedral, (Simon and Schuster, \$28.00, 416 pages, ISBN 978-1-9821-5168-3) James Lee Burke has created a genre-jumping, mind-bending and captivating yarn that many will consider to be the best of his 23 novels set in Louisiana and featuring an imperfect, tortured detective named Dave Robicheaux. The MBR is one of them.

As the novel begins, it's late in the 1990s. Dave Robicheaux is battling his addiction to alcohol, trying to get his job and his badge back and mourning the deaths of two wives; the first by violence and the second from disease. And, as if that's not enough to deal with, he has profound guilt and flashbacks from his time in the Vietnam War. The last thing he needs is to get sucked into one of the most bloody and deadliest criminal feuds in Louisiana history. But of course, that's just what happens when Dave comes to the aid of a pair of star-crossed young lovers named Johnny Shondell and Isolde Balangie.

Johnny is a teen idol and a talented musician who's making his way up the pop charts. He and Isolde have discovered that they're soul mates, devoted to and enraptured by each other. Trouble is however, the Shondell and Balangie clans have been at war for centuries. Several generations ago, they devised a plan to keep from destroying each other. The pact is simple. Periodically, the weaker clan will send an immediate family member to be held as hostage by the other, which is why Johnny is being forced to deliver Isolde to his uncle for use as a sex slave. Dave Robicheaux, a modern knight-errant in tarnished armor, and his partner Clete Purcell are honor bound to intervene on behalf of the defenseless young couple. But when Robicheaux gets too close to Isolde's mother, who's the consort of a mobster from New Orleans, the Mafia Don puts out a contract on Dave and Clete. The assassin he calls forth is a terrifying ghostly apparition who travels through time on a spectral slave ship to wreak havoc on the present . . . where the battle between the forces of good and evil reach epic proportions.

Combining crime fiction with a hard-boiled noir thriller, and a dose of the paranormal, A Private Cathedral puts James Lee


Burke in a dimension of his own. It's a place where angels fear to tread . . . and ordinary wordsmiths can only wish they could get to!

## The Olive Jar

Beware: This is a personal rant. The Electoral College is a dinosaur that has outlived its effectiveness. It is time to replace it with the popular

vote which is taken anyway. The Electoral College is just one more layer for corruption as it is influenced by big business, lobbyists, and political strategists. It disenfranchises the individual voter and pits state against state encouraging divisiveness. Imagine being in a blue, or red, state where all the electoral votes go to one candidate and not the one for which you voted.

The Electoral College was conceived of and adopted at the

#### 1787 Constitutional Convention. But in the deliberations leading up to its adoption, the delegates debated several different options for selecting the president of the United States. Under Article II, Section 1, Clause 3, each state's electors would meet in their state and vote for two persons to be President, one of whom could not be from their state. The electors would then send a list of the persons for whom they had voted and the number of votes each had received to the President of the Senate.

The Twelfth Amendment made a series of adjustments to the Electoral College system. For the electors, it was now mandated that a distinct vote had to be taken for the president and the vice president. Further, one of the selected candidates must be someone who is not from the same state as the elector.

To confuse things more, all states do not have the same rules governing their state electors. For instance, two states, Maine and Nebraska, apportion their electors by congressional district. For example, Maine has four electoral votes and two congressional districts. Maine's second congressional district voted for Donald Trump in 2020, but its first congressional district voted for Joe Biden. Statewide, a majority of voters voted for Joe Biden. Thus, President Biden received three electoral votes, and then-President Trump got one electoral vote from Maine.

Remember that the Founding Fathers are talking about Landed White Gentry when they are talking about voters. Even then, the writers of the Constitution did not trust the voters to be "educated enough" to pick a leader by popular vote. They left the task to the Electors of the College, not the people and certainly not all the people. Recall that the Founding Fathers did not allow a provision for Blacks, Women, Slaves, the Poor, or Renters or Sharecroppers. It was not until 1921, the year my mother was born, that women were granted the right to vote.

The word "democracy' means rule by the people. Shouldn't the individual vote count to select the President and Vice President? No other office adds the extra layer of a national or state election.

