The Little World of Snails

I was not too enthusiastic about wanting to take my weekly nature walk last week out in the cold rain. Instead I just wanted to curl up in front of the wood stove. However, going out to get some wood for the fire, led me to find the subject of this week's Nature Column! Near the bottom of the woodpile, I found a cluster of garden snails on the ground, under a piece of

> wet wood who still ha not come out of their winter hibernation, or perhaps – retreated!

The garden snail is one of the best-known species of snails in the world and is one of the most prolific terrestrial mollusks. As all terrestrial (land) snails, it is a gastropod mollusk. It is an airbreathing snail, which has a sin-

gle lung. These little garden snails have a brownish soft body, which is usually covered with slimy mucus. They have yellow or cream-colored shells with brown spiral stripes. When a snail is old enough, a lip is formed at the edge of the shell aperture. The shell of most garden snails is less than 1".

The garden snail has a flat muscular organ called a foot that assists it to move with a gliding motion helped by the release of a mucus that reduces friction on a rough surface. This mucus often leaves a noticeable wet trace of slime where the snail has been.

Garden snails generally are active during nights or early mornings when the sun is not shinning, and dur-

ing cloudy or rainy days.

Garden snails are herbivorous and feed on several kinds of fruit trees, garden plants, crop vegetables, some cereals and weeds. Snails have several jaws on the roof of their mouth. The mouth of a garden snail is beneath its tentacles. It has a toothed ribbon called the radula, which is used to fragment its food. Scientists use the different shapes and arrangements of these tiny teeth to identify snails. This structure is unique to mollusks.

Land snails have four feelers, two long and two

short, with eyes on the ends of the long ones.

Like other gastropod mollusks, garden snails are hermaphroditic, meaning they have both male and female reproductive organs. Each individual snail of reproductive age is capable of laying eggs. While they are able to self-fertilize, snails will typically choose to mate with a partner, a process that takes 4 to 12 hour and usually includes the exchange of a love dart, a kind of calcareous arrow with a purpose scientists still don't understand.

During the mating process they fertilize each other. They lay their eggs three to six days after fertilization. The snall will shovel dirt with its muscular foot to build a nest for its eggs. Snails lay between 30 and 120 eggs at one time. The eggs are white and approximately 1/8 inch in diameter. Most snails lay eggs in jelly masses. You can clearly see babies moving around in their capsules. Other snails bear live young complete with shell that crawl away immediately.

Gardens snails are able to deliver up to six batches of eggs in a single year. Each newborn, will take one to

two years to mature.

Garden snails or brown snails, are often considered common pests to plants of all kinds. While their soft bodies and slow movements make them appear benign, garden snails are adept at eating plants of all kinds and can become a nuisance in a garden.

You can control snail populations in your yard with several methods. Place copper bands around tree trunks and plant containers. Copper has an electric charge which shocks the snail's slimy body if it tries to cross it. Remove snail hiding places such as boards,

debris and brush from your yard. Despite the slime and all, they are actually cute little crifters that often made their way into our home when I was growing up. Just before we closed up our summer home in Sundown, my Mother and I would gather moss, little plants and a few snails to bring back home where we would put together a lovely terrarium that would remind us of Sundown all winter long. 



A Song of Shadows, opens with a severely wounded Charlie Parker looking for a peaceful and remote place to rest and recuperate as he recovers from the gunshots which nearly killed him. With the help of his two sinister pals - Louis and Angel - he takes a summer lease on a beach front house in northern Maine . . . in a town named Boreas. There, Parker meets Ruth Winter and her daughter Amanda. She's about the same age as Samantha, his six year old who lives with her mother, and visits him on weekends. At first it appears Boreas will be the ideal place to rehab, and Parker takes daily walks along the beach, trying to make it a little bit farther each day as his health improves. But the town harbors secrets it will kill to protect, and Ruth Winter conceals a past she's afraid of . . . almost as much as she's afraid of Parker. When a mans body washes up on the beach however, it sets in motion a chain of events that threaten many lives - including Charlie Parker's - as old atrocities are unearthed, an entire family is murdered in a nearby town, and the ghosts of six million Holocaust victims linger in the background. In spite of objections by some of the local police, Parker feels compelled to get involved . . . even though he's debilitated and still seriously wounded. Although mysterious enemies are trying to move against him, Parker remains formidable . . . no matter the circumstances.

