This young adult Coyote was shot and killed within a 5 mile radius of Grahamsville on Dec 11, 2010. The animal is suspected to be contaminated with Mange. Mange is a skin disease caused by microscopic mites that burrows underneath the host's skin, causing hair loss, redness of the skin, open lacerations and possible death. Domestic animals can become contaminated and can be treated with assorted medications from your local vetenarian. If you sight an animal with these symptoms in you residential area contact your local animal control officer to report the suspicious animal.

Ellenville Regional Hospital won in the category of Small Hospital or Outpatient Organization, for reducing the average length of stay in their Emergency Department (ED) to less than 100 minutes. Starting with an average length of stay of 190-240 minutes in 2007, they were able to bring down the average to about 91 minutes in 2010. They achieved this goal by appointing a multi-disciplinary team of staff, involved directly or indirectly with ED care, to dissect the care process to determine where lags or delays existed. The team then implemented procedures to shorten or eliminate these delays. This was accomplished as the ED patient volume increased by 36% between 2008 and 2009,

Benchmarked against eight other small hospitals in the state, Ellenville Regional Hospital's ED has the quickest turnaround time two years in a row for

patients!

The awards event, which was held at the Marriott at LaGuardia Airport, was held in conjunction with the Nassau-Suffolk Hospital Council (NSHC) and the Healthcare Trustees of New York State Association (HTNYS). SPIRALS AND SPURS

By Peggy DeWire "How do tree limbs know when to stop growing longer?" Fred asked me as we crossed his backyard at the end of

"Let's go over to that apple tree and find out, "I said as we mushed through the snow and stood looking up at it.

We noticed how the limbs grew off the trunk at an angle and how the tree

had a typical round shape while a nearby pine was a triangle.

I remarked that a tree grows out of the ground in a spiral to the pre-programmed height and width of its family type. Just like your body, Fred, has genes that control how tall and how big you'll finally get. As the tree spirals upward,

every branch grows from the trunk at a fixed angle which is repeated by all smaller limbs, then twigs and lastly, leaves. This is called the "universal

spiral" which you can see in snail shells, spider webs, rams horns and the outer plates on pineapples. Can you think of more spiral things in nature?

A spiral allows growth in a mathematical ratio of 3.1416 or pi

so that each whorl is related to the next in size. Artists call this expanding pattern "dynamic

symmetry.

Spurs

If you let your eye move up the apple tree from branch to branch, noting the angle where they leave the trunk, you'll see it's always the same and keeps the limbs growing parallel. This maintains the tree's overall shape, as pre-There's one programmed. more control I'm coming to.

The tree spiral can be distorted by poor light conditions or wind damage but new limbs always develop at the proper

angle succession to expand the spiral.



Spirals

So, Fred, to answer your question of how branches know when to stop growing, I want you to look at this ordinary twig at the end of its own spiral. Now look back from the end bud along the twig at the winter buds arranged in a neat spiral pattern.

But what's this! An ugly stubby twig in the wrong place! It's a spur that opens its end bud, putting out leaves and flowers but no extenders! Every year that spur makes a rough bark ring on the twig and the number of rings show its age. This spur has three rings and is about two inches long, so it took three years of retarded growth to grow two inches. Apple trees go for the spur method to hold back

branches and keep the tree's symmetry. So do cherry, birch and larch. Other trees such as

tulip and oak let underbranches just die off. Nature has two patterns for tree growth - spiral and opposite. That is, two branches twigs and leaf buds are always located exactly across from each other on the trunk.

Maple, ash and dogwood use this design to give their leaves greatest exposure to sunlight without overlapping.

Some opposite pattern trees form spurs to maintain

their symmetry and compactness.

Why trees make spurs instead of long twigs at the right time and place to build the best-shaped tree remains a mystery yet.

I left Fred rushing around from pine tree to apple

tree finding spurs.

He waved goodbye and thanks for showing him something to discover in his wintertime backyard.

Montgomery, NY -- U.S. Senator Charles E. Schumer, U.S. Representative Maurice Hinchey and other state and local officials today joined Jim Taylor for the Taylor Biomass Energy facility

Groundbreaking Ceremony in the Town of Montgomery in Orange County. The event marks the start of Phase 1 construction on the new facility, which has received necessary town and state approvals to move forward. The new plant will create more than 400 construction and permanent jobs and spur economic growth throughout the region.