Back in the early days of our country's foundations, the Electoral College simplified the communication among states. It was a simpler "network" rather than collecting votes from all over by horseback courier. Well, now, in our digital age, our votes can be collected and tallied almost instantaneously.

The "national popular vote" is the sum of all the votes cast in the general election, nationwide. The presidential elections of 1876, 1888, 2000, and 2016 produced an Electoral College winner who did not receive the most votes in the general election.

Each individual vote should count. There is no need to color code or label states a "Swing" state. No state election should have more importance than another. Each person should enter the voting booth and know that he or she is the decider of the choice for President.

Please be careful out there this week. The allergens remain high and there has been a sharp rise in hospital admissions in the area from the latest strain of CoVid.



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

## **Environmental Conservation Police on Patrol**

The New York State Department of Environmental Conservation's (DEC) Division of Law Enforcement enforces the 71 chapters of New York State's Environmental Conservation Law (ECL), protecting fish and wildlife and preserving environmental quality across New York. In 1880, the first eight Game Protectors proudly began serving to protect the natural resources and people of New York State. In 2023, the Division of Law Enforcement fielded more than 101,500 calls, resulting in Environmental Conservation Police Officers (ECOs) and Investigators across the state responding to more than 30,932 complaints and working on cases that resulted in nearly 16,900 tickets or arrests for violations ranging from deer poaching to solid waste dumping, illegal mining, the illegal pet trade, and excessive emissions violations.

#### **Illegal Take of Great Blue Heron - Orange County**

On May 30, ECOs Boyes and Lovgren responded to the town of



Montgomery for reports of a deceased great blue heron. The complainant reported hearing a gunshot before observing the bird on the ground near a pond. The Officers arrived at the location and discovered the deceased heron with injuries consistent with a gunshot and noticed

only one house with a clear line of sight to the adjoining pond. The Officers interviewed the resident of the house who eventually admitted to shooting the heron that morning. ECOs ticketed the defendant for illegally taking protected wildlife and sent the blue heron to the DEC Wildlife Unit for a necropsy. On June 25, a DEC pathologist confirmed the cause of death.

#### Fawn in Distress - Sullivan County

On July 11, ECOs Boyes and Parker responded to the village of

Monticello for reports of a fawn stuck in the foundation of an abandoned building. The Officers arrived and discovered the foundation partially filled with making water, the fawn's escape more difficult. ECO Parker entered the water wearing waders, retrieved the fawn, and handed the animal to ECO Boyes. After a brief



visual inspection, Officer Boyes determined the fawn was in good health and released it into the woods where it quickly reunited with an adult deer waiting nearby. ECOs also notified local code enforcement of the abandoned foundation and its condition to help prevent similar incidents. Sun Trail Storage



## Lake Superior Beach Temporarily Closed



Bethel, NY - Due to an unhealthy algae bloom, Sullivan County has temporarily suspended swimming and boat rentals at Lake Superior State Park in Bethel.

"Cyanobacteria, better known as blue-green algae, has increased to potentially harmful levels at Lake Superior's beach, due in large part to the ongoing hot weather," Parks, Recreation and

Beautification Director Brian Scardefield explained. "People and animals who come in contact with the algae may develop irritation of the skin, eyes, nose, throat and respiratory tract - or nausea, diarrhea and vomiting if they swallow any of it.

"We will continue to daily monitor the lake quality and will reopen once the algae has cleared and the water has been tested."

In the meantime, Lake Superior State Park remains open for picnicking, hiking and land-based recreation. The public boat launch is also open.

If someone is exposed to the algae, they should:

o Rinse the affected area with clean water as soon as possible

o Consider medical attention if vomiting or experiencing diarrhea, irritation or breathing difficulties

o Report symptoms to the NYS Department of Health (845-794-2045)

## Sullivan County Buildings Closed Employees Sent Home Due to Emailed Threat

Monticello, NY - On Monday, due to a non-specific threat emailed to Sullivan County government's main address, Acting Sullivan County Deputy Manager Michelle Huck authorized the closure of several public buildings throughout the County today.