As he always manages to do, Connolly blends noir and horror together into an awesome, well-researched and totally entertaining read that concludes with a chilling revelation and prediction, which promises that more Charlie Parker adventures are coming. I can't wait! And FYI, the other two of my personal three best John Connolly novels: 2005s The Black Angel and 2012s The Wrath of Angels. Both are unforgettable.

Comes to the Laundry King


Local artists take a "bare bones" approach to

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
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The Olive Jar - By Carol LaMonda

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

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Local Health Department's Zika Virus Response

Like many other county health departments, Sullivan County Public Health Services is taking a proactive approach to Zika virus. On March 17, 2016, New York State's Health Commissioner Dr. Howard Zucker declared the Zika Virus an imminent threat to public health and directed local health departments in the Hudson Valley, including Sullivan County, to develop and submit Zika response plans. These plans outline actions that local health departments are taking to provide health education information to the public, coordinate information to health care providers, conduct human surveillance and testing, develop communication plans, provide public information on habitat control to prevent mosquito breeding, prevention, and plans for mosquito trapping, testing and surveillance. Sullivan County Public Health Services has been working on implementing aspects of its plan since March in coordination with the New York State Department of Health and its community partners.

The Zika virus disease is spread to people through the bite of an Aedes mosquito infected with the Zika virus. These mosquitoes are aggressive daytime biters but can also bite at night. They can live indoors and outdoors. Zika virus outbreaks have occurred in Africa, Southeast Asia, the Pacific Islands, and the Americas.

To date there have NOT been any locally acquired or travel related cases of human Zika virus infection identified in Sullivan County.





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The most common symptoms of Zika virus disease are fever, rash, joint pain, and conjunctivitis (red eyes). Additional symptoms may include headache, muscle pain, pain behind the eyes, and vomiting. Symptoms can begin 2 to 7 days during or within 4 weeks after being bitten and last from several days to a week. If you have travelled to an area with ongoing

Zika transmission you should see your health care provider if symptoms begin. There currently is no vaccine or medications

to prevent or treat Zika. Zika virus can be spread from a pregnant mother to her unborn child, and is associated with reports of increased cases of a certain birth defect, called microcephaly. The Center for Disease Control is advising that pregnant women abstain from sex, or use condoms consistently for all sexual activities for the duration of her pregnancy if her male partner has travelled to, or lives in an area with active Zika transmission. Pregnant women should consider postponing travel to areas where Zika is ongoing, and if travel is necessary should talk to their health care provider. New York State Department of Health is providing Žika prevention kits for pregnant women. To order call New York State Department of Health Zika Informational

Helpline at 1-888-364-4723. New York State Department of Health is offering Free Zika virus testing. Consult with your healthcare provider if: you have above symptoms and have traveled to any of the active mosquito-borne transmission affected areas; are pregnant and have traveled to affected areas; if you are pregnant and have a sex partner that has traveled to the affected areas; persons that have traveled to affected areas and have developed Guillain-Barre syndrome; or have an infant with microcephaly born to women that have traveled while pregnant to

To avoid mosquito bites follow these preventative measures: Wear long sleeve shirts and pants while outdoors; Stay



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indoors when mosquitoes are most active; Use repellant products registered with the EPA; Do not overuse repellant - only apply as much as needed for protection; Read and follow label directions before using any kind of repellant.

As the weather gets warmer, to control the mosquito population (in general) around your house or business you can take these steps: Once a week, empty and scrub, turn over, cover, or throw out items that hold water, such as buckets, tires, planters, toys, pools, flowerpots and trash containers; If these mosquito breeding containers cannot be emptied out, use a mosquito dunk kit; Free mosquito Dunk kits are available for the public by calling 1-888-364-4723; Tightly cover water storage containers to prevent mosquitoes from laying their eggs in them; Use screens on windows and doors and repair any holes to help keep mosquitoes out of your home; use air conditioning whenever possible

The NAMI Family-to-Family course is a twelve week, comprehensive educational opportunity for families to learn more about mental illness as well as coping strategies and find out more about local resources. NAMI Peer-to-Peer is a twelve week course geared toward people who themselves have been diagnosed with a mental illness. Learn more about the illnesses, medications, coping strategies and local resources. NAMI In Our Own Voice is a 90-minute presentation - available to any group - learn from men and women whose lives were interrupted by mental illness, but who are now role models for hope and recovery.