"It is rare to witness a revolution, but that's what the project we are breaking ground on today represents," said Schumer. "Generating energy while reducing trash and producing no pollution is an absolute game changer for this country, and it's happening right here in the Hudson Valley, all the while creating jobs and badly needed economic activity."

This is an historic and nationally-significant project that will spur much-needed economic development and job creation in our region, while accelerating the development of green energy technology in this country," said Hinchey. "It has been a great honor to work with Jim Taylor whose vision, leadership and tenacity have gotten us to this point. The Town of Montgomery will now be host this "first-of-a-kind" biomass-to-energy technology-- a technology that will dramatically improve the way that we deal with solid waste in this country and provide sustainably generated electricity to our communities."

Jim Taylor, President and CEO of Taylor Biomass Energy, said, "Our project addresses the growing issue of solid waste management and over-capacity landfills across America - and it creates renewable energy at the same time. We think it's really a model for other urban areas to follow. With this technology, we actually have a viable alternative that will help us reduce our dependence on fossil fuels, and so make our carbon footprint smaller. Not many

projects today can deliver like that."

Mike Oates, President and CEO of the Hudson Valley Economic Development Corp., said that Taylor's project will help lead a New York recovery. "His innovation and entrepreneurial spirit are helping to bring high-quality jobs and capital investment to the Hudson Valley. We are now seeing the benefits of Jim's innovation and of the political leadership that helped bring this project home."

Over the past two years, Schumer and Hinchey worked with officials at Taylor Biomass urging the U.S. Department of Energy to award the project a \$100 million loan guarantee to make possible the innovative green energy project. In August, Taylor Biomass received notification that the project would receive the key loan guarantee pending a due diligence review, after both Schumer and Hinchey personally lobbied officials at the U.S. Department of Energy. In addition to the loan guarantee, the Taylor Biomass Project will also benefit from a 30% federal grant for clean energy projects. Both the loan guarantee and grant program were made possible by the American Recovery Reinvestment Act of 2009, which Schumer and Hinchey supported.

Washington, DC - With approximately 800,000 New Yorkers out of work and approximately 200,000 about to lose the emergency unemployment insurance assistance they depend on, U.S. Senator Kirsten Gillibrand is fighting to extend long-term unemployment insurance assistance through the end of 2011.

Without an extension, the 200,000 total New Yorkers who will lose their benefits by the end of this year will nearly double to approximately 400,000 by May of 2011. More than 40,000 New York jobs will be lost by December 2011 from cutting emergency unemployment benefits now, according to a report released last week from the White House Council of Economic

"Emergency unemployment assistance is not only vital for families across New York, it is critical for our overall economy," Senator Gillibrand said. "For many families, this assistance is the sole source of income, and their only way to put food on the table and meet basic needs during the winter season. They can't afford to be cut off now. We need to make sure we're providing emergency assistance for New Yorkers who are out of work by no fault of their own."

Of the approximately 800,000 New Yorkers who are currently out of work and the 15 million people unemployed across the country, nearly half have been jobless for more than 6 months.

- In New York City, more than 360,000 are out of work and more than 95,000 will lose their unemploy-

ment assistance by the end of the year.

 In Western New York, more than 55,000 are out of work and more than 14,000 will lose their unemployment assistance by the end of the year.

In the Rochester/Finger Lakes Region, more than 46,000 are out of work and more than 11,000 will lose their unemployment assistance by the end of the year.
 In Central New York, more than 42,000 are out of work and more than 10,000 will lose their unemployment assistance by the end of the year.

 In the Southern Tier, more than 20,000 are out of work and more than 5,500 will lose their unemploy-

ment assistance by the end of the year.

 In the Capital Region, 41,000 are out of work and nearly 10,000 will lose their unemployment assistance by the end of the year.

 In the North Country, nearly 20,000 are out of work and nearly 5,000 will lose their unemployment assistance by the end of the year.

 In the Hudson Valley, more than 80,000 are out of work and 20,000 will lose their unemployment assistance by the end of the year.

 On Long Island, more than 100,000 are out of work and 28,000 will lose their unemployment assistance by

the end of the year.

Senator Gillibrand's proposal would extend the Emergency Unemployment Compensation (EUC) program, which provides additional weeks of unemployment insurance in states hard hit by the recession, including New York, through December of 2011. Additionally, it would continue full federal financing for the Extended Benefits (EB) program, which provides an additional 20 weeks of assistance for individuals out of work through no fault of their own. Under current state law, New Yorkers would lose these benefits if they were not fully funded by the federal government.