"Out of an abundance of caution, we decided to close the Government Center, the Center for Workforce Development (both in Monticello) and our Social Services campus in Liberty today," explained Huck. "While we do not believe the threat was genuine, we asked law enforcement to sweep our buildings for any security concerns, of which they found none."

"I'm grateful to our employees, who calmly and safely responded to this unexpected situation," she added. "I'm also thankful we have the services of a top-notch group of professionals from our Sheriff's Office, State Police, Public Safety Division and Public Works, who coordinated their efforts today to ensure everyone's safety."

All County offices opened as usual, August 6.

This funding will help local social services departments throughout New York to hire more staff as they continue serving hundreds of thousands of low-income families statewide.

"By giving local social services departments the funding to hire more staff and bolster operations, we can bring more families out of poverty and into a brighter future."

The \$17.2 million awarded today includes investments in local social services departments in regions throughout the state:



The Family-Centered Services initiative was first announced in the 2024 State of the State address and continues Governor Hochul's deep commitment to strengthening the social service network and lifting families out of poverty.

The initiative addresses the challenges of family poverty by ensuring local social services departments across the state will have trained staff available to provide targeted interventions that support the entire family. This includes assisting families with complex needs such as mental health conditions, developmental disabilities, substance use disorders and those experiencing homelessness or domestic violence.

The funding will enable local departments to hire from one to seven full-time credentialed or appropriately experienced staff, depending on the size of the county's caseload. The new staff will provide a range of case management services that could include in-depth assessments, crisis intervention, resource navigation and peer support to stabilize household conditions, among others.

Local departments will tailor their initiatives to meet the unique needs of the households they serve. Some may choose to focus on the needs of homeless families or households facing men-



tal health conditions, while others may focus more on encouraging paths to employment. Families will be referred to the program based on locally developed criteria.

Office of Temporary and Disability Assistance Commissioner Barbara C. Guinn said, "The causes of poverty are often complex and addressing them requires a multi-faceted approach that addresses the specific needs of each family. We are grateful to Governor Hochul for recognizing the power of the Family-Centered Services initiative so social services districts are better equipped to help caregivers achieve financial stability and family well-being."

Office of Children and Family Services Commissioner Dr. DaMia Harris-Madden said, "We are proud to stand with Governor Hochul and our agency counterparts to continue the efforts of removing some of the structural barriers to self-sufficiency and overcoming poverty. Access to services and supports that address basic needs can be life changing; hence, the necessity to invest in safety nets, including more staffing and training. Through the Family-Centered Services Initiative, we are expanding and strengthening the workforce which will assist families with competing and compelling needs."

Office of Mental Health Commissioner Dr. Ann Sullivan said, "All New Yorkers should have a home where they can live and thrive within their community. These critical wrap-around services help individuals and families successfully move forward with greater stability and financial security, which in turn supports mental wellness. I commend Governor Hochul for making it a priority of her administration that our families in need can access these critical services and supports."

## DEC Announces New York State 2024-25 Hunting and Trapping Licenses Now On Sale

New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) Interim Commissioner Sean Mahar today announced that hunting and trapping licenses and\_Deer Management Permits (DMPs) for the 2024-25 season are now on sale. The sale kicks off the first time that all hunting, fishing, and trapping\_licenses and associated tags will be printed on plain paper\_rather than plastic stock.

"DEC continues to modernize the sporting license system and improve the license-buying experience for the public,"\_Interim Commissioner Mahar said.\_"The ability for people to receive their license electronically and print tags at home will make it quicker and easier to get outdoors and connect with nature through hunting and fishing."

Licenses and permits\_can be purchased online at any of\_DEC's license issuing agents or by telephone at\_866-933-2257. Hunting and trapping licenses are valid\_from Sept. 1 through Aug. 31 each year, while annual fishing licenses are valid for 365 days from date of purchase.

With the transition to plain paper licenses this year, licenses purchased online or over the phone can be emailed to a customer and printed at home, making them almost instantly accessible. Additional information on the transition to plain paper licenses and how to properly tag your harvested deer, bear, or turkey using paper tags can be found on\_DEC's website.

