Paula Cameron reflected on her past eleven years at SUNY Sullivan.





DAYS OF YORE.... Today's History

Happy Birthday Townsman!

Back in 1947 a group of six people, spear-headed by Inez Gridley met to discuss how to get news out to the residents of the far flung newly created Tri-Valley school system.

They felt only a newspaper could fulfill the need and from that meeting *The Townsman* was born. Those six co-signed a personal note to purchase an offset type office-duplicating machin. Three hundred subscriptions for \$1.00 each were sold and thus began The Townsman!

For the next several weeks in celebration of all of those who have contributed in some way to continue to bring our local news to the community for the past 69 years, we will feature some 'headline news' from the first Townsman that was published on May 7, 1947 by Inez Gridley and five other venturesome folk who initiated the idea of The Townsman that has now become not just a newspaper, but a tradition.

Inez Gridley was a retired elementary school Sullivan County Retired Teachers' Assn. She was part of the core group of local residents who worked hard to get the school district approved and she became the first District Clerk. In her younger adult life, she taught at a number of oneroom schools in the area.

As Town of Neversink Historian for 16 years, she authored many researched articles on different local history topics. During those years, much of her material was in print in county newspapers, as well as in The Townsman.

She helped write "Brass Buttons and Leather Boots" and wrote the prologue and three chapters for "Time and the Valley." Her research and writ-ing as historian has stood the test of time and is often referred to by present day historians.

In addition to her participation in the needs of the community, she was busy writing poetry and prose on a daily basis. *The Alchemy Club* was co-founded by Inez Gridley. Her poetry was accepted and printed in national newspapers and magazines.

There are four books of her writing including "Journey from Red Hill," an anthology of her verse, published by CRS Outloud Books in 1997. Her last book, "Pitfalls and Promises," was off

the press in 2001 when she was 93. That last book included poetry that had been written in what she called her "upward years" and was mostly unpublished prior to that.

The first article on Page 1, Vol. 1. Issue 1 -May 7, 1947 of The Townsman:

"It has been reported that the New York State Highway Commission has informed the Neversink Town Board of new traffic regulations which will be put into effect in Grahamsville."

"The residents of this community have been concerned about the increase in through traffic, particularly in regard to trucks which race through town at an unreasonable speed. Because of existing speed laws, nothing could be done to make them slow down."

"After making an investigation of traffic conditions through the village the Highway Commission concluded that the increased amount of through traffic had resulted in the creation of hazards along the highway. It is understood that the Department of Public Works has been instructed to erect signs at the points where the new regulations will go into effect. A 30 mile per hour speed zone will be established between the white bridge at the lower end of town and Erath's Bakery at the upper end. Parking on both sides of the street at the narrow bottleneck in front of the Post Office will be prohibited, with parking permitted only on the south side."

"It is believed that when the signs have been placed, the State Highway Commission will take steps to enforce the provisions."

Town of Neversink Flag Exchange Ceremony

Memorial Day, 2016 in the Tri-Valley Area will be observed by the Flag Exchange Ceremony, which has become a tradition in the Town of Neversink. The Program will take place at 11:00 am on Monday, May 30th, at the flag pole located in the Grahamsville Rural Cemetery on Route 55 in Grahamsville.

The event will feature the retiring of the flag, which has flown for the past six months, in honor of Navy Veteran, Donald TerBush. In exchange for the flag just retired, Scout Troop 97 will then accept a flag presented by the Lamb Family of Parksville, which will fly for six months, in honor of Marine Veteran, William Lamb, Jr. Participating in the event will be Boy Scout Troops 97 and 87, an Honor Guard of local veterans and representatives of the Grahamsville Rural Cemetery Association, who sponsor the Flag Exchange Ceremony.

As always, the public is invited to attend and participate in this Memorial Day Observance. We welcome the opportunity to honor any members of the armed forces who might be in the area. Please join us as we pay tribute to all those who have served and all those who currently serve our great nation.

Pros and Cons of Garlic Mustard

Until recently, Garlic Mustard (Alliaria petiolata) was considered just a weed but now it is considered one of the worst invaders of forests in the American Northeast and Midwest. You will notice it along the roadsides, in the forest and even in the garden. Its rapid spread has allowed it to become the dominant plant in the undergrowth of some



forests, greatly reducing the diversity of all species. Garlic mustard is one of very few non-native plants that has been able to successfully invade forest understories.

Historically it is believed that Garlic Mustard was introduced our country from Europe and Asia around 1868 when settlers in the Long Island, NY area used

it for food and medicinal purposes. It has since spread through the Eastern United States and heading westward.