In addition to being a lifeline for families and individuals to meet basic needs as they look for new jobs, the nonpartisan Congressional Budget Office (CBO) estimates that unemployment insurance assistance is the most effective measure to fight the economic recession. In fact, each dollar invested in unemployment assistance doubles its economic return as families who rely on this assistance spend it immediately

on basic necessities.

In 2009, 3 million Americans avoided poverty as a result of unemployment insurance assistance.

HINCHEY, 53 HOUSE DEMOCRATS OPPOSE OBAMA TAX DEAL WITH SEN-ATE REPUBLICANS

Washington, DC -- In a significant demonstration of opposition to President Obama's tax deal with Senate Republicans, Congressman Maurice Hinchey (D-NY) today joined 53 of his colleagues in the U.S. House in opposing the president's proposal, because it includes excessive tax breaks for the wealthiest 2 percent of Americans.

In a letter sent to Speaker Pelosi, Hinchey and his colleagues called the proposal "fiscally irresponsi-

ble" and "grossly unfair."

"The wealthy now hold more of this nation's wealth than at any time since the Great Depression," said Hinchey. At the meeting, the DEP agreed to provide, through a contractor, an engineering design in relation to flood mitigation for the Stony Clove creek. The DEC agreed to process the emergency permit required to do the work expeditiously. "The people and businesses of Phoenicia have been hit twice in 60 days with floods. We need the State DEC to issue whatever permits are needed to put people first so that these floods do not continuously harm families and small businesses. The damage caused by flooding to Phoenicia residents can be several thousand dollars each time, and that is a large disaster when you are a small community, family, or local business," Senator Bonacic said.

Ulster County Executive Michael Hein said, "I personally observed the tremendous damage caused by the recent floods and I applaud the exceptional technical team that has been assembled to move quickly and respond to the situation. Beyond, the immediate need to address the Stony Clove Creek, the County is committed to assisting the businesses and residents of Phoenicia in their response to these

dramatic flood events."

Supervisor Robert "Rob" Stanley said, "we reached an agreement this morning, where the DEP can help design some flood prevention work, and the DEC can expedite the approvals. The hope is to have the work done within a month. The proof will be in the results though. Those results cannot come soon enough as far as the people of our community are concerned."

Officials stressed that much more work has to be done. The immediate work plan agreed upon this morning will return the Stony Clove creek, which is the cause of much of the flooding in downtown Phoencia, to pre-flood conditions, so that future rains do not add onto the existing problems. Now, since sediment has built up in the Stony Clove creek, even limited rain can cause flooding.

Senator Bonacic also visited with downtown business owners and employees in Phoenicia. The Senator also urged the DEP to release water from their reservoirs as soon as possible whenever downstream flooding can be avoided (some releases actually contribute to downstream flooding, accordingly, releases must be timed). Right now, NYC's reservoir system is 23.4% above average. The normal reservoir capacity at this time of year is 72.2%. The reservoir levels yesterday were over 89%.

HINCHEY URGES EPA TO SET HIGH STANDARDS IN HUDSON RIVER PCB CLEANUP EFFORT-Congressman Says Dredging, Not Capping, Should be Used Wherever Possible

Washington, DC - Congressman Maurice Hinchey (D-NY) today urged U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) Administrator Lisa Jackson to ensure that high standards are used in Phase 2 of the EPA's ongoing efforts to remove toxic polychlorinated biphenyl (PCB) contamination in the Hudson River Superfund Site. Hinchey helped lead the effort to ensure that clean up of the Hudson River Superfund site would be paid for by General Electric (GE). From 1947 to 1977, GE dumped as much as 1.3 million pounds of PCBs into the river.

"PCBs cause cancer in humans, badly damage the environment and need to be removed from the Hudson River," said Hinchey. "That's why I've asked Administrator Jackson to set high performance standards for Phase 2 of the EPA's cleanup process. That means using environmental dredging to remove the contaminated sediments from the river whenever possible, and relying on capping, which encases contaminated portions of the riverbed in plastic, only when absolutely necessary. Doing this cleanup in the most effective manner possible is vital to restoring the ecology of the river, protecting public health, and allowing residents of the Hudson Valley to once again fully enjoy fishing and other recreational uses in this incredible American Heritage River."

In his letter to Jackson, Hinchey stressed the need for standards that are equal to or better than those used in the first phase of the cleanup effort. For decades, as a member of the State Assembly and U.S. Congress, Hinchey has helped lead the effort to require GE to remove the up to 1.3 million pounds of toxic PCBs it dumped into the Hudson during a 30-year period. In Phase 1, General Electric conducted dredging, with EPA oversight, and the company targeted 265,000 cubic yards (cy) of PCB-contaminated sediment. Dredging was conducted 133 days between May 15 and October 26, 2009.

