### Days of Yore... Today's History

May 26, 1948

Vernon Smith of Accord lost his life when he was crushed by a traveling crane at the Neversink dam project last Wednesday afternoon. Mr. Smith, a veteran of World War II, was employed by the S. A. Healy Company as an oiler on the crane. According to the Board of Water Supply police, Mr. Smith died instantly.

May 21, 1958 On the basis of the apparent favorable reaction of voters at a special discussional meeting held on Thursday, May 15th, the Board of Education of the Tri-Valley Central School District has set June 12th as the date for a public vote on the issuance of bonds for the initiation of a new building program. The bonds would amount to \$785,000, amortized over a 30-year period. The proposal of the Board calls for the construction of an addition to the present building of fourteen elementary classrooms, a new double gymnasium, a new cafeteria, a small elementary library, an administrative office, and a new agricultural center. As well, the present building will undergo a series of alterations to better utilize it for secondary school purposes. Included in these alterations are the enlargement of homemaking, art, music, library, business education, and central administrative facilities and the establishment of a new science center. The student capacity by the proposal will be boosted from the present 475 to 825.

May 25, 1978 A \$3,237, 000 proposed budget was approved by the Tri-Valley Board for the 1978-79 school year. The budget will be presented to the public at the annual meeting on June 13. The budget represents a 7.6% increase over the 1977-78 appropriation \$3,008,040.

### **Barn Swallows Have Returned!**

Good News in Carol Furman's column this week - the barn swallows have returned from tropical Central and South America to enjoy the spring and summer in the Catskills. This migration is one of the wonders of the natural world. These birds, called "neotropical migrants," spend six or more months in southern locations before returning north, to the Catskills in spring to mate and rear their young.
While spending their time in the Catskills this spring

lows will travel up to a half-mile to gather mud from the edges of ponds, puddles, and ditches to construct their nests. collection sites will be marked with numerous small holes made by the birds as they poked their beaks into the mud several times to get a good load. You may also see swallows flying with feathers or grass that they will use in



the final stages of nest building.

As its name implies, the Barn Swallow typically nests inside accessible buildings such as barns and stables, or on the front porch.

Barn swallow's have had a close association with humans that goes back to Europe for over 2,000 years. It has been theorized that one reason barn swallows choose to nest on door stoops, light fixtures, and porch fronts is because the close proximity to humans keeps crows and other predators away. Of course, when we have a barn swallow nest on the front porch, we have to deal with the droppings and other debris they deposit. There are remedies: spread newspaper, an old sheet, or even install a board under the nest. It is worth it to watch these wonder-

ful birds that feed on flying insects.

Did you know Swallows are federally protected?

Once an adult swallow occupies a half-built nest, or a fully built nest, even without eggs, the law protects it.

Once the nest has been completed, the female will lay two to seven, reddish-spotted white eggs that are about 0.6 x 0.8 in size, and weigh 0.07 oz, of which 5 percent is shell. The incubation period is normally 14-19 days; with another 18-23 days before the chicks develop wing feather. The young stay with, and are fed by the parents for about a week after leaving the nest. There are normally two broods, with the original nest being reused for the second brood and being repaired and reused in subsequent years. Occasionally, birds from the first brood will assist in feeding the second brood.

While there has been a decline of the Barn Swallows in some countries where they use DDT, there has been an increase in the population in North America due to greater availability of nesting sites and subsequent

range expansion.

Because of their long journeys, barn swallows have been well observed. A swallow tattoo is popular amongst nautical men as a symbol of a safe return. The A swallow tattoo is popular tradition was that a mariner would receive a tattoo of this fellow wanderer - a Barn Swallow - after sailing 5,000 nautical miles.

No bird in North America is better known as a welcome companion and a useful friend to the farmer, as it returns each spring to fly in and out of a wide-open barn door, delighting them with its cheerful twittering. It will fly about the barnyard in pursuit of the troublesome insects that annoy both man and beast.

As long as there are insects, the Barn Swallow will remain in its summer home.

This is main reason for their seasonal migration - the lack of insects to eat during winter in the north. Avoiding cold temperatures is actually a less important reason for leaving. Swallows will migrate during the day, catching flying insects along the way. They will fly from dawn to dusk, sometimes coming within inches of the ground to catch flying insects. catch flying insects.

As we will observe during the spring and summer as the Swallows dart and dive while flying overhead, they will sometimes come within inches of the ground to catch flying insects. Their airborne grace is a wonder to behold and enjoy.

### **Household Hints**

**Keep cut flowers fresh** 

Everyone likes to keep cut flowers around as long as possible, and there are several good methods. One way is to mix 2 tablespoons apple cider vinegar and 2 tablespoons sugar with the vase water before adding the flowers. Be sure to change the water (with more vinegar and sugar, of course) every few days to enhance your flowers' longevity.