NAMI of Sullivan County, NY is funded in part by the New York State Office of Mental Health and provides a Compeer (companion/peer) program locally. Caring community volun-teers are matched in one-to-one friendships with men and women who are living with mental illness. They spend a few hours each month together, doing activities they both enjoy - and through each other they both become better people.

NAMI Sullivan also offers a Suicide Bereavement Group which meets monthly in Monticello. The group is open to anyone who has lost a loved one to Suicide - whether recently, or years

ues August 6, 13, 20 and 27.


Tuition for each student is \$10 per class, or \$65 for an eight-class Session. Old Stone House members get a 20% discount.

Folk Music Legend Happy Traum at **Tusten Theatre**



On Saturday, May 14 at 8 pm, Woodstock's own folk music legend Happy Traum shares songs, stories, and images from the 1960s Greenwich Village music scene. His show, titled "Coming of Age in the Greenwich Village Folk Revival and the Woodstock Scene (1954 - 1971)," includes tales of music and friendship with Bob Dylan, Pete Seeger, and Brownie McGhee.

With colorful anecdotes and incisive memories, and the aid of vintage photos and music clips, Traum relates some of his adventures as an active member of the New York folk revival, his arrest for civil disobedience, his participation in what has become known as the "Great Folk Singer's Riot" in Washington Square, and his friendships with some of the lead-

ing folk artists of the day.

Traum was a regular in the Washington Square Park jam sessions, studied blues guitar with Brownie McGhee, and met, among many others, a young Bob Dylan. His group. The New World Singers, were the first to perform and record "Blowin' in the Wind" and "Don't Think Twice," and Dylan wrote the liner notes for The New World Singers' Atlantic Records album. Traum recounts his later friendship with the Dylan family in Woodstock, NY, as well as his association with Allen Ginsberg, George Harrison, Pete Seeger, and Dave Van Ronk.

Traum punctuates his remembrances with powerful renditions of songs and guitar solos from the "folk era" and beyond.

Doors open at 7:30 pm and showtime is 8 pm; a wine bar is available before the performances.

(From Pg. 1) James Gregston Greer, better known as Greg, is a life-long resident of Walker Valley. He has a passion for traveling and has been to Botswana, Zambia, Zimbabwe, South Africa, Aruba, Milano, Greece, and Turkey. He is a retiree from the New York State Corrections Department where he worked as a vocational supervisor and an instructor of masonry for 30 years. He has also been a New York State Fire Instructor for 44 years and a Town of Shawangunk Building Inspector for 3 years. As a NYS Fire Instructor he teaches courses such as: Firefight I and II (Basic firefighting skills Rope Rescue, Auto Extrication and Confined Spaced Rescue) in Fire Departments throughout Ulster County. He also taught Confined Space Rescue in Attica, Orange, Dannemore and Eastern Correctional Facilities. Greg has devoted his life to his community and works on numerous local projects and initiatives, including Driver Safety Awareness and helping found Verdeerkill Park in Shawangunk. He continues to be active in the Walker Valley Fire Department and serves on the Ulster County Fire Advisory Board. His neighbors and friends call Greg an "old fashioned go-to guy" who continues to help those in his community and beyond.

Barbara Sarah is a resident of Kingston, New York. She was born in Brooklyn, New York and has lived in New York State her entire life. She received her high school diploma, undergraduate and Master's degrees in New York City. She worked as a school social worker on Long Island for 20 years. A breast cancer survivor since 1992, she began her second career as an Oncology Social Worker at the Health Alliance Hospital in Kingston. She organized and created the first breast cancer support group known as the Oncology Support Program (OSP) which serves all cancer patients. From 2000 to 2005, as a nationally recognized expert, she served as a consultant to the U.S. Department of Defense in evaluating proposals for funding innovative breast cancer treatments. In 2004, she won the New York State Governor's Award for Innovation in Breast Cancer Research and Education. In 2007, she received the Lifetime Achievement Award from the New York Chapter of the National Association of Social Workers. Barbara has spent decades serving her community as an oncology social worker, counselor, teacher and mentor and has helped numerous cancer survivors improve their lives and achieve their highest potential. She continues to serve cancer patients and their families with generosity and compassion.

Both award winners were recognized in Albany on May 10th as part of New York State Recognition Day.