Garlic mustard has a biennial life cycle, that is, it

takes years to fully mature and produce seeds. Seeds germinate in February to early March of the first year and grow into a short rosette by the middle of the summer. the plant's



second year, a stalk develops, flowers form, and the plant dies by June. Siliques, four-sided seedpods, develop in May, containing small black seeds lined up in a row. On average, a garlic mustard plant will produce 22 siliques, each of which can contain as many as 28 seeds. The seeds generally germinate within one to two years, but may remain viable for

First year plants may be difficult to identify. Crushing the leaves makes this task easier as the smell of garlic is vergy distinguishable. The basal leaves of an immature plant are dark-green and kidney shaped with round teeth (scalloped) along the edges; average size of the leaves is 2 to 3.5 inches in diameter. In its second year, the alternating stem leaves become more triangular shaped, 1 to 2 inches long, and have sharper teeth, with leaves becoming gradually smaller towards the top of the stalk. Leaf stalks of mature plants are hairy. As with the younger plants, second year plants have a garlic odor when crushed but the odor is less obvious with increasing age.

Like everything in Nature, there are two sides and there is a good side to Garlic Mustard! Garlic mustard is great served raw in salads, mixed with milder greens or it can be steamed, simmered or sautéed. Garlic Mustard is considered to have the highest levels of nutrients of any leafy green so far analyzed! It's high in vitamin A, beta-carotene, zinc, manganese and fiber.

Garlic Mustard can be easily harvested for FREE with no concern of damaging its plant population, which helps to balance the native ecosystems and save native plants from being crowded out by the invasive ones.

Learn to identify Garlic Mustard and harvest away!


Hummingbirds are Back; It's Time to Clean their Feeders

Hummingbirds are innately discriminating creatures, so don't expect to see them flocking around a dirty, sticky, or crusted-over sugar-water feeder. Regularly clean your feeders by thoroughly washing them in equal parts apple cider vinegar and hot water. Rinse well with cold water after washing, and air-dry them outdoors in full sunlight before refilling them with food.


The Last Dawn

Mysterious Book Report No. 241

Unless you've recently vacationed in Costa Rica or Belize, the geography of Central America is pretty much *terra incognita* for most of us who live north of the Mexican border and speak English as our mother tongue. But back in the 1980s, the Central American nation of Nicaragua was a focus of attention by the US government as the communists – backed by the Cubans – fought the dictator Anastasio Samoza and deposed him. But then, the fight moved to neighboring El Salvador, where it became so vicious that "Even the Grim Reaper needs an armed escort to venture there." With the USSR supporting the communist insurgents and the USA backing the Salvadorean Government, the tiny country became the scene of a bloody proxy war between the superpowers. It's a rich – and previously unexplored – source for crime fiction writers. That's all changing, thanks to a talented writer named Joe Gannon.



His second work of fiction, *The Last Dawn*, (Minotaur Books, \$26.99, 278 pages, ISBN 978-1-250-04803-5) is the follow up to his debut entitled, *Night of the Jaguar*. Both feature Ajax Montoya, an expatriate American who grew up in Los Angeles, California,

but went on to be a Cuban-trained captain in the Sandanista Army. At the end of the war in Nicaragua, he frees his comrade-in-arms, Lieutenant Gladys Dario from a psychopathic, sadistic killer and rapist named Krill. Gladys escapes to Miami, but Montoya is imprisoned in a mental hospital for his actions against the new Sandinista Government. Now, it's three years later . . . 1989 . . . and unbeknownst to Montoya, the communist world has changed. The Berlin Wall has fallen, Germany is reunited and the U.S.S.R. has crumbled, but the civil war in El Salvador is at it's zenith. When the man who betrayed him shows up, Montoya takes on the hopeless task of finding-and rescuing the brother of the woman he loved and lost, who died during the Nicaraguan War. Her parents are using Montoya's guilt as leverage to locate their son, who's somewhere among the disappeared. All Montoya has to do is infiltrate the nastiest civil war on the planet where he has no friends, local contacts, weapons or knowledge of conditions on the scene and find his own escape route once the mission is completed.

This arresting novel is fast-paced, loaded with action and contains an element of magical realism featuring a ghost, who represents Montoya's guilt. The Last

Dawn is a slam-bang thriller that'll leave you eagerly anticipating Mr. Gannon's next installment of his Ajax Montoya saga.

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Local Flood Hazard Mitigation Planning Underway this Summer in Sundown Area

Local Flood Hazard Mitigation planning is underway this summer in the Sundown area of Denning. This community project is the first step in eligibility for the Town and its residents to access a number of programs offering technical assistance and watershed funding to mitigate hazards caused by flooding. The creation of a flood model for the area can help us weigh the potential benefits (i.e. reducing the level of flood waters) of practical modifications to infrastructure against their costs in relation to specific impacts, such as storms of different sizes.

