Neversink Renaissance is jumping back into the Sullivan County Renaissance competition in a big way. Our local community beautification program is seeking to beat out eight other local communities for a \$12,000 grand prize for its efforts at enhancing the appearance of the Town of Neversink. We are off to a terrific start. Cleanup Days

Two initial community garden cleanup days at the Town Hall, Bicentennial Park, First Aid Building, and Daniel Pierce Library/Time in the Valleys Museum brought out 74 volunteers on April 30th and 45 workers two weeks later. Our community youth organizations supplied a majority of the laborers big and small including the 4-H Puppy Pals, 4-H Incredibles, Boy Scout Troop 97, Cub Scout Pack 87, and the Tri-valley Junior FBLA. Our productivity was enhanced with the equipment and expertise from Ben Knight of Blooming Green Landscaping, Ric and Patrick Coombe of Thunderview Farms, Mike Garigliano and Gary TerBush resulting in two very productive clean up days.

Over the past four years our Town Board and the

Tri-Valley Little League have been working toward the replacement of the Little League Complex lost in the flooding of Hurricane Irene. As our new Town Park and ballfields near completion, Neversink Renaissance has rallied the troops to execute a landscape design created by Eve Minson and partially funded by Sullivan Renaissance. Jean Hampton Connell of Naples, Florida, and formerly of Frost Valley, Claryville, New York, died peacefully at the Avow Hospice in Naples, Florida on May 5, 2016. She was born Ida Jean Hampton on May 19, 1926 in Sylva, North Carolina, to Grinsfield Taylor Hampton, and Ida Victoria Jones Hampton, the fifth of six children. She attended Western Carolina Teachers College and earned B.A. degree from Lynchburg College in English in 1951. After a move to San Francisco, Jean worked in advertising for clients, including the Bank of America and Hewlett-Packard. She then moved to New York, where she worked at D'Arcy Advertising, for clients including RC Cola and Studebaker. She met Karl Connell, a lawyer, and they married in June 1965. They had a daughter, Gioia, in 1967, and moved shortly thereafter to Allentown, Pennsylvania, when Karl accepted a job as Vice President and

General Counsel of GAC Corporation.

While in Allentown, Jean became General Manager of the Ernest Steigler Advertising Agency. In 1970, Jean and family moved to Miami when GAC moved its headquarters there. From then until her retirement in 1989, Jean worked for several ad agencies in Miami, including as Traffic & Production Manager for Bishopric, Fielden & Green, and as General Manager of Grulich Koenig. In 1990 Jean and Karl moved to Karl's boyhood home in Frost Valley, New York. There Jean ran a rare and used book search service and volunteered at the Daniel Pierce Library. In 1995, she ran for Denning Town Clerk, but was defeated by one vote. Karl and Jean returned to Florida, this time to Naples, in December 2005, to live at Vi at Bentley Village. She enjoyed traveling the World and visited Scotland, Europe, Egypt, Morocco, Japan and the Caribbean. She was an accomplished cook and a proud feminist. The day after Billie Jean King defeated Bobby Riggs in 1973, she wore her white tennis outfit to the office. Then when she won the office pool on picking football winners three weeks in a row, the men protested she was consulting her husband, an ardent foot-ball fan. "Well," she said "You can consult your wives." She is survived by her husband of 51 years, Karl, her sisters Phyllis Blendowski and Ann Peters, her daughter Gioia Chilton, granddaughters Tabitha and Annabel Chilton and her stepson, Lawrence F. Connell, his wife Carolyn and their children Mollie and Benjamin Hovey

The next scene is an outhouse. This is an example of the facilities used by families before indoor plumbing became readily available. The history of this little building is an experience visitors will long

The next item to catch your eye is a full scale Holstein cow which is the center piece of the farm

#### **Household Hints**

Slow hardening of plaster

Want to keep your plaster pliable a bit longer to get it all smoothed out? Just add a couple of tablespoons of white vinegar to your plaster mix. It will slow down the hardening process to give you the extra time you need.

