



> CWC Assists Neversink Fields of Dreams

Tom Mitchell, director of the Neversink Little League for more than 40 years, looked over the new fields on Route 42 earlier this spring as work continued to replace the old



fields on Sundown Road destroyed in 2011 flooding. The CWC recently voted to reimburse the Town of Neversink up to \$30,000 to help pay for the new fields. (A CWC flood recovery grant had been authorized in 2012 for a non-profit

organization to do the work, but the town used municipal funds for the project, leasing the property to the Little League for ongoing maintenance.)

Starting in 2017, area youngsters on 22 teams will play on four ballfields on 16 acres of a former chicken farm purchased by the Town. Maintenance, storage and concessions buildings have also been constructed.

DEC Proposing Regulations for Blue Hole Public Meeting

The New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) is proposing new regulations for the Blue Hole and Peekamoose Valley located in the Town of Denning, Ulster County. The purpose of the proposed regulations, which mirror the current Emergency Regulations, is to increase public safety, reduce negative impacts to the environmental resources of the area and protect New York City's public water supply.

The proposed regulations will:

 Restrict hours that the area is open (except for the nearby designated camping area) to one half-hour before sunrise to one half-hour after sunset,

 Require the use of the portable restroom facilities for human waste disposal and the dumpster for all

 Prohibit camping, all fires (including charcoal fires, wood fires, gas grills, propane stoves or other portable stoves) and the use of portable generators at the Blue Hole. (Limited use of the above will be allowed at the nearby designated camping area only);

Limit parking to designated parking areas (parking along the shoulder of the road is already prohibited by the Town

and is a Tow Away Zone); and,

 Prohibit glass containers, radios and other audio devices. A public informational meeting was held on Tuesday, June 21 at the Sundown Church Hall to provide information about the proposed regulations and to get input from

the public.

The public had the opportunity to provide oral and/or written comments at the public meeting and can submit written comments during the formal 45-day public comment period. The public comment period runs from June 8, 2016 through July 23, 2016, and any comments not provided at the meeting can be submitted to: Bill Rudge, DEC Natural Resources Supervisor, 21 South Putt Corners Road, New Paltz, NY 12561 Phone: 845.256.3092

The DEC will review and address all comments received during the public comment period. The regulations will become final when they are printed in the New York State Register, and DEC will continue to inform the public of the new regulations by providing information on DEC'S website and through social media. DEC will also post permanent signs throughout the property detailing the regulations.

#### Wake Up and Smell the Roses!

The rose is a symbol of love and beauty (as well as war and politics) the world over.

The rose has been around for about 35 million years and grows naturally throughout North America. The petals and rose hips are edible and have been used in medicines since ancient times.

In addition to the wild medieval tales of love and magic, the rose still is included in many myths that are alive today. Most of the roses you see around old abandoned home sites that are thought to be wild, are not wild. They're just tough. Since roses have been hybridized since Roman times, there are thousands of

tough, long-lived hybrids that seem to grow on forever. The True "Wild" Roses (Rosa canina - (Dog



Dog Rose, Common Briar) originated in Eurasia. It is been known as the Dog Rose since ancient It is a species times. that occurs naturally, with no help from man -

a true "wildflower." True wild roses are all have exactly five petals.

This time of year the White Dog Rose can be seen just about anywhere in the Catskills.

It is a robust perennial shrub with thorny arching stems. Originally introduced to help with soil erosion, hedging and food for wildlife, it's vigor and hardiness has enabled it to spread quickly.

The Dog Rose blooms once in June, with clusters of white (sometimes pale pink or yellow), honeyscented blossoms. Each flower has numerous pollen containing stamens in the center. The blossoms grow on the small-leaved climbing shrub that often uses other trees and shrubs for their support, and can grow over 15 feet in height.

The petals of R. canina are .75 to a little over 1 inch long and form the flower. The flowers may be solitary or in a corymb (a flower cluster whose lower stalks are proportionally longer so that the flowers form a flat or slightly convex head)

The leaf is odd-pinnately compound, with 5 to 7 generally mostly glabrous, toothed leaflets. The terminal leaflet may be up to 1.5 inches long, and is ovate, generally wider toward the base of the leaflet than toward the more or less acute tip.