Few rural towns are untouched by this challenging issue and collaboration among residents, elected officials (especially highway and emergency workers), historians, and the technical teams of the District and DEP is key to a good understanding of the nature of flooding. This is happening in many Catskills towns that have been given the resources to explore solutions - from the simple action of securing fuel tanks to prevent them from floating away and dispersing their contents in a flood, to more complex problems created by our floodplain roads, culverts, and bridges - which we all use. The goal of the Sundown process is to have a map that describes flood levels at homes and businesses that can be utilized for the benefit of the community.

Sullivan County Soil & Water Conservation District has contracted for engineering services on behalf of the Town of Denning for flood analysis on the Rondout and Sundown Creeks running through Sundown and ending at the Sullivan County Line. The Denning Neversink Local Flood Analysis Committee was delegated in 2014 by the Town Boards to coordinate this project. Representatives include members from Town Zoning, Planning and Code Enforcement officials, in addition to technical and out-reach staff of the District through the Rondout Neversink Stream Program.

reach staff of the District through the Rondout Neversink Stream Program.

The engineering firm of Barton and Loguidice is working on this project together with Rondout Neversink Stream Program and NYC DEP Stream Management staff. Plans for this summer include completing survey data to create a hydraulic model map tool to use in the process. Landowners will be notified of ongoing survey for data collection for the most accurate model. A series of discussions and presentations will take place May through October to inform the engineers of local knowledge and explain the model to the community.

Come learn more about the project on Thursday, May 26 at 6:00 p.m. at the Sundown Church Hall. Follow-up session dates include: June 30, August 25, and October 13, at the same time and place. Mark your calendar now. A folder will be distributed to all attendees at the first session in May so that all infor-



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
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

Oral Health Needs Assessment Available

An Oral Health Needs Assessment describing the oral health needs, gaps in Sullivan County, as well as recommendations, has been completed and is electronically available to the public on the local health department's web page. Go to www.co.sullivan.ny.us and click on tabs for Departments / Public Health Services /Health Related Data and Reports. The report is the first comprehensive oral health needs assessment conducted in Sullivan County and was completed with the support of funding from the Sullivan County Rural Health Network and NYS Office of Rural Health. The needs assessment was completed as a result of the desire to better understand some of the issues and barriers involved in our county's poor oral health statistics, with a special focus on children and pregnant women.

According to the American Academy for Pediatric Dentistry, tooth decay is the most common chronic childhood disease in the U.S., and disproportionately affects children who live in poverty and those who live in rural areas, because they are less likely to receive dental care than those living in urban areas (National Rural Health Association). Less than half (46%) of third graders in Sullivan County were reported to take fluoride tablets regularly. Keeping children and preg-nant women healthy is one of the most effective ways to reduce health care costs and the future burden of chronic diseases that can result from poor oral health.

An Oral Health Coalition meets monthly at Sullivan County Public Health Services at 50 Community Lane, Liberty, NY to discuss ideas and interventions to improve oral health in Sullivan County. The Oral Health Coalition is a subcommittee of the Sullivan County Rural Health Network, and is a collaborative effort between several local non-profit agencies, the PRASAD Children's Dental Health Project, Sullivan County Public Health Services, dental hygienists, school nurses, dentists, and concerned citizens. Monthly meetings are open to anyone interested in helping to promote improving oral health in Sullivan County.



Lambert helped many students find their way in their own evolution.





Cuomo Announces the Approval of 52 Smart Schools Investment Plans, Totaling \$45 million - Funding will support classroom technology, high-tech security and school and community connectivi-

Governor Cuomo today announced that the first school district funding requests from the \$2 billion Smart Schools Bond Act have been approved. The Act, proposed by the Governor and overwhelmingly approved by voters, sup-ports investments in education technology that will equip students with the skills they need to thrive in a 21st century economy. These investments will help close the "digital divide" by increasing access to technology and high-speed broadband for all students throughout the state, ensuring that no student gets left behind.

"As technology continues to shape the landscape of our economy, we must reimagine our classrooms into modern centers of learning so that our students are prepared for the jobs that meet the demands of tomorrow," Governor Cuomo said. "With this bold initiative, we are taking an important step towards strengthening our learning environment and connecting students in every corner of the state with the opportunities necessary to succeed in the 21st

century economy.'

The Smart Schools Review Board met today for the first time to approve investment plans submitted by school districts. The Board is comprised of the Director of the Budget, the Chancellor of the State University of New York, and the Commissioner of the State Education Department. The Board approved previously issued guidelines on the required components of Smart Schools Investment Plans, and reviewed and approved the first batch of submissions.