Also new this year, hunters are no longer required to wear a backtag while afield anywhere in New York State. Carrying a proof of licensure in the field (hard copy license or electronic license through the\_HuntFishNY\_mobile app) is still required. In addition, while a recent law change gave DEC the authority to accommodate electronic carcass tags for deer, bear, and turkey, this requires a regulatory change. Electronic tagging will not be available for the 2024-25 license year and tags are required to be printed on plain paper and carried while afield. New York's habitat serves a vital role in maintaining healthy and sustainable fish and wildlife populations. Purchasing a hunting, fishing, or trapping license helps support DEC's conservation projects. DEC also encourages outdoor enthusiasts to consider purchasing a Habitat and Access Stamp each year. Funds from the \$5 Habitat and Access Stamp support projects to conserve habitat and improve public access for fish and wildlife-related activities.

This year's Habitat and Access Stamp features the brook trout, the State's official freshwater fish.

Beginning this week\_through Nov. 30, the DEC Call Center is accessible\_from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.,

Monday\_through\_Friday, and from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m.\_on Saturdays and\_from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Sunday, Nov. 17\_and\_Sunday, Dec. 1. Regular call center weekday hours resume\_Dec. 1.

Individuals should have the following items ready when buying a license:

1. Complete contact information (e.g., name, address, email address, telephone number). If you are requesting that your license and/or tags be emailed, a valid email address is required;

2. DEC customer ID number (if applicable);

3. Proof of residency (e.g., driver's license or non-driver's ID with a valid New York State address);

#### Deer Management Permits (DMPs)

DMPs, tags for antlerless deer, are available at all license-issuing outlets, by phone, or online through Oct. 1, 2024. DMPs are used to manage the deer population and are issued through an instant random selection process at the point of sale. The chances of obtaining a DMP remain the same throughout the application period; hunters need not rush to apply. The\_chances of DMP selection in each Wildlife Management Unit (PDF) are available online, through license issuing agents, or by calling the DMP Hotline at 1-866-472-4332. Detailed information on DMPs is available on DEC's website.

#### HuntFishNY Mobile App

DEC's HuntFishNY app provides hunters and anglers with an easy way to display sporting licenses and privileges and view important hunting and fishing related information through the convenience of your smartphone. In addition to providing instant mobile access to electronic versions of your sporting licenses and privileges, the app offers the ability to report game harvests immediately while afield even when not in cell service, as well as links to useful information like season date summaries, regulations guides, a DEC contact list, and much more. Download HuntFishNY today from the Apple App and Google Play stores. **Opportunities for New Hunters and Junior Hunters and Trappers** 

To foster the next generation of hunters and trappers in New York, DEC designates special seasons for junior hunters (licensees aged 12-15) for deer, wild turkey, pheasants, and waterfowl, and opportunities for junior trappers (younger than 12 years old) through a trapper mentoring program. These opportunities allow youth hunters and trappers to spend time in the field with experienced adults and gain the necessary knowledge and skills to become safe and responsible members of the hunting and trapping community. More information about these programs and other opportunities for junior hunters and trappers is available on DEC's website.

DEC's Learn to Hunt webpage provides resources both for new hunters and organizations offering mentored hunting opportunities. Mentored hunts allow people with little or no hunting experience to learn additional firearm safety and hunting skills while building confidence under the guidance of more experienced hunters. Firsttime hunters can find mentored hunt events in New York and register for those learn-to-hunt opportunities on the Mentored Hunt Program registration webpage. DEC's Mentored Hunt Program registration page also provides a platform for those hosting a mentored hunt to advertise their event statewide.

Excellent hunting opportunities throughout the state support the Governor's "Get Offline, Get Outside" initiative, which was launched earlier this month to promote physical and mental health by helping encourage New York's kids and families to put down their phones and computers, take a break from social media, and enjoy recreation and outdoor social gatherings.

#### **Online and In-Person Hunter Education Training Courses**

All first-time hunters, bowhunters, and trappers are required to pass one or more courses before they can purchase a license. Online and in-person courses are available. In-person courses include a field portion where new hunters can get hands-on experience. All in-person courses are free of charge. Courses fill quickly, so be sure to sign up early. Visit DEC's website for more information, including a list of courses, registration instructions, and ways to obtain study materials.