Backfilling and capping in some areas continued through November 2009, until the Champlain Canal closed for the season.

EPA classifies PCBs as probable human carcinogens, and these chemicals are also linked to other serious non-cancer adverse health effects including reduced ability to fight infections, low birth weights, and learning problems. PCBs, once released into the environment, accumulate in animals and work their way up the food chain to humans, a term called bio-accumulation. In 1976, because of the concern over the bio-accumulation of PCBs in fish and other aquatic organisms and their consumption by people, the State of New York banned fishing in the Upper Hudson River and commercial fishing of striped bass, as well as several other species in the Lower Hudson. In 1984, a 200-mile stretch of the Hudson River from Hudson Falls to the Battery in New York City was classified as a Superfund site.

DELAWARE RIVER BASIN COMMISSION ISSUES DRAFT REGULATIONS THAT WOULD GOVERN GAS DRILLING

The Delaware River Basin Commission (DRBC) is the federal/interstate government agency responsible for managing the water resources within the 13,539 square-mile Delaware River Basin. On Wednesday, December 8th they issued draft regulations that would govern drilling for natural gas using hydrofracking in this incredibly environmentally sensitive area indicating a clear intention to green light unsafe drilling.

The next step triggered by these proposed rules is a 90-day public comment period where the commission is soliciting the opinions of the public regarding its plan. In addition to receiving written comments, three public hearings will be scheduled although dates have not yet been

announced.

The Commission has issued their draft despite an overwhelming number of pleas from the governmental and scientific sectors in addition to the public, not to do so. Included in these pleas were letters from Governor Paterson and Mayor Bloomberg requesting that regulations not be released until the science from a planned cumulative impact study and the EPA study could be completed. Further, both officials have stated major concern that sections of the Delaware River Basin is part of the New York City Watershed and under the planned rules will not benefit from the same protection as it would under the New York State plan

LETTER FROM GOVERNOR PATERSON TO DRBC WARNING AGAINST PREMA-TURE RELEASE OF DRAFT GAS RULES

Re: Proposed Regulation of Natural Gas Hydraulic Fracturing and Associated Activities

Dear Ms. Collier:

I write to request that the Delaware River Basin Commission halt its efforts to enact regulations covering certain elements of natural gas extraction

activities within New York State.

New York is presently proceeding with a careful and comprehensive review of the broad array of scientific and technical issues associated with high volume hydraulic fracturing. Indeed, horizontal hydraulic fracturing to produce natural gas is not underway in New York, and will not be underway until completion of this review. Chief among the items being assessed are the potential risks and technical remedies necessary to assure the protection of the biological, chemical and physical integrity of the State's surface and ground waters. A supplemental environmental impact statement review is underway, as are efforts to develop the regulatory, engineering, financial assurance, enforcement and staffing elements of any potential program. As you know, New York has determined that separate environmental reviews would be necessary for any natural gas projects that might be proposed within the unfiltered New York City drinking water watershed, a watershed that comprises a significant portion of the Delaware River basin within New York.

DRBC appears intent on going forward with a regulatory program that would not have the advantage of the full investigations and public

deliberations taking place in New York. Your proposed program, covering only a very small portion of New York State, could well conflict with the technical and regulatory protocols ultimately adopted in New York, causing confusion, duplication, redundant regulatory fee assessments, differing regulations in different locations and possible mismanagement. It would make far more sense for DRBC to participate in the New York process and assist in making the program as effective as possible, certainly before undertaking unilateral action. Importantly, given that there is a gubernatorial transition underway, it is appropriate that the DRBC avoid upsetting the transition process and policy prerogatives of the in-coming Governor.

We look forward to discussing these concerns before any action is undertaken and ask that you contact Peter Iwanowicz, Acting Commissioner of the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation and Deputy Secretary to the Governor for the Environment at 518-402-8540 to discuss this

matter at your earliest convenience.

HINCHEY, HOLT SLAM DRBC'S ISSUANCE OF DRAFT REGULATIONS ON HYDRAULIC FRACTURING - Cochairs of Congressional Delaware River Task Force Say Environmental Impact Studies Must Be Completed First

Congressman Maurice Hinchey (D-NY) and Congressman Rush Holt (D-NJ) today sharply criticized the Delaware River Basin Commission (DRBC) for releasing draft regulations to govern hydraulic fracturing without first completing a cumulative water impact study. The members slammed the agency's failure to adequately protect the basin's high quality water resources on, which millions of residents from New York, New Jersey and Pennsylvania rely on the basin for drinking water and other needs.