Nominations are sent to the County Executive's Office for the Aging Advisory Council from numerous groups in order to make selections. An Advisory Council Selection Committee chooses two senior citizens for the awards based on the significance of their contributions to the community.

Senator Bonacic Extends Heartfelt Thanks to State and Local First Responders Who Battled the Sam's Point Wildfire

(Middletown, NY)-State Senator John J. Bonacic (R/C/I-Mt. Hope) extended his heartfelt thanks, today, to state and local first responders who battled the Sam's Point Wildfire in Ulster County. The fire began on Saturday April 23rd, and was declared 100 percent contained on Thursday April 28th. It consumed over 2,000

acres of forest in the Sam's Point Preserve.

Volunteer firefighters from 91 departments in Ulster, Greene, Sullivan, Dutchess, Delaware, and Orange counties, helped battled the blaze. These local fire companies were joined in the response by, the New York State Police, the State Department of Environmental Conservation, the State Office of Parks Recreation and Historic Preservation, the State Office Fire Prevention and Control, and the State Office of Emergency Management.

"I want to extend my deepest appreciation to the men and women who have courageously battled this wildfire," said Senator Bonacic. "Through their tireless efforts, and heroic actions, no lives were lost during this event. I want to single out all of the volunteer fire companies who went above and beyond the call of duty. Their selfless sacrifice was on display again, as many of them spend extended time away from their jobs, and families. I would also like to extend my thanks to the Governor for all of the State resources that were brought to bear during this wildfire."

\$20 M - A Profitable Relationship Relying On Not-For-Profits To Deliver Needed Services

Last year Ulster County contracted with 185 regional Not-For-Profit (NFP) organizations to provide a myriad of services including sheltering the homeless, coordinating volunteer services for seniors and providing foster care for children. In a great many of these cases the organizations assist the County in carrying out numerous mandated functions and fill a meaningful void in the advocacy and human services sector. In 2015 Ulster County spent in excess of \$20 million with portion of the local costs being shared by both Federal and State governments. Ulster County Comptroller Elliott Auerbach explained that the large investment of tax payer dollars was just one of the reasons for the review. Auerbach indicated that "a recent County Legislature approval of twenty-eight foster care contracts potentially encumbering the County for up to \$24 million and the discovery of one of those contractors having its group care license revoked has led the auditing team to commence a multi-part review of the need, finances and accountability of several of the larger Not-For- Profit providers. This process will be ongoing with follow up reports being published over the course

of the next few months," the Comptroller stated.

The first report, a 2016 Not-For-Profit Snapshot Review, begins with highlighting five providers who during the past three years have been paid collectively over \$21 million. Ulster County Rails and Trails Ulster & Delaware (U&D) Corridor **Fact Sheet**

In December of 2015, the Ulster County Legislature voted unanimously to adopt a comprehensive plan that allows for tourist train operations to remain in the City of Kingston and Phoenicia areas. This plan also supports the County's efforts to create a world class rail trail system from the Ashokan Reservoir to the Walkway Over the Hudson. This provides for the best of both worlds with respect to rail and trail initiatives.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

Q: Will tourist trains be able to run in the City of

Kingston in the future?

A: Yes. The County plan allows for train operations between the Kingston Plaza and Route 28A in the Town of Hurley. This 4.5 mile segment is two miles longer than last year's "Polar Express" run, allowing for additional track to potentially extend this and other popular theme train rides.

Q: Is the County suing the Catskill Mountain

Railroad (CMRR)?

A: No. The County never sued CMRR. The County issued a Notice of Default to CMRR in 2013 for not fulfilling requirements of its lease. CMRR responded by suing the County. A settlement was ultimately reached in April 2016 which included CMRR's support of the County's comprehensive plan. It also required CMRR to address many of the issues highlighted in the Notice of Default. CMRR, along with other tourist rail operators, is encouraged to apply for future operations.

Why can't we build "rail with trail" the entire length from Kingston to Highmount?

 A: Building rail alongside trail the entire length of the U&D Corridor is not feasible. In fact, it has proven impossible to re-establish rail operations alone over the entire 38-mile Corridor due to decades of severe deterioration and damage. Additionally, the U&D Corridor is narrow and was constructed in some areas just wide enough for a single train to pass. This Corridor is often bordered by wetlands, steep slopes, rock cuts, and even buildings on adjacent properties. Constructing a multi-use trail that is accessible (compliant with ADA standards) would require widening of the existing Corridor, which was determined to be virtually impossible due to topography, environmental concerns, significant costs, impacts to adjacent properties and permitting issues. It is important to note there are multiple segments identified by the County Legislature where rail with trail could exist and those areas are included in the comprehensive plan.