All the requirements to earn a New York State hunter education

certificate can also be met by completing DEC's online hunter education course and passing the exam. Upon passing, participants will receive a hunter education certificate so they can purchase a hunting license. Participants must be New York State residents and the cost of the course is \$24.95. The online course can be accessed at the Hunter-Ed website.

The New York State bowhunter education certification course is also available online. Upon passing, hunters will receive their bowhunter education certificate so they can purchase a bowhunting privilege. Participants must be New York State residents and the cost of the course is \$30. The online course can be accessed at the Bowhunter-Ed website. **Remember: Hunt Safe, Hunt Smart!** 

The number of hunting-relating shooting incidents is declining, but even one incident is too many. Hunters can prevent injuries and fatalities by following the cardinal rules of hunting safety:

- 1. Assume every firearm to be loaded.
- 2. Control the muzzle in a safe direction.
- 3. Keep your finger off the trigger until firing.
- 4. Be sure of your target and beyond.
- 5. Wear fluorescent orange or fluorescent pink.

Fluorescent orange or pink not only improve visibility and safety, wearing these colors is also required when hunting big game with a firearm

#### Strap Up Before You Go Up

Tree stand falls are the leading cause of hunting injuries and they are easily preventable. Hunters are advised to use a full-body harness and fall-arrest system and stay connected from the time you leave the ground until the time you return. Check your stand (including straps) every season and replace any worn or missing parts. The proper use of tree stands, and full-body harnesses will help prevent injuries and fatalities. For more information, visit DEC's website and watch a tree stand safety video.

## Mid-Season Stewardship Efforts Show Positive Impact in the Catskills

Arkville, NY: The Catskill Center's Catskill Stewards Program commenced its 2024 season with mixed visitation trends within the Catskill Park, indicating overall growth compared to the previous year. Some locations have experienced notable increases in foot traffic, while others have seen slight declines. The overall upward trend in visitation underscores the continued importance of monitoring the Catskills' most popular outdoor destinations and highlights the value of the stewards' efforts in preserving the park's natural heritage while promoting a positive visitor experience.

The program includes seven full-time Catskill Stewards and one part-time Ridgerunner, all certified in Wilderness First Aid, trained as Leave No Trace educators, and instructed by the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) on forest rules, regulations, and invasive species identification. Stewards are stationed at high-use locations throughout the region, including Peekamoose Blue Hole, Kaaterskill Falls, Platte Clove and Thorn Preserves, Devil's Path, and six Fire Tower locations. They collaborate closely with Forest Rangers in their efforts to protect and preserve the Catskill Park. (Contd. PG 40)

## Mid-Season Stewardship Efforts Show Positive Impact in the Catskills

(From Pg. 39) Their duties include providing information on permit requirements, removing litter, rehabilitating illegal campsites, protecting water quality, and promoting responsible recreation practices. Additionally, they assist the United States Forest Service in data collection to better understand visitor demographics and usage trends.

From May 1 to mid-July 2024, the Catskill Stewards engaged with 23,335 visitors and 1,772 dogs, bringing total visitation to 28,223 across all locations. Peekamoose Blue Hole saw 7,822 visitors, an increase of nearly 1,100 from 2023. Kaaterskill Falls had 14,421 visitors, a decrease of roughly 3,800 from last year. Devil's Path attracted 1,163 visitors, an increase of 400 from 2023, while the Fire Towers recorded 705 visitors, up by approximately 185 from 2023. At Peekamoose Blue Hole, stewards turned away 5,000 visitors due to capacity limits. Throughout the start of the season, the stewards have built connections with a diverse range of park users, including hikers, anglers, birders, families, swimmers, and cyclists, as both residents and visitors of the Catskills.