### Green Sun

Mysterious Book Report No. 334

There's plenty of reality TV programs these days that show viewers what cops are doing during their shifts, and what they're putting up with from John Q. and Susie B. Public. Now, a new book puts readers into the jump seat of a 1980s vintage squad car during the spring and summer of a new officer's probationary period in Oakland, California. It lets us see what the newbie cop is experiencing, and thinking, in an emotionally charged thrill ride that starts in the first chapter and runs through the last page.

Green Sun, (Mulholland Books/ Little, Brown, \$27.00, 336 pages, ISBN 978-0-316-46680-6) by Kent Anderson is the third book of a trilogy which began with Sympathy For The Devil and Night Dogs, more than twenty years ago. Make no mistake however, Green Sun stands

entirely on its own. 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# Cardinal Timothy M. Dolan Visits Workers at NYC's Delaware Aqueduct Bypass Tunnel

To underscore safety, Dolan provides blessing to workers fixing the longest tunnel in the world • \$1 billion project is the largest repair in the 176-year history of New York City's water supply



Cardinal Timothy M. Dolan, the archbishop of New York, visited workers at the Delaware Aqueduct Bypass Tunnel on Wednesday to provide a blessing and underscore the importance of workplace safety. Dolan visited the construction site in Newburgh where more than 100 men and women are working on a \$1 billion project to repair the 85-mile-long Delaware Aqueduct, the longest tunnel in the world. The aqueduct delivers about 50 percent of New York City's water each day from large reservoirs in the Catskill Mountains. The project, overseen by the New York City Department of Environmental Protection (DEP), is the largest repair effort in the 176year history of New York City's water supply. "You are all helping to provide the best drinking water in the world to the city where I live," Dolan told the workers. "You have a very difficult job to provide for the common good, and your job requires you to take risks. I want you to know that you have our love, our appreciation and our esteem for

Dolan was joined at the site by DEP Commissioner Vincent Sapienza, and leaders from the Kiewit Corporation and J.F. Shea Construction, the contracting companies that are building the bypass tunnel. Dolan was the honored guest for safety week, a national effort to eliminate worker injuries by highlighting best practices and the industry's steadfast commitment to safety at all construction sites.



### **DEC Proposed Day Use Permit** for Blue Hole Visitors

DEC Commissioner Basil Seggos has announced a proposal to establish a no-cost, day use permitting system requiring visitors to obtain a permit to access the Blue Hole, located in the Sundown Wild Forest of the Catskill Park in the town of Denning, Ulster County, on summer weekends and holidays. This proposal is designed to strike a balance between ensuring State lands are open and accessible to the public reducing environmental damand accessible to the public, reducing environmental damage, and enhancing public safety. DEC is accepting comments on the proposed permitting system through May

28, 2018.

The proposed, no-cost permit system would require visitors to the Blue Hole to obtain a permit on weekends and holidays during the period from May 15 through October 15. Up to 40 permits per day would be issued, with each permit allowing entry for up to six individuals, including shildren. This saw extent would allow a marking a hildren. including children. This new system would allow a maximum of 240 people to access the Blue Hole each day during peak times, helping to protect environmental resources and public safety.

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
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



in Batavia. Born Illinois, Riseling came east to go to school, ultimately earning a bachelor's in International Affairs from Yale University and a master's in International Law from the Fletcher School of International Law & Diplomacy.

"Ī had a dream: I wanted to work at the United Nations," he recalled.

Raised in a religious home, he became the director of the Office of International Affairs for the American Baptist

Convention and worked for the National Council of Churches in the late 60s and early '70s.

"It was a very exciting time," he said - so much so that he shifted gears and became an advocate for social and civil equality, as reflected in the master's of Divinity in Social Ethics he earned from Yale Divinity School and in yet another master's - in Public Education from Baruch College - that he put to use teaching labor studies, micro- and macroeconomics, and U.S. relations with Cuba. A portion of that time was spent mentoring state prison inmates through Empire State College.

That period also saw Riseling's introduction to Sullivan County, when he and partner Sonja Hedlund bought a small home in Mileses in the Town of

'We became enraptured with nature," he said. "We decided to become farmers and use that as our political platform."

Already an advocate for women's rights and labor issues, Riseling and Hedlund found their most satisfying political expression through what became Apple Pond Farm and Renewable Energy Center in Callicoon Center, where they continue to live. Since 1973, they've raised draft horses, produced meat and vegetables, developed new methods of agriculture, instituted a community kitchen, installed looms for weaving, taken the property completely off the grid and provided farming internships for more than 300 young people from around the world - nearly 50 of whom are now full-time

"Let's produce producers of food who will produce really good food -that's what we've been doing," Riseling explained.

He paused for a moment, a twinkle sparkling in his eyes.

