

#### Remarks on Grand Opening of Neversink Park and Ball Field (From Pg. 1)

A decision was made to relocate the Little League fields onto another higher and dryer location. This decision was not made lightly. – after all City Field was a gem – a source of pride for the community, a place where memories were made for generations of Tri-Valley kids.

A search was undertaken for a large, flat, dry parcel that could accommodate ball fields in the town of Neversink. Not an easy task. We looked far and wide. We even ended up doing an aerial survey. The funny thing was, the perfect piece of land existed, but NY City DEP had already made a deal to purchase it. The Town told the City and the landowners, Jan and Charlie Van Nostrand of our situation. City Officials and Jan and Charlie, all graciously agreed to enter into a 3-way real estate purchase that ended up providing the Town with 16 flat acres and cementing our relationship with our

DEP neighbors. Many late night Town Board meetings, hundreds of hours of planning and engineering, and a detailed Stormwater Pollution Prevention Plan were the early steps that led to the vision of a new community park. One that has its roots with replacing the fields for the kids, but would also provide facilities for the entire Neversink community. For instance, early versions had always included a walking path around the site. And, I see the wisdom of that vision every day when I pass the park and see people enjoying the path.

Engineering was completed by Glenn Smith. Then site work commenced with excavating, leveling, and installation of the bio retention ponds completed by Howard Osterhout. The extensive fencing around the ballfields was completed by Ketchem Fencing. This beautiful Pavillion was framed by local contractor Mike Mckillson. Our own dedicated Highway Dept, led by Preston Kelly helped to finish the project with construction of the garage, the walking path, and almost all other matters.

In the Spring of 2016 close to 60 volunteers, including contractors and their equipment arrived to help plant the trees, shrubs, and flowers that you see here today. Sign post were set in place and the stone wall at our entrance was started. Our neighbors across the street commented to me that it looked like a small army had arrived. Seeing our community come together on that day remains one of the most inspiring memories I have had as Town Supervisor. One that I am sure will stay with me forever. Since that memorable day many other projects have been completed at the park. But, the biggest and most exciting thing started last Spring, the kids started playing ball.

During the course of this presentation some of you will be thanked more than once and some will regrettably be missed. Please forgive us. Dave Moore and Dominic Scanna will also say 'Thank yous', so between us, hopefully we will get to everyone. The Neversink Town Board would like to thank...

#### Fallen Owl Found - Orange County

On May 15, ECO Will Chomicki received a call from a farmer in the town of Chester. The caller had found a juvenile owl at the base of a tree where it had apparently fallen from the nest. The farmer was concerned the bird would end up in traffic and he could not tell if the animal was injured from the fall. With guidance from a wildlife rehabilitator, ECO Chomicki determined the bird was a juvenile

Great Horned Owl and did not appear to be injured. The owl was left on the property in a safe location. With the help of the local residents, ECO Chomicki constructed a temporary perch for the owl off the ground so the mother could tend to it.

The Great Horned Owl (Bubo virginianus), is the most common owl of the Americas. The Great Horned Owls are wide spread and have adapted to many different habitats. They are most often found in treed areas like forests, woodlands and shrub-

lands. It is easily recognizable because of the feather tufts on its head. These "plumicorns" resemble horns or, to some, catlike ears.

Owls have to turn their whole heads to look sideways because their large eyes focus only forward, being fixed in a bony socket called the sclerotic ring.

Adult Great Horned Owl The yellow eyes are surrounded by a facial disk of

stiff feathers that funnel sound into their ears. The flexible neck rotates the head 270 degree

The flexible neck rotates the head 270 degrees for a full panoramic vision. They are the perfect nocturnal hunters!

Great Horned Owls are large owls -- about 18 to 25

inches long and have a wingspan between 35-60 inches. Female and males look the same the male weighs about 3 pounds while the female weighs about 4 1/2.

Great Horned Owls likely mate for life, beginning at 2 years of age. They have large territories which they both defend from others of their species. The territories need to be large to provide an adequate hunting area. They nest in tree holes, stumps, caves, or in the abandoned nests of other large birds. Nesting occurs early in the spring, typically when the snow is still on the ground. The owls find a new nest each year since the young are so active that they virtually destroy their nests.