Joining these efforts are the Catskill Mountainkeeper Stewards, focusing on high-use areas in the Western Catskills. From May through June 2024, the Mountainkeeper Stewards welcomed 2,158 visitors and 123 dogs, surpassing last year's numbers. They cover five primary locations at Big Pond, Alder Lake, the Beaverkill Covered Bridge, the Peekamoose Blue Hole Lower Field, and the Neversink Fishing Access Point. Like the Catskill Center stewards, they are trained in DEC rules and regulations, Leave No Trace principles, and Wilderness First Aid, and collaborate with the United States Forest Service on visitor surveys.

Visitors have expressed appreciation for the stewards' presence at trailheads and the noticeable improvements in site conditions. Popular activities reported this season include fly fishing, swimming, boating, kayaking, and enjoying the natural beauty of the park. Stewards have welcomed visitors speaking English, Korean, Czech, Spanish, Hindi, Burmese, Indonesian, and Lithuanian thus far, and counted up to 45 bird species in one day at a single location. These experiences highlight the Catskill Park as a vibrant destination for both people and wildlife, and underscores the continued importance of stewardship efforts in the Catskills.



## UC Successfully Secures \$1.6M for Pine Hill to Restore Historic Hotel

(From Pg. 1) In December 2022, Wellington Blueberry, a multi-member LLC representing a diverse array of Pine Hill community members, raised sufficient equity to purchase and start the process of redevelopment of The Wellington Hotel.

Built in 1882, it is a threestory Italianate structure on almost an acre, with a cupola that can be seen throughout the hamlet. Other preserved features include a wide wraparound porch, parquet floors, elegant staircase, and historic paneled doors and woodwork; it is architecturally consistent with other notable adjacent properties. In 2002, the property was added to the National Registry of Historic Places. In 2010, it became part of Pine Hill's Historic District, which encompasses all of Main Street and Pine Hill's central business district. But the property, neglected for decades, was a source of serious blight on Main Street.

Since its purchase, dozens of community members have volunteered to help Wellington Blueberry LLC members with outdoor clean up days, filling 30 dumpsters paid for by the LLC. The LLC has further invested almost \$200,000 in soft costs, including architectural drawings, structural reports, and minor stabilization repairs to the building. The group also applied for a Catskill Watershed Corporation flood mitigation study, which was completed in 2023.

"As a County government, we are committed to helping our Catskills communities thrive, and the rehabilitation and adaptive reuse of the beloved Wellington Hotel will restore this historic building as an economic and community anchor while providing much needed affordable housing," said Ulster County Executive Jen Metzger. "I want to thank Governor Hochul and Empire State Development for this award, and the team at Ulster County Economic Development for its work with the Shandaken community on this successful application. I also want to congratulate the Town of Shandaken, Jan Jaffee and Wellington Blueberry LLC, and RUPCO for their visionary plan for this building and their commitment to making it happen."

"I'm so proud of the hard work and recognition the Wellington community has brought to the Town of Shandaken and Pine Hill," said Supervisor Peter DiSclafani. "This project is fantastic!"

"With most of Shandaken's land publicly owned, this is just one example of the many things the Town and the community are doing right now to show that appropriate scaledevelopment is possible here," said Jan Jaffe, president of the Wellington LLC board and volunteer community engagement coordinator for Shandaken. "It's delicate work, hard work and mostly volunteer work. This award gets the Wellington closer to its goal of increasing Shandaken's affordable housing stock by almost 3% with 10 affordable housing units and a market. It demonstrates that Ulster County and New York State back the power of a small town to make a big impact."

"The former Wellington Hotel project is a fabulous opportunity to join forces with Ulster County and a group of committed, local volunteers led by Jan Jaffe to repurpose an abandoned, historic building that will provide workforce housing in the rural hamlet of Pine Hill, situated at the foot

of Belair Mountain," said Kevin O'Connor, RUPCO CEO. "We are grateful to Governor Hochul for her leadership on the importance of housing, including rural areas, and providing Restore funds to support the project."