Why did the CMRR have to leave the Cornell

Street rail yard in Kingston?

A: The Cornell Street rail yard was not part of CMRR's lease. Also, as part of the settlement agreement CMRR has moved its trains and other equipment in order to allow for the evaluation and cleanup of potentially hazardous environmental conditions. The County has also begun the design of a linear park from the former rail yard to Kingston Plaza, which will provide a safe pedestrian trail link between Midtown neighborhoods and stores and services, including a major supermarket. It will also provide much-needed recreational park space to adjacent neighborhoods now lacking convenient access to open spaces and parks.

Q: How will Ulster County pay for rail trail construction?

A: Over the past few years, Ulster County has secured over \$9.1 million in grant funding to assist in the con-On the U&D Corridor, NYC Department of Environmental Protection will provide \$2.5 million and has also agreed to construct three trailheads at its expense including facilities and parking at the Ashokan Reservoir. The County has also secured \$2.6 million from New York State toward additional construction on the U&D Corridor.



Reestablishing Peace Through Strength

Dear Friend,

As a veteran, it has been a great honor for me to serve on the House Armed Services Committee, working with my colleagues and their staff to craft legislation that gives our troops the resources they need to defend our cherished way of life, care for their families, and live life to the fullest following

their military service.

I am pleased to report the Fiscal Year 2017 Defense Policy Bill adopted by the committee last week includes legislation I authored called the Protecting Our Security Through Utilizing Right-Sized End-Strength (POSTURE) Act of 2016, which was co-sponsored by 53 Members of Congress from both parties. This bill stops the planned drawdown of U.S. Land Forces to the lowest level since before World War II. Unfortunately, our ability to maintain peace through strength has steadily eroded after years of repeat deployments, unease among our allies, and misguided cuts that reduced combat readiness.

With emerging threats around the world, today's security environment is too dangerous to shrink our military. The drawdown of our Army and Marine Corps, which is based on dated strategic guidance, hampers our ability to deter our enemies, deploy troops in response to natural disasters and global health crises, and provide adequate support for troops and military families coping with PTSD and

related conditions.

For perspective, our Land Forces have gone from approximately 1.24 million Soldiers and Marines the day before 9/11 to approximately 1.38 million at the height of the Global War on Terror. Under the Administration's plan, the size of these forces would fall to approximately 1.19 million in 2018. The POSTURE Act, which is paid for with dedicated funding in the Defense Policy Bill that was finalized last week, calls for a Land Forces total of approximately 1.25 mil-

lion Soldiers and Marines.

The Defense Policy Bill also includes initiatives I authored to enhance the readiness of the Global Response Force (the nation's first responders to global threats), provide troops with professional certifications that translate to the civilian workforce, and require the placement of current or former enlisted members of the Armed Forces on any panel charged with making changes to personnel policies. The bill also authorizes a 2.1% pay raise for members of the military, provides more Congressional oversight of suicide prevention programs, permits spaceavailable flights on military aircraft for disabled veterans, and institutes reforms to see that military service dogs are properly cared for when they are retired from active service.

I want to thank my staff for their hard work and the many veterans who offered their guidance and advocacy during this process. We will continue our engagement across the House and Senate to see that

these initiatives are signed into law.

As you know, this is my final year in Congress. We are working hard to finish strong, focusing on casework and several constituent-driven bills, including legislation in support of Navy veterans who were sickened by Agent Orange. Our top priorities also include advancing bills that combat Lyme disease and tick-borne illnesses and improve conditions for farmers and small business owners across Upstate New York.

This week, I look forward to meeting with constituents at the SUNY Cobleskill Student Veterans Association Dinner, the Delaware County Chamber of Commerce Dinner, the Project Long Beard Wounded Warriors Lunch in Claverack, and the Military Order of the Purple Heart Annual National Convention in Albany. These are important opportunities for me to hear how I can be help-

ful to our communities.

I truly believe that this is an exceptional country and our best days are still in front of us. Thank you for the opportunity to serve!

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