#### Jack or Jill?

Most plant species are hermaphtodites, with perfect (bisexual) flowers, but it is also common to have plants that have male and female flowers scattered on the same plant such as the ragweed.

What is unusual about the Jack-in-the-Pulpit (Arisaema triphyllum) is the plant has the ability to control how many male and female parts it produces. It has the ability to sexually express itself - male one year, female another, or monoecious (having both male and female reproductive organs) yet another year!

The plant is always the same plant, and does not change sex but it does change how its innate bisexuality is expressed, and at times is also vegetative

(reproduces asexually).

Wanting to remain 'politically correct' and not make any controversial statements about whether it is easier to be male or female, the fact is when times are good on the forest floor, 'Jack' turns into 'Jill' and when the going gets rough, 'Jill' turns back into 'Jack'.

Jack-in-the-pulpit,' is hermaphroditic. The plant begins as 'Jack', its male expression. After maturing past the seedling stage, the plant, in its male style, will produce male flowers on the spadix, the cylindrical reproductive structure commonly referred to as "Jack" that is buried deep inside the pulpit that is covered by the hooded spathe (sheathing bract enclosing the flower). The musty-smelling spadix attracts fungus gnats that enter through an opening in the base of the spathe and move up and down the spadix gathering pollen from the male flowers.

In the male plants the spathe that wraps around the spadix to form the pulpit doesn't quite meet at the base and thus leaves a small exit hole. Fungus gnats that go

to a male plant eventually do get out, carrying with them a few pollen grains. If they are then attracted to a female, their fate is different. In the female plants the spathe has no exit hole and the fungus gnats are trapped and thrash around indefinitely depositing pollen from a previous visit to a male plant to the waiting female flowers on the spadix. For all its obvious style, it is not a very efficient plan. Only a few flowers are fertilized on each female plan that will

be transformed into a berry cluster from one to a few seeds.


The Jack-in-the-pulpit plant grows slowly in the dark shaded layer of vegetation beneath the main canopy of a forest. A small young plant may accumulate only enough energy during the course of the summer to put forth another set of leaves the following year. It takes a few years for the plant to accumulate enough stored energy to produce a flower. Male flowers use up only a moderate amount of energy. They are temporary structures designed to produce pollen and do not cause much of a drain on the plant's energy. After several seasons of producing male flowers the plant will get larger and produce a spadix with a mixture of male and female flowers. The female flowers and the resulting berries will cost the plant a great deal in terms of energy. A female plant which has had a bad year and does not have enough energy stored at the end of the growing season to support a female flower the following year may produce a male flower or perhaps no flower at all. This process is again reversible, so that after a few good years the plant may again produce female flowers.

Finally, after many more years of accumulation of energy, the plant may produce a spadix that contains only female flowers. A plant may be twenty years old before it produces only female flowers. In undisturbed sites the average life of a Jack-in-the-pulpit may reach 100 years!

This plasticity makes it possible for the plants to adapt to changes in their environment allowing them to not be locked in on a particular stimuli that they may not have the resources to support the plant.

In other words, each plant optimizes its chance to contribute to the next generation of Jack-in-the-Pulpits by making a developmental decision about what kind of flower to produce the following year.


In the end, the strategy of this logical order ensures more successful reproduction. In a stressed environment, the Jack-in-the-Pulpit conserves its energy allowing Jacks to boast that he can tough out the bad times. However, when the male plants have browned and wilted along with the other plants of the autumn forest floor, Jill will steal the show with her display of bright red berries that encourages birds and other wild animals to disperse her seed that will become the next generation.