"The Department of Economic Development is thrilled to see our State partners in the Empire State Development Corporation and the Mid-Hudson Regional Есопотіс Development Council recognize the exponential impacts of these investments in our rural Main Streets

Wellington Hotel in Pine Hill

by awarding this deserving project," said Joshua Stratton-Rayner, Department of Economic Development Deputy Director. "The preservation and adaptive reuse of this historic property that anchors the Pine Hill corridor will add needed affordable housing density in a place with the infrastructure to support it, and the daytime commercial presence to service locals and visitors alike. We anticipate that this will catalyze further successes for the citizens of Shandaken who have already shown incredible tenacity in their belief that civic organizing can create the conditions for a flourishing community."

Ulster County is also undertaking a rail trail project in connection with Pine Hill that will further contribute to the local economy and community quality of life. For more information on the rail trail project, visit: https://participate.ulstercountyny.gov/shandaken-rail-trail.

The Restore New York Communities Initiative provides financial assistance to municipalities for revitalizing commercial and residential properties. Administered by Empire State Development, the program aims to eliminate blight, grow local housing, encourage community growth and revitalization, and boost local economies by revitalizing properties and increasing the local tax base. In addition to the award to Ulster County, the City of Kingston was awarded 550,000 for Kingston Standard Brewing Company, which is making improvements to green its operations and achieve net-zero emissions greenhouse gasses. In New Paltz, the Village was awarded \$425,000 for the restoration of the historic Ann Oliver House, which will serve as the home of the Dr. Margaret Wade-Lewis Black History Cultural Center.

I'm proud to partner with local law enforcement departments to bring the C.A.R.E.S. Van and assistance with federal agencies to National Night Out events across NY-18 on Tuesday, August 6.

My team will be at events cutting through bureaucratic red tape to assist families with everything from child tax credits and IRS returns to FAFSA forms and federal student loans. We'll also continue to bring assistance with accessing federal grants to our local law enforcement departments, like the \$375,000 grant that I secured for the Town of Poughkeepsie to start a Community Policing Unit.

## Welcome to Kirsten's New York Minute!

Here's what she's been up to this week:

1. Fighting for first responders

First responders, including police officers, firefighters, and emergency medical services personnel, face higher rates of PTSD and suicide compared to civilians. Kirsten is determined to provide first responders with the mental health services they need.

This week, Kirsten announced her bipartisan First Responders Wellness Act, which would create a new grant program to expand professional mental health services for law enforcement and create a new mental health hotline for first responders.

#### 2. Protecting service members

Service members who regularly fire heavy weapons are at increased risk of traumatic brain injuries. Kirsten is fighting to pass legislation that would address traumatic brain injuries among our service members.

This week, in Albany, East Syracuse, Rochester, and Buffalo, Kirsten announced the Blast Overpressure Safety Act, legislation that would address traumatic brain injuries in affected service members. The bill would enhance efforts to investigate these brain injuries, track exposure to blasts from weapons, and help service members access the care they need.

#### 3. Funding Lyme disease research

Ticks are widespread throughout Long Island and transmit a number of dangerous diseases, including Lyme disease, which can have devastating and life-altering impacts. From 2019-2022, Suffolk County had the highest number of Lyme disease cases in the country.

Kirsten is committed to securing the resources necessary to properly study tick-borne illnesses. This week, she joined elected officials and advocates on Long Island to announce her push for nearly \$200 million for research to fully understand and combat Lyme disease and other tick-borne illnesses in next year's government funding bill. Kirsten is calling for:

\$30 million for the Department of Health and Human Services to implement a national strategy to address vector-borne diseases, including tick-borne diseases.

\$30 million for the CDC to further their Lyme disease and tickborne illness work.

\$9 million to support the Department of Defense's Tick-Borne Disease Research Program.

\$130 million for Lyme and tick-borne disease research at the National Institutes of Health.

4. Bringing it home for New York

Kirsten is committed to bringing federal dollars home to New York.

Just this week, she secured:

\$405 million to strengthen electrical infrastructure on Long Island to make sure the lights stay on during extreme weather events. Read more.

Over \$650,000 to equip firefighters across New York with the

protective gear, training, and supplies necessary to safely respond to emergency situations. Read more.