"Once you get hooked in nature's glorious realms," he added, "you're a goner!"

Running a model farm certainly has occupied much of his attention, and some might see the "For Sale" signs in front of it as acknowledgment of a need to retire. No such intention exists with Riseling, however. The man who wrote an entire curriculum for children on economics and law, who penned more than 500 newspaper columns on green energy, who spent two decades delighting public radio listeners with a weekly call-in program, and who helped found and lead the nonprofit Sullivan


Alliance for Sustainable Development? He's not about to relax.

Apple Pond Farm now has a conservation easement ensuring it will be farmed in perpetuity, and Riseling may once again return to the halls of government to press the causes he holds most

"I'm going to stay in renewable energy work," he promised. "Nature has to be saved, and we have to save ourselves. That is what is before humanity.'

"To know Dick is to understand advocacy, passion, and responsibility to the land and its inhabitants," remarked District 5 Legislator Terri Ward, who presented Riseling with the Distinguished Citizen Award. "From farm-to-school programs to the Sullivan County Charter Review Commission, Dick has approached every challenge with a fresh perspective, a can-do attitude and a deep sense of conviction.

Riseling explained his ethos simply: "I'm trying to get us closer to what we were promised as kids: a good country.'

Operated under the Department of Public Health Services, WIC plays an important role in health improve-ment throughout Sullivan County. WIC staff provide evi-dence-based nutrition education, breastfeeding support, vouchers for nutritious food, and healthcare referrals to approximately 1,600 eligible pregnant and post-partum women, infants and children up to age five.

Starting July 9, WIC's hours of operation are expanding to assure weekly evening appointments. Farmers' market vouchers will be distributed to participants starting June 1. And in December, WIC will begin transitioning from paper checks for nutritious foods to a debit-type card for each family.

WIC clinics operate twice-weekly at Sullivan County Public Health Services in Liberty, three times weekly at the Government Center in Monticello, and monthly at the Callicoon Town Hall in Jeffersonville and the Community Room at the corner of Fourth and Sullivan streets in Wurtsboro.





# Senator Bonacic Supports Legislation to Make NY More Affordable by Cutting Billions in Local Property Taxes and Other Tax Burdens

(Albany, NY)¬- State Senator John J. Bonacic (R/C/I-Mt. Hope) supported a sweeping legislative package today that focuses on property taxes, energy costs, unfunded mandates, and other drivers that are making it harder for middle-class families to succeed.

The measures would result in billions of

dollars in savings annually for taxpayers in the form of new and expanded property tax cuts including the state assuming local Medicaid costs; eliminating costly energy taxes; creating new tax cuts for seniors to prevent them from moving to another state; requiring a supermajority vote when taxes are increased by state and local governments; and preventing unfunded mandates from being passed on

"The burdens that are placed on middle-class taxpayers in New York can be over-whelming at times," said Senator Bonacic. "I'm pleased to join my colleagues in the Senate majority conference in supporting these measures that will save our hardworking taxpayers money and lift unnecessary burdens."

The bills passed today include:
• S8411, which would reduce the local Medicaid contribution by 20 percent a year over five years for all counties outside New York City;

S8412, which would reduce counties' contributions by 10 percent a year over 10 years and again requires that \$2.3 billion in cumulative savings to be returned dollar-for-dollar

back to property taxpayers;S8398, which would provide additional property tax relief for all STAR-eligible New Yorkers by increasing the amount of the property tax relief credit by 25 percent. This bill expands an already successful program first

created by Senate Republicans that is helping to reduce the property tax burden and helps mitigate tax savings that could be lost as a result of the recent federal State and Local Tax deduct;

S8399, which would save business and resident ratepayers by phasing in a new elimination of the two-percent Gross Receipts Tax on utility bills;

S8406, which would create a senior school tax rate that phases in a yearly 10 percent reduction of school taxes, based on age of the eligible senior, starting at age 70 to reduce the burden that seniors face when paying the school tax portions of their real property tax

S414A would help more seniors save money and choose to stay in New York during their retirement by increasing the private pension and retirement income exclusion from \$20,000 to \$40,000 for single taxpayers and to \$80,000 for married taxpayers, over three vears:

\$8401, would require a two-thirds vote from each house of the state legislature to increase, impose, or extend taxes, a twothirds vote from local legislative bodies to increase, impose, or extend local taxes, and a two-thirds vote from local legislative bodies requesting an increase, imposition, or exten-

sion of taxes by the state legislature; and
• S8400 would propose a constitutional amendment to reduce property taxes by prohibiting many of the unfunded mandates that place a hardship on local governments. The bill would prevent state government from passing a financial burden of new mandates to local governments without financial assistance, preventing them from being forced to decide between taking resources from already strained local programs and redirecting those funds to the latest unfunded mandate or turning to already over-burdened taxpayers for additional support.