By fall, the numerous blossoms will mature into a berry-like seed-bearing fruit; bright red rose hips. Wild rose hips persist on the plant during much of the winter. Many birds and mammals depend on the dry fruits when the ground is covered with snow. Their fruits or hips are tasty treats for wildlife and contain Vitamin A and C.

The sharp objects along the stem are commonly called "thorns", but they are technically prickles; outgrowths of the outer layer of tissue of the stem, or epidermis. The prickles are typically sickle-shaped hooks, which aid the Dog Rose in hanging onto other

vegetation when growing over it

The Dog Rose was introduced to the eastern United States in 1866 as rootstock for ornamental roses. Beginning in the 1930s, the U.S. Soil Conservation Service promoted it for use in erosion control and as "living fences" to confine livestock. It has been planted in highway median strips to serve as crash barriers and reduce automobile headlight glare. Recently its tenacious growth habit has been recognized as a problem on pastures and unplowed lands, where it disrupted cattle grazing. In some states, it is perceived as a pest of the natural ecosystems.

Pliny the Elder, born in the time of Christ, thought otherwise. He believed that the root could cure the bite of a mad dog, and used that to explain

the origin of the common name.

The rose, in all its variety and color, was made the New York State flower in 1955. Roses continue to be appreciated and still considered the symbol of love.

The Rose is mentioned in many writings throughout history. Although the fantastic new roses in today's world offer almost anything you may desire in color or fragrance, many people continue to believe there is no purer beauty than the true Wild Rose.


#### Make a trap to lure flying insects



This week's Mysterious Book Report is the second in our special series which features Lora Brown, who picked the

novel to review and gave it her stamp of approval. After reading her notes and the novel, I'm in absolute agreement.

The Ex, (Harper Collins, \$26.99, 283 pages, ISBN 978-0-06-239048-6) by Alafair Burke is by far and away the best of her eleven novels and one million or so words of crime fiction. It's a murder mystery that starts with the throttle wide-open on the first page and never lets up until the conclusion. When the novel begins, we meet Jack Harris as he's being interviewed by the NYPD about a triple homicide that's only hours old. Jack just happened to be in the vicinity at the same time the killings took place. He's a renowned writer, a straight- arrow, and a single father who's raising a teenaged daughter by himself after ALAFAIR BURKE her mother was killed in a mass shooting at Penn Station in New York City ten years ago. It's only a coincidence that the father of the demented young man who killed Jack's wife Molly--the same man Jack tried unsuccessfully to sue-- is one of the three dead bodies from the waterfront crime scene. That's where Jack went to hook up with a mystery woman named Madeline. It's all plausible.



Isn't it? Jack's a good guy. Right? He's a victim of circumstance, that's all. In the wrong place at the wrong time. But when the cops take Jack downtown for some 'routine questions, just to clear up a few things,' his daughter Buckley freaks out, and calls his ex . . . Olivia Randall. She's one of New York City's brightest and best-known criminal defense attorneys. She's also the woman who broke his heart and upended his world twenty years ago. They haven't spoken since. Until now. Convinced she still knows him, marinating in guilt, and over the vehement objections of her mentor and law partner, Olivia accepts Jack's case. She agrees to defend him, even though the little-voice in her head keeps screaming out alarms.

All the above takes place in just the first dozen chapters of this finely-crafted and wickedly complex novel with a large cast of characters who'll keep you enthralled, entertained and gobbling up pages until the stunning conclusion. Alafair Burke has been called a whip-smart novelist. Read The Ex and find out why.

"I love shooting photographs during twilight. Colors intensify and space flattens," says Kelly, a part-time resident of Loch Sheldrake who is based in New York City. "As night falls, elements

seem to float."

Kelly anticipates the movement of stars through the treetops and "draws with light" using the trails created by the Earth's rotation. "A visual transformation occurs," she says. "I find observing the constancy of the stars to be grounding and offers perspective to everyday life."

When not looking toward the skies, Kelly finds inspiration all around her. "I explore scenes and objects," she says. "Evidence of peoples' lives or previous events become an archeological dig and suggest metaphor: Toys left behind, summer whites on a clothes line, the warm glow of light emanating from a neighbor's window, stacked rowboats signaling the end of summer. The outside reflects what's happening for me internally."

Kelly received a BFA from SUNY Purchase in photography and design. Her photographic work is influenced by her studies with two photography professors: Jed Devine and Jan Groover, and colorists Len Stokes and Sewell Sillmann.