#### Mysterious Book Report No. 244

Once the envy of the entire world soon after the millennium, the Celtic Tiger has died in Ken Bruen's 2013 novel *Purgatory*, (Mysterious Press, \$24.00, 278 pages, ISBN 978-0-8021-2607-8) and been replaced with an Ireland that can only be described as circling the economic drain. With jobs non-existent, crime is rampant, the young professionals are emigrating and real estate has sunk to such low prices that vulture investors are busy buying distressed property from the near bankrupt lending institutions as fast as the paperwork is finished. In Galway, an outcast Jack Taylor has physically healed from the wounds that left him deaf, limping and missing two fingers. He's trying to move on with his life, to make the most of his remaining time on earth and exorcise the triple demons of alcohol, tobacco and prescription painkillers that've tormented him for most of his days. He's moved and changed his habits as well as his old haunts in a heartfelt attempt to make the changes stick, but Galway isn't big enough for a man as notorious as Taylor to find anonymity.

Someone's always recognizing the irascible, long-suffer-



ing, ever perspicacious detective and beseeching him to take on their anguishing case, or reopening old wounds with "Hey aren't you the one who . . ."
Taylor's reply is always short and to the point: "I don't care." But when a vigilante starts to systematically murder the city's low-lifes, and leaves enigmatic notes signed C33 taunting Jack to 'join the fun' and help cleanse the gene-pool . . . he can't ignore the case. Nor can he ignore the fact that his celebrity causes an eccentric billionaire who's in the process of buying most of Galway on the cheap to seek him out for all the wrong reasons. Taylor's life begins spinning out of control again as his legions of personal demons, both past and present, threaten to push him into a well of darkness that has no bottom



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

Creativity is not the only thing flowing at the school house on Tuesdays. Generosity is flowing just as strong and they need the community's help to keep it flowing. In addition to being a fabulous scrapper, one of the group's members, Judy Merone, also volunteers at HONOR, an organization in Middletown that reaches out and helps the homeless in our area. With Judy's help the Valley Scrappers and Stampers are doing a drive for HONOR. According to Judy's daughter, Lisa Stivers, who works for HONOR, their needs are great, "We serve a lot of people in need through street outreach to the homeless, the Warming Station, The Homeless Shelter, and The Housing First Program. We are based in Middletown but serve the entire county. Our programs include:

Street Outreach is just as it sounds we do outreach to places that people who are homeless gather (soup kitchens, libraries, etc) as well as find where people are living who are homeless (tent communities, abandon buildings, cars etc) and try to engage them in services bringing them in off the street. Many have needs in addition to housing, such as medical or mental health care and we try to help them address that as well.

The Warming Station is housed in a church in Middletown (several municipalities have them) it is a warm place for homeless individuals to spend the night indoors, eat, clean up and rest. It is open from

November through April.

Homeless shelter houses on a temporary basis men, women and children who find themselves homeless. They are not only provided shelter, but also case management services to assist with any needs medical, psychiatric, financial, or more tangible needs like clothing, diapers etc. The goal is to have them housed in stable

housing within 90 days.

Housing First is a national model that finds people who are chronically homeless or long term homeless (years) living on the streets or in places not meant for human habitation, engages with them and brings them into housing. The ultimate goal being stabilization (medically and financially) and a slow move toward independence by taking over their own rent and expenses. We moved someone in that was living in a tent for over 15 years and he now has financial stability through Social Security and a small job, his medical issues were addressed for the first time in many years and he feels better, his apartment is immaculate and he is doing well. We are looking over the next few months to transition him out to full independence. All of the programs have different needs for donations. The one common need is personal care items. The warming station and street outreach can use new socks, winter hats/gloves, and go snacks like granola bars. Housing First can use pots/pans, dishes, and really any household items that you would need to start up an apartment like towels, cleaning supplies etc. We do not get funding for all the start up items for each apartment."

In an attempt to help HONOR help the homeless in our area, the Valley Scrappers and Stampers are asking for personal care items (shampoo, conditioner, shaving cream, soap, etc.), new socks, winter hats/gloves, go snacks like granola bars, and household items that needed to start up an apartment like towels, cleaning sup-plies, pots, pans, dishes, glasses, etc. to be dropped off at the school house on Mondays or Tuesdays. 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
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#### How To Spend Money Op-Ed Number 2

flowers and birthday gifts are good examples.

