Tri Valley Central School will be the focus of attention on May 20th at 8:15 pm for those who enjoy vocal and symphonic music. In addition to the musical program, the Adult Education Department is sponsoring an exhibit of the work of local artists. The Tri-Valley area is justly proud of its two adult musical organizations, the Grahamsville Choral Society and the Grahamsville Symphony Orchestra, which will perform. The Choral Society has entertained the public for the past ten years and the Symphony has appeared for five consecutive seasons. These performances have brought pleasure to audiences in great numbers. The Adult Art class will exhibit paintings as part of this program. Two of our local artists have taken prizes at the Monticello Art Show. Displays of ceramics, driver training equipment, citizen training materials and household arts will complete the exhibition. In spite of the array of talent and art, there will be no charge for admissions. Doors will open at 7:30 pm.

The Town Board at a special meeting held May 12th voted unanimously to purchase the Moses Kortright lot located near Krum's Store, at a cost of \$2500. Purchase of the property has been considered for several months. The serious need for a Town Clerk's office, Justice Court Room and Public poling place, prompted the board to take this action. Over a period of several years the Town has accumulated \$25,000 for building purposes. This will eliminate the need for a bond issue or additional tax. The question of building will very likely be brought so referendum this fall at the General Election.

The Post Office Department is seeking an improved building for operations of the Grahamsville, New York Post Office. Postmaster General Winton M. Blount announced last week. A building approximately 960 square feet is sought for the operation. It should be in the general vicinity of the present post office.

Red Hill Fire Tower Appreciation Luncheon

(From Pg. 1) Volunteers enjoyed food, refreshments, and some well deserved recognition. The Red Hill Fire Tower is staffed by volunteers on weekends from mid-spring to early fall. Their presence provides visitors with a complete experience, from opening the cabin and top of the tower to answering questions about its history. The volunteers also help maintain the tower, from painting it to clearing brush from the trail and many other projects. It is a labor of love for the volunteers. Without their help, the Red Hill Fire Tower would simply not be what it is today.

The Red Hill Fire Tower was built in 1921, and stands at an elevation of 2990 feet. It is 60 feet tall and has nine flights of stairs. It was originally staffed by Fire Tower Observers, who were equipped with an alidade, map, binoculars, and radio to call in the location of smoke to a Forest Ranger. Beginning in the 1980's, the State of New York began phasing out the use of fire towers for spotting forest fires. The Red Hill Fire Tower was the last one staffed in the Catskills, closing in 1990. Early in 1997, a grassroots effort was made to save the towers. The Catskill Fire Tower Project was born as a joint initiative of The Catskill Center for Conservation & Development and DEC. The Red Hill Fire Tower was reopened for public visitation in 2000, and is listed on the National Historic Lookout Register. It is one of five fire towers that remain in the Catskill Park.

The Red Hill Fire Tower offers tremendous views in every direction, but particularly of the Catskill High Peaks. It is a moderate 1.5-mile hike each way and approximately 900 feet of elevation gain on the yellow marked trail from the parking area on Coons / Dinch Road in the town of Denning, Ulster County. Visitors can hike to the tower year round, but the cabin and top of the tower are only open when volunteers are present. The volunteer season this year is on weekends and holidays from May 25 - Oct 14, usually from 10am - 4pm. To volunteer, please contact Doug Hamilton or Tammy Porter at redhillfiretower@gmail.com.

Don't Understimate a Dandelion

With all the cold dreary rainy days, you must admit that bright yellow dandelions are a pleasant sight!

Whether you love them or hate them, dandelions are among the most familiar plants in the northern hemisphere. Just about anyone can identify a dandelion at a glance. The Dandelion (Taraxacum officinale) is a hardy perennial that can



perennial that can grow to a height of nearly 12 inches. Each bloom is made up of numerous strap-shaped florets of bright golden yellow. This strap-shaped corolla is notched at the edge into five teeth, each tooth, a petal, narrows down into a claw-like tube, which rests on a single-chambered

ovary containing a single ovule where the Dandelion produces considerable quantities of both pollen and nectar in the early spring. No matter how cool the weather may be the Dandelion continues to produce a small succession of flowers until autumn providing pollen and nectar especially for bees.

The Dandelion has a thick tap root, that is dark brown, almost black on the outside and milky white within. Its long jagged leaves rise directly from a rosette form lying close upon the ground. Each leaf is grooved and created so that falling rain goes straight to the center of the rosette to the root allowing the plant to obtain sufficient moisture.