Robert Burke Warren to Read From his New Book titled Perfectly Broken

The protagonist of Burke Warren's novel, Grant Kelly, is a former rock musician, who moves to the Catskills when he is no longer able to get work as a musician. Here the similarities with the author's life end, we hope. In

the publisher's words:

His rock star days may be behind him, but stay-at-home dad Grant Kelly's life is getting more interesting by the day. It's the beginning of the post 9/11 era, and he and his wife and four-year-old son have traded a New York City apartment for a Catskills farmhouse, where ghosts from the past, worries for the future, and temptations in the present converge to bring about drastic changes in their marriage, their friendships, and their family."

Warren is a writer, performer, and musician. His work has appeared in Salon, The Weeklings, Akashic Books, Texas Music, Brooklyn Parent, The Woodstock Times, longform, Vulture, Paste, The Rumpus, The Good Men Project, The Bitter Southerner, Chronogram, and the Da Capo anthology The Show I'll Never Forget. He's ghost written for Gregg Allman and his liner notes appear on the award-winning CD Live at Caffe Lena. His debut novel, Perfectly Broken, was published by the Story Plant in March, 2016.

As a songwriter, he has released seven CDs - two as Robert Burke Warren and five as Uncle Rock. His work also appears on albums by Rosanne Cash and rockabilly queen Wanda Jackson, and the Roots used his tune "The Elephant In the Room" as John McCain's entrance theme on Late Night with Jimmy Fallon. His songs have also appeared on Felicity and the 2015 rom com People Places Things. In the mid 90s, he performed as Buddy Holly in the West End musical Buddy: the Buddy Holly Story. Prior to that he traveled the world as a bass player.

#### 'Three Seasons at Black Forest Farm' Installation by Karin Giusti In the Loft Gallery

"Three Seasons at Black Forest Farm," an installation exhibit by artist Karin Giusti, opens with a reception on Friday, July 1 from 7 to 9 pm at the Delaware Arts Center's Loft Gallery in Narrowsburg, NY. The exhibit will be on view through July 30.

"Three Seasons at Black Forest Farm" is a monumental sculpture and photographic exhibition that serves as a tribute to the life and memory of Stephen G. Schwarz (1961-2010), an active duty New York City firefighter and first responder on September 11, 2001, who succumbed to the health effects

of working at ground zero.

Giusti's installation illustrates the life the two shared at Black Forest Farm in Cochecton, New York, a respite from the heart-pounding sirens of the NYC firehouse where Stephen worked and survived 9-11. Large-scale photographic collages in tubular membrane structures, three-dimensional models, and maps are accompanied by a soundtrack of Schwarz chopping wood that was captured by Giusti before his death in 2010.


Asked about "Three Seasons" of the exhibit's title, the artist responded, "In Sullivan County, the weather here is extreme, and we are always short one season. To know

the Delaware Valley is to love it."

Giusti hold a Masters degree from Yale University, a BFA from University of Massachusetts, Amherst, and is a Guggenheim Fellow in Sculpture Installation. She has taught as a full professor and Head of Sculpture for 21 years at Brooklyn College of the City University of New York. Her installations have shown nationally and internationally. Her awards and honors include a NYFA grant and most recently, The Pollock-Krasner Foundation Award, Gottlieb Foundation Award, and a Joan Mitchell Foundation Award.

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


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# The Olive Jar - By Carol LaMonda First Lady of Olive



For almost three decades, or twenty-six years to be more precise, Bert Leifeld and Bruce LaMonda were the consistent names in Olive government. Bert Leifeld became Supervisor, for twenty-six years, after being a Town Constable and then Town Board Member. Bruce became Deputy Supervisor after serving as Zoning Enforcement Officer and then Town Board Member for twenty-five years. During this time, Ann Leifeld and I became the not-so-silent women alongside the men who put in countless hours at meetings and events.

We jokingly dubbed Ann Leifeld as "the First Lady of Olive." I graciously accepted being second. This weekend, Bruce and I will attend Ann's funeral and remember all that was accomplished by our husbands as our lives sur-

vived and fought a life-changing era in the history of Olive.