The female will lay one to five eggs (two is typical), both the male and female will help to incubate the eggs for about a month. The male also hunts for food. Owls are powerful birds and fiercely protective parents. The young owls are almost fully feathered and capable of short flights around eight weeks of age.

Great Horned Owls hunt by perching or gliding slowly high above the ground. When they spot prey, they dive down to the ground with wings folded. The prey is usually killed instantly when grasped by the owl's large, curved talons. Like other owls, the Horned Owl has an incredible digestive system. They sometimes swallow their prey whole and later regurgitate pellets composed of bone, fur, and the other unwanted parts of their meal.

They eat rodents, hares, squirrels, skunks, various birds such as geese, grouse, ducks and pigeons. They sometimes eat fish, large insects and scavenge road killed animals.

As Great Horned Owls are largely nocturnal, they can be difficult to spot. They can often be heard at dark just after sunset, or just before dawn, vocalizing with their well known series of "Hoo H'hoos!"

**District Fish Stocking Program** 

Once again it is time to think about stocking your pond with fish. The Sullivan County Soil & Water Conservation District is having their Annual Bass & Minnow Fish Stocking Program. If your pond seems to have excessive vegetation you may want to consider

grass carp.

> **Eyesores Being Torn Down Sullivan County Land Bank Kicks Off Program**

Monticello, NY - The Sullivan County Land Bank is beginning a series of demolitions and rehabilitations of blighted properties in Monticello this week, with more to come in both the County seat and the Village of Liberty.



"Today's kickoff marks a turning point in these villages and Sullivan County," affirmed Freda Eisenberg, Planning Commissioner and chair of the Land Bank Board of Directors. "Starting with two properties on High Street in the Village of Monticello, we are demolishing evesores and rehabbing other structures, in order to make these properties attractive to buyers who will use and maintain them.

Originally advanced by the Sullivan County Division of Planning and Community Development and initially approved by the Sullivan County Legislature, the Sullivan County Land Bank Corporation was authorized by Empire State Development in November 2016 and officially incorporated by New York State in February 2017. It is the 19th land bank approved in New York State.

The Corporation's mission is the lessening of the burdens of government by undertaking, promoting, and facilitating the return of vacant, abandoned, and tax-delinquent properties to productive use in order to eliminate the harms and liabilities caused by such properties and to combat community deterioration in the County. That includes real estate development and management, real estate project finance, and other community-based economic and human services development activities permissible under the Not-for-Profit Corporation Law. The Corporation may contract with other foreclosing governmental units within the County to achieve these purposes. It may also partner with other local and regional entities working on housing and community revitalization.

In September, the Land Bank will host a Sullivan Housing Summit to bring organizations together to share insights and information, and foster collaborations.

The County Legislature is expected to soon appoint further members to represent the villages of Monticello and



Democratic nomination is outstanding, but voters need to select the right person who can win in November, and this forum will provide the outlet we need towards making that important decision.'



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

A tummy ache got a meal of saltines and tea. If you were really sick, Dr. Gerde would be summoned to the house.

A gentleman in a suit carrying a doctor's black satchel would come to our bedside, take our temperature (you know where), make us stick out our tongue using a wooden tongue depressor, look down our throat, into our ears and up our nose. He would ask a few pertinent questions and utter a "Hmmmm." He then would use a very, very cold stethoscope to listen to our heart and lungs. 
enhancements and Main Street revitalization, they are working alongside community volun-teers to make a difference in their communities.


vide original narration.

Stewards to be Onsite Holidays and Weekends during

Spring and Summer 2018

The New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC), in coordination with the New York City Department of Environmental Protection (NYC DEP), the Catskill Center, and Rondout Neversink Stream Program, today announced a new stewardship program to aid in the preservation of the Peekamoose Blue Hole, a popular swimming hole located in the Sundown Wild Forest of the Catskill Park in the town of

Denning, Ulster County, during spring and summer 2018.

DEC Commissioner Basil Seggos said, "The Blue Hole is a unique and special place in New York and DEC is working to keep it that way for future generations. DEC encourages the use of our state lands, but after 'going viral' on the internet, this tiny area has been drawing up to 1,000 visitors a day. This is simply too much traffic for this postage stamp-sized area. Today's announcement complements the State's ongoing efforts to help preserve the Blue Hole and protect visitors while reducing trash, damage to vegetation and trees, and soil erosion. We want visiors to continue to enjoy this incredible resource safely and

responsibly for years to come."