Hinchey and Holt, the Co-Chairs of the Congressional Delaware River Task Force, have joined environmentalists, local officials and public citizens in calling for the DRBC to conduct and complete a Cumulative Environmental Impact Study prior to the issuance of its regulatory framework that would allow hydraulic fracturing for natural gas to move forward in the basin. In spite of these calls and pending federal funding for the study as requested by DRBC, the Commission this week issued draft regulations without conducting such an analysis.

"The Delaware River Basin Commission has

failed significantly in its mission to protect the tremendously important water resources of the basin. By developing and issuing draft regulations without the completion of comprehensive scientific analysis of the cumulative impacts of hydraulic fracturing, the DRBC has put in jeopardy the River's Special Protection Waters, upon which millions of residents of New York, New Jersey and Pennsylvania rely for drinking water and other uses.

It should seem obvious that it is impossible to construct a proper regulatory framework without the guidance of the science that these studies would provide. Nevertheless, the commission has moved forward with draft regulations governing natural gas drilling in the Basin without quantifying, examining or understanding the cumulative impacts that such

regulations need to mitigate.

We urge the Delaware River Basin Commission to suspend any further action to allow natural gas drilling to move forward until it completes a comprehensive study of the impacts of those activities. Failing to do so undermines the agency's ability to effectively control and minimize the impacts of drilling on our water resources and protect the health of the 15 million people who rely on the Delaware River for clean drinking water and recreation. The DRBC's decision in this matter is highly regrettable and deeply concerning."

ISSUES GOVERNOR PATERSON EXECUTIVE ORDER ON HYDRAULIC FRACTURING

Governor David A. Paterson has issued an Executive Order directing the Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) to conduct further comprehensive review and analysis of high-vol-ume hydraulic fracturing in the Marcellus Shale. The Executive Order requires that, if approved, high-volume, horizontal hydraulic fracturing would not be permitted until July 1, 2011, at the earliest. This should allay any fears that high-volume hydraulic fracturing and horizontal drilling under study by DEC will commence without assurances of safety.

"We in government must always focus on protecting the well-being of those whom we represent and serve, but we also have an obligation to look to the future and protect the long-term interests for our State and its residents," Governor Paterson said.
"Therefore, I am proud to issue this Executive Order, which will guarantee that before any highvolume, horizontal hydraulic fracturing is permitted, the Department of Environmental Conversation will complete its studies and certify that such operations are safe."

Permits for high-volume, horizontal hydraulic fracturing can not be issued until the Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) completes a Supplemental Generic Environmental Impact Statement (SGEIS), which is currently being developed. As a result, there is already in place a de-facto moratorium on such permits.

The Governor issued the Executive Order contemporaneously with his veto of S.8129-B/A.11443-B, which would have suspended the issuance of new oil and gas drilling permits through May 15, 2011, including all conventional, low-volume, vertical oil and gas wells.

This legislation, which was well intentioned, would have a serious impact on our State if signed into law. Enacting this legislation would put people out of work - work that is permitted by the Department of Environmental Conservation and causes no demonstrated environmental harm, in order to effectuate a moratorium that is principally symbolic," Governor Paterson said. "Symbols can have great importance, but particularly in our current terrible economic straits, I cannot agree to put individuals out of work for a symbolic act."

"I am sympathetic to the sponsors' desire to protect the environment and public health, and I respect the concerns that produced this legislation," the Governor continued. "But this legislation does not accomplish this purpose, since the activities at the heart of the moratorium are not currently taking

place, and would not take place until well after the legislation's proposed moratorium."

The bill goes well beyond high-volume, horizon-tal hydraulic fracturing and effectively would result in a moratorium on all new oil and gas well drilling in this State. The cessation of such new activity, even for a limited period, would have substantial negative financial consequences for the State, local governments, landowners and small businesses involved in

conventional oil and gas production.

The Division of the Budget estimates that the bill would cause a substantial reduction in State revenues from the loss of permit fees and tax revenue. With a \$315 million budget gap in the current fiscal year, and a projected gap of over \$9 billion in the 2011-12 State fiscal year, New York simply cannot afford to send hundreds and perhaps thousands of jobs, and millions of dollars in capital investment to Pennsylvania and other states to our south.