There was the on-going issue of taxes with New York City owning the lion's share of Olive's land in the form of the Ashokan Reservoir and watershed. The Large Parcel Bill saw Olive's taxes sky-rocket from dollars to thousands. We suffered through a 100% re-evaluation. We rejoiced at a ten-year agreement with the City that rescued us from The Large Parcel loop-hole that pitted us against our neighbors of Hurley, Woodstock and Shandaken in unfair school tax levy. We endured bridge repairs that cut off parts of town from other hamlets in the Town of Olive. We suffered road closures because of Homeland Security of the Reservoir.

The administration, along with a supportive Town Board, purchased the Town Meeting Hall in Shokan and built the senior housing complex, Tongore Pines, in Olivebridge. The parks of Grant Avery in Shokan and Davis Park in West Shokan were upgraded and Tongore became home to soccer and minor league baseball. Olive got a swimming pool and bathhouse. Our summer recreation program became the envy of other towns. A sewer system now serves the Onteora High School and much of Boiceville. The list of improvements is astounding.

Hurricane Irene and Storm Lee devastated parts of town, and these same leaders worked and fought with FEMA to raise money for local repairs to homes

and businesses.

They used to say that behind every successful man is a good woman. Today that would appear to be both sexist and politically incorrect. So let me say this, Ann, as you are laid to rest: Along side the Supervisor, there was a supportive "First Lady" who was fashion consultant, sounding board and pillar of The Town of Olive.

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

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Increase in Pertussis (Whooping Cough) Sullivan County Residents and Visitors Urged to be up to date with their vaccinations

The Sullivan County Public Health Department is urging Sullivan County residents and visitors to be sure that they are fully vaccinated against pertussis (whooping cough) as there has been an increase in the number of cases statewide. Sullivan County is beginning to see an increase in cases this year and has confirmed six (6) new cases of pertussis within the past few weeks. Those individuals and their close contacts are being treated. Sullivan County Public Health Services continues to work with area schools, physicians, and the community to identify and notify students and residents that have possibly been exposed.

In 2015, preliminary data from the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) show that there were 592 pertussis cases in New York State, excluding New York City, which had an additional 383 cases.

If you or your child has been around someone with pertussis, you may become sick with pertussis (whooping cough) as well. This is especially true when you or your child has not received all the pertussis vaccine shots. Sometimes even if your shots are up to date, you may still be able to get pertussis.

PERTUSSIS is also known as whooping cough because of the "whooping" sound that is made when gasping for air after a fit of coughing making it hard to breathe. Coughing fits due to pertussis infection can last for up to ten (10) weeks or more. (Contd. Pg.



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

Increase in Pertussis (From Pg. 7)

Pertussis is a highly contagious disease that is spread through the air by cough. Pertussis begins with cold symptoms and cough, which becomes much worse over 1-2 weeks. Symptoms usually include a long series of coughs ("coughing fits") followed by a whooping noise. However, older children, adults and very young infants may not develop the whoop. There is generally only a slight fever. People with pertussis may have a series of coughs followed by vomiting, turning blue, or difficulty catching breath. The cough is often worse at night and cough medicines usually do not help alleviate the cough.

If you or your child comes down with any of the above symptoms including a cough, talk to your Health Care Provider without delay. If your Health Care Provider needs more information, they can call their local Health Department. Pertussis is a reportable disease required by law and must be reported by physicians to Sullivan

County Public Health Services.

Pertussis is generally treated with antibiotics, to control the symptoms and prevent infected people from the spread of the disease. If you or your child has been diagnosed with Pertussis, complete the antibiotic regimen before returning to work school or community functions, to reduce the spread of the disease. People who have or may have pertussis should stay away from young children and infants until properly treated. Treatment of people who are close contacts of pertussis cases is also an important part of prevention.



Tunneling to the Rondout," will focus on the construction of the East Delaware Tunnel, the 25-mile tunnel that carries water from the Pepacton Reservoir in Delaware County to the Rondout Reservoir in Ulster County.

Built between 1949 and 1955, this concrete-lined tunnel was blasted through bedrock from vertical shafts that were 1,600 feet deep at Lew Beach, and 965 feet deep at Willowemoc. Hundreds of men toiled in the tunnel, one of three that link Delaware System reservoirs (Pepacton, Neversink and Cannonsvile) with the Rondout, start of the Delaware Aqueduct, the longest continuous tunnel in the world. The Aqueduct transports mountain water for 84 miles to other reservoirs before it enters the distribution network just north of the City.