The new stewardship program was developed to help protect natural resources, including water quality, while ensuring

public safety. Two stewards will be stationed at the trailhead of the Blue Hole to interact with visitors and provide information on how to enjoy the Blue Hole responsibly. The Adirondack Mountain Club is providing Leave No Trace training to the stewards in preparation for the summer season. Leave No Trace principles protect natural resources and help ensure a safe and enjoyable experience for visitors to natural areas like the Blue Hole.

In 2017, the Peekamoose Blue Hole was selected and nationally recognized as a Leave No Trace Hot Spot. Last August, Subaru/Leave No Trace Traveling Trainers spent a weekend at the Blue Hole to educate visitors about Leave No Trace principles. The successful weekend led to the creation of this year's summer stewardship program. DEC, NYC DEP, the Catskill Center, and Rondout Neversink Stream Program are providing \$42,000 to fund the program.

"Stewards will help to ensure the ecological health of the creek which is an important tributary to Rondout Reservoir and the water supply for more than 9.6 million New Yorkers, Paul Rush, Deputy Commissioner at the New York City Department of Environmental Protection. "We thank our partners at DEC, the Catskill Center, the Rondout Neversink Stream Program and the Adirondack Mountain Club for all of their support for this important work.

We believe that through partnerships, collaboration, and well implemented regulations, we can begin to address overuse issues throughout the Catskills. The Catskill Center sees our Peekamoose Blue Hole Stewards as the first step in that process at the Blue Hole and hope that it can become a model for the rest of the Catskills. We look forward to greeting visitors, helping those visitors responsibly enjoy the outdoors, and helping inspire a lifelong appreciation for the Catskill Park and Forest Preserve," said Jeff Senterman, Catskill Center Executive Director.

"The Adirondack Mountain Club (ADK) is pleased to provide Leave No Trace training for the Peekamoose Blue Hole stewards this season. ADK believes that Leave No Trace education is the best means of ensuring that the public learns its role in protecting the wilderness experience at the Blue Hole. ADK has previously provided Leave No Trace to all DEC staff responsible for protecting the Blue Hole. ADK is ready to provide additional LNT support for the Blue Hole stewards if needed this summer," said Neil F. Woodworth, Executive Director of

"Increasing people to people outreach to improve water quality is the goal," said Karen Rauter, Coordinator at Rondout Neversink Stream Program, which provided an education grant to help fund the stewards this summer.

On a busy summer weekend, about 1,000 people visit the Peekamoose Corridor and the three-quarter acre footprint of the Blue Hole. Over the past several years, the area has been drastically affected by the presence of large crowds on summer weekends. Increased visitation has resulted in severe impacts to the natural resource and posed a threat to public safety. Impacts include soil erosion, trampled vegetation, litter, food waste, human waste, pet waste, social trails, and wildlife impacts (bears).

This new stewardship program complements a DEC proposal released in March 2018 to establish a no-cost, day use permitting system that would require visitors to obtain a permit to access the Blue Hole on weekends and holidays from May 15 through October 15. This proposal is designed to allow DEC to strike a balance between ensuring State Lands are open and accessible to the public, reducing environmental damage, and enhancing public safety. DEC is currently reviewing public comments on the proposed permitting system that were submitted during the public comment period.

DEC is proposing the new permit system by amending the Peekamoose Valley Regulations, and as the regulations are finalized, DEC will share additional information about how to obtain permits with the public. Existing state regulations to

address overuse at the Blue Hole will remain in effect that:

\* Restrict hours that the area is open (except for the nearby designated camping area) to one half hour before sunrise to one half-hour after sunset;

\* Require the use of the portable restroom facilities for human

waste disposal and the dumpster for all other waste;

\* Prohibit camping, all fires (including charcoal fires, wood fires, gas grills, propane stoves or other portable stoves) and the use of portable generators (limited use of the above will be

allowed at the nearby designated camping area only);

\* Limit parking to designated parking areas (parking along the shoulder of the road is already prohibited by the Town and is a Tow Away Zone); and,

Prohibit glass containers, radios and other audio devices.

DEC encourages visitors to the Blue Hole to practice Leave No Trace principles. The Leave No Trace Center for Outdoor Ethics is a national nonprofit organization that protects the out-doors by teaching people how to enjoy it responsibly. 