The leaves are deeply-notched, toothy, spatula-like that are usually shiny and hairless and the edge of each leaf is cut into great jagged teeth. The larger teeth are cut into lesser teeth resembling the teeth of a lion; thus its name. According to the French the name is Dent de Lion. In Latin the name would be Dens leonis; and in the Greek Leontodon.

Before the invention of lawns, the golden blossoms and lion-toothed leaves were more likely to be praised as a bounty of food, medicine and magic. Gardeners used to weed out the grass to make room for the dandelions. Dandelions were a common and beloved garden flower in Europe, and the subject of many poems. In the terrifying New World, the cheerful face of a Dandelion was a sweet reminder of home.

Dandelions were considered a green and growing first aid kit in olden times, as they were prescribed for every ailment from warts to the plague, dandruff, toothache, sores, fevers, rotting gums, weakness, lethargy and depression. Not until the twentieth century was the underlying cause of many of those symptoms realized as vitamin deficiencies. Dandelions have more vitamin A than spinach, more vitamin C than tomatoes, and are a powerhouse of iron, calcium and potassium.

Despite their reputation in most neighborhoods,

Despite their reputation in most neighborhoods, Dandelions are actually good for your lawn. Their wide-spreading roots loosen hard-packed soil, aerate the earth and help reduce soil erosion. The deep taproot

also pulls nutrients s from deep in the soil and makes them available to other plants.

Dandelions are hardy, healthy and just plain fun. The Dandelion seems to be the flower earmarked for children. In a park or a garden, it's one of the flowers a child can pick without getting into trouble. A child in a field full of dandelions never ran out of things to



lions never ran out of things to do. Blowing on Dandelion puffball can tell you if it's time to go home, how many years until you get married, or how many children you'll have - and of course, if you catch a flying dandelion seed, you can make a wish!

Dandelions are fast growers. The sunny yellow flowers go from bud to seed in just a few days. They are also long-lived. An individual plant can live for years. Just think, the dandelion hidden in a corner of your yard or on the playground might be older than the children running past it.

Lives Laid Away

Mysterious Book Report No. 373

Just about a year ago, an outstanding young wordsmith published his debut novel, *August Snow*, to great critical acclaim and a fistful of prestigious literary awards. The author's name is Stephen Mack Jones, and his writing style has been favorably compared to that of the legendary Raymond Chandler . . . a resemblance the MBR is happy to confirm. The city is Detroit, in an area known as Mexicantown, and the narrator-protagonist private-eye is a tough as brass knuckles ex-cop and former USMC sniper named August Octavio Snow. He's a half African-American (his father) and half Mexican-American (his mother) guy who grew up in Detroit and followed in his dad's footsteps to become a cop on the Detroit Police Department. But there he uncovered corruption at the highest echelons and exposed it, which brought down the Chief of Police, several other high-ranking members of the police department, and the Mayor. Then, after being drummed out of the DPD, he won a twelve million settlement for wrongful dismissal. Now, he's back in his second adventure.

Lives Laid Away, (SOHO Crime, \$26.95, 296 pages, ISBN 978-1-61695-959-3), by Stephen Mack Jones, finds August Snow trying to live a quiet, simple life in the house he grew up in, in an area of Detroit called Mexicantown. But when the body of a young, unidentified Hispanic woman dressed up as Marie Antoinette is pulled from the Detroit River, everything changes. 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
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


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
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


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The Olive Jar- By Carol Olsen LaMonda **Trash and Treasure**



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
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FHS Celebrates Sixty-eight Years of **Scholarship Awards**

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





All first-time applicants must appear in person. Anyone under age 16 must also have both parents present (unless the appearing parent has a completed DS-3053) while ages 16-17 require only one parent present. First time applicants will also need their original birth certificate (or a certified copy) and their driver's license or non-driver ID. There are two separate payments which must be made and at least one of those payments must be in the form of a check or money order. Pictures can be taken on site for \$10.00.

Cragsmoor is celebrating its rich history as one of the earliest art colonies in the country with a weekend of inspiring events at the Historical Society's fully restored home in the former Federated Church on May 18 and 19.

Building upon the realization that its location on the Shawangunk Ridge has a magic which has called to creative people since the late 1870s, Now and Zen is designed to demonstrate the continuity of that spirit through the works of

the earliest artists to their contemporary counterparts.

The main meeting room will feature masterworks by the turn-of-the century founding artists, including Charles C. Curran, E.L. Henry, Helen Turner, Eliza Greatorex, George Inness, Jr., and Arthur I. 