The 52 plans approved today budget a total of \$45 million for projects, including \$26 million for Classroom Technology purchases, \$15 million for School Connectivity projects, \$4 million for High-Tech Security projects, and \$23,000 for Community Connectivity projects.

Following the proposal of the Bond Act, Governor Cuomo established the Smart Schools Commission to gather information on strategies for how schools can most effectively invest the

bond funds. This advisory commission produced a report recommending a focus on expanding robust broadband and wireless connectivity and utilizing transformative technologies. The plans approved today by the Smart Schools Review Board reflect many of the best practices identified by the Commission.

Cuomo Announces 9% Increase in NY **Honey Production in 2015**

State remains top honey producer in northeast; jumps to 10th in the nation

Governor Andrew M. Cuomo announced today announced a 9 percent increase in honey production in 2015, maintaining New York's status as the top honey producer the Northeast and putting the state in the nationwide top 10 for the first time in a decade.

"When our state's agricultural producers thrive, they create jobs and economic activity in communities across the state - and the success of our state's honey producers is proof that New York vendors are among the best in the business," said Governor Cuomo. "I am proud to see this industry continuing to reach new heights, and I encourage all New Yorkers to sample some of the world-class products that are made right here in the Empire State.

According to the United States Department of Agriculture statistics, which cover beekeepers with five colonies or more, the 3.6 million pounds of honey produced in New York State in 2015 was a nine percent increase from the 3.3 million pounds produced in 2014. New York ranked 10th in honey production in 2015, jumping three rankings above

Idaho, Georgia, and Nebraska.

New York beekeepers earned almost \$10.6 million from their honey in 2015, an \$1.2 million increase from the year before. According to the State Department of Agriculture and Markets, New York honey fetches higher prices because the state's beekeepers produce not just Clover, but also niche varieties like Wild Flower, Basswood, and Locust. The Department also credits favorable weather last summer and early fall for the higher production and

Recognizing challenges facing the pollinator community, Governor Cuomo established an interagency taskforce, chaired by the Departments of Agriculture and Markets and Environmental Conservation, to develop a Pollinator Protection Plan to protect and promote the health and recovery of honeybee and other pollinator populations in New York State. The Governor has further committed to supporting the industry and the efforts of the taskforce by including \$500,000 in the State Budget through the Environmental Protection Fund for implementation of the Pollinator Protection Plan.

Passing through orchards, organic farms, lakes, rivers and streams, it also links villages and towns including the Historic Huguenot District in New Paltz, the towns of Gardiner and Rosendale and ending near the historic Stockade District in the City of Kingston. Trail users will discover a wide variety of birds, wildlife, unique 19th century industrial historic sites as well as stunning views of the Shawangunk Ridge, Wallkill River and the Rondout Creek. The crown jewel of this 22-mile linear park is the famed Rosendale Trestle, with its 940 foot span over the Rondout Creek and soaring 150 feet above the water's surface. When first constructed in 1872 it was dubbed the iron wonder and was the highest span bridge in the United States. Often referred to as the Walkway over the Rondout, the trestle offers more intimate views than the Wallkway Over The Hudson, yet no less spectacular views of Joppenburgh Mountain, Main Street Rosendale and the Rondout Creek.

The trail surface is gravel and packed dirt, except for a paved section of the trail in the heart of New Paltz from Plains Road to Broadhead Avenue. For everyone's safety, please follow the guidelines for

Governor Cuomo Announces Start of Toll Evader Crackdown -Process for 575 Registration Suspensions Begins **Under New State Regulations**

Governor Andrew M. Cuomo today announced the beginning of the suspension process for 575 New York-registered vehicles as part of this state's crackdown on persistent toll violators. These vehicles are alleged to have violated the recently adopted state regulations targeting individuals who fail to pay tolls, fees and other charges resulting from five toll violations on different days over an 18month period. The regulation applies to all New York toll crossings.

"These scofflaws operate at the expense of law abiding toll payers and put additional stress on New York's transportation network without providing any resources to maintain it," Governor Cuomo said. "This administration's action stops these toll evaders in their tracks and sends a simple message: If you don't pay your fair share, you will be held

accountable."

The new state regulations went into effect January

Prior to the suspensions taking effect, the Department of Motor Vehicles sends letters notifying owners that their vehicle registrations will be suspended within 45 days unless they pay the specified charges, or unless they contact the E-ZPass New York Customer Service Center to resolve the charges, or contact the Department of Motor Vehicles to request a hearing. Letters have been sent to individuals with violations at New York State Thruway Authority, the Port Authority of New York and New Jersey and Metropolitan Transportation Authority Bridges and Tunnels facilities.