The third way to spend is much less efficient because: You spend someone else's money for your benefit. So, for example when my young friend Dillon spends his Mother and Dad's money on a new computer, he's only concerned with getting the most whiz-bang, turbocharged high-tech model on the market. Value isn't as important as features in this instance, because he got the cash without an investment of personal time or labor.

The last . . . and least efficient . . . way to spend money: You spend someone else's money for someone else's benefit. Again, for emphasis. The poorest, least efficient way to spend money is when, You spend someone else's money for someone else's benefit. This describes just one thing: Government Spending. Your tax dollars are mere fun tickets for politicians and bureaucrats. Washington, D.C. is like a carnival run by a confederacy of kleptomaniacs with an unlimited supply of black molly, free liquor, and an utter contempt for anyone who's not part of their inner circle. It's a place where the more fun tickets one has, the more fun one can have, a place where the opportunities for personal gain are endless, because the corruption runs so deep. Is it any wonder then, that those clowns have spent \$20,000,000,000,000 (twenty trillion) of our money that they don't possess. . . money they've borrowed . . . money which if it were paid back at the rate of one dollar every second would take 640 thousand years to repay. #### DEP to Host Fourth Annual Family Fishing Day at Ashokan Reservoir

The New York City Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) announced today that it will host the fourth annual Family Fishing Day at Ashokan Reservoir on Sunday, June 12. The event is co-sponsored by the state Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC), which will supply fishing poles and bait to those who do not have their own. As part of the "I Fish NY Program," the New York State fishing license requirement is waived for adults who would like to participate in this event. In addition, DEP and DEC staff will be available to teach beginners how to fish. Ashokan Reservoir is home to many different species of fish, including smallmouth and largemouth bass, yellow and white perch, yellow and brown bullhead, sunfish, and trout.

The event will happen from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. at the Woodstock Dike on Ashokan Reservoir. A parking lot at the dike is located on a gravel drive-way off Route 28, just east of the West Hurley Post Office. A sign will be posted at the end of the driveway to help participants find the lot. If adults do not have a free DEP access permit, applications will be available on the day of the event, or a permit can easily be obtained and printed online by going to the DEP website at: nyc.gov/dep/accesspermit. More information can also be obtained by emailing watershedevents@dep.nyc.gov, or by calling DEP at (800) 575-LAND.

In addition, DEP has a robust capital program with nearly \$14 billion in investments planned over the next 10 years that will create up to 3,000 construction-related jobs per year. Bill Designating Portions of the State Highway System in UC to Fallen Local Veteran Passes Assembly

A bill to name a portion of State Route 32 and 9W in Ulster County in honor of a fallen soldier has passed the State Assembly. Assemblymember Kevin A. Cahill announced today that A9028-B was overwhelmingly approved on Thursday, June 2. The measure calls for designating a portion of State Route 32 and 9W in Ulster County as the "Private First Class Douglas Cordo Memorial Highway."

Private First Class Douglas L. Cordo was a resident of Kingston, New York. He joined the United States Army in March 2010 and was only 20 years old when he died in Zabul, Afghanistan on August 19, 2011. An improvised explosive device detonated while his unit patrolled the Zabul Province village of Shah Joy. This legislation was introduced at the request of his family and friends. Douglas Cordo was a 2009 Kingston High School graduate and attended Ulster County Community College before joining the Army.

"It's a tragedy to lose someone so young. Doug was a friend to many and thoroughly loved to make people laugh, especially children," Cahill said. "He had his whole life ahead of him and though he knew the risk he was taking, Doug Cordo gave his life for the greater good of mankind. I am honored to be a sponsor of this legislation and I am proud to report its passage. Our entire community and state are grateful to PFC Cordo and his family for his ultimate sacrifice."

The bill is on the Senate's third reading calendar and is expected to move forward before the end of session, which is scheduled for June 16. From there the legislation will be sent to the Governor's office and is expected to be signed into law.