5. Helping New Yorkers with Social Security

When a Suffolk County constituent needed help to secure retroactive Social Security retirement benefit payments that she was owed, she contacted Kirsten's office for help. Kirsten's team reached out to the Social Security Administration, and within weeks, over \$25,000 in back pay was deposited directly into her account.

#### My Thoughts on the Recent Prisoner Swap & the Urgent Need to Free Ryan Corbett

After enduring years as political prisoners under a cruel regime, we are all eager to welcome these Americans and many other innocent prisoners home.

However, this lopsided prisoner swap sets a dangerous precedent, placing innocent American citizens at risk of being used as bargaining chips in exchange for dangerous criminals. This not only appeases malicious actors but endangers Americans traveling or living abroad. I am also particularly concerned about the dangerous criminals being released in exchange for innocent Americans; these individuals include convicted hackers, murderers, and Russian spies.

Additionally, Î urge the Biden administration to continue working diligently to bring home all Americans held unjustly abroad, including my constituent Ryan Corbett, who has been unjustly detained by the Taliban since August 10, 2022.

Should Biological Men be Allowed to Compete in Women's Sports?

The International Olympic Committee is allowing biological men, Imane Khelif and Lin Yu-ting, to compete in the 2024 Olympics despite previously failing gender eligibility tests.

In one instance, Khelif caused the woman he was competing against in boxing to drop out after just 46 seconds due to the severe pain of being hit by a biological male. This is not only dangerous but unfair and deprives the biological women who worked their entire lives for this moment a fair shot at the gold.

That's why I support legislation like the Protection of Women and Girls in Sports Act, which ensures that biological females are not forced to compete against biological men in women's competitive sports funded through Title IX.

As your representative in Congress, my top priority is championing legislative initiatives that benefit you and your families. Each week, I review numerous bills and letters, engaging in thorough discussions with members of our community to determine which actions to support and address your needs. Below are some of the bills I recently cosponsored. (Contd. Pg. 57) **H.R. 6479** - To limit the availability of a plea deal for any person responsible for the terrorist attacks on September 11, 2001 - This bill would require the President to direct the Attorney General to refuse any plea deal for any individual responsible for the 9/11 terrorist if that plea deal would avoid a public trial or preclude the death penalty. The Department of Justice recently entered into a deal with Khalid Sheikh Mohammed, Walid Muhammad Salih Mubarak Bin Attash and Mustafa Ahmed Adam al-Hawsawi, three masterminds behind the 9/11 attack, that would remove the death penalty from consideration at sentencing. This is an absolute travesty of justice and these individuals should receive the death penalty for their heinous crimes.

**The Freedom from Unfair Gun Taxes Act of 2024 -** This bill would prohibit states from levying any additional excise taxes on firearms or ammunition. Excise taxes are frequently levied on goods like cigarettes or alcohol, however states should not be levying additional financial burdens on law-abiding gunowners exercising their Second Amendment rights. California has already levied an additional 11% excise tax on firearms and ammunition, and New York could soon follow.

**H.R. 7667, the Making Agricultural Products Locally Essential (MAPLE)** Act - This bill would add maple syrup to the eligible products under the Seniors Farmers Market Nutrition Program (SFMNP), which gives low-income seniors access to locally grown produce and agricultural products.

The past few years have been a roller coaster. We have to do more to get back on the right track.

## **Credit for IVF Expenses** Washington, DC - U.S. Rep. Marc Molinaro (NY-19) today

announced he introduced the IVF Access and Affordability Act.

According to the American Society for Reproductive Medicine (ASMR), in-vitro fertilization (IVF\_) services can cost as much as \$25,000 or more. The IVF Access and Affordability Act, which was authored by U.S. Rep. Mike Lawler (NY-17), creates a tax credit for IVF expenses. The credit will total \$20,000 for individuals and \$40,000 for couples filing jointly.

Rep. Molinaro said, "I know how valuable IVF is, but how costly it can be. There's more we can do to make these services more affordable and accessible. This bill sends a clear message: we will fight the restrictions and support the choices women and their families make."

In Congress, Rep. Molinaro has opposed a national abortion ban, opposed restrictions on mifepristone, and was the first Republican to back legislation that federally protects IVF and birth control.
