# Casinos Will Make the Difference! Creating 10,000 Jobs in NYS Senate Democ

In his address Cuomo covered the many different benefits that casinos would profit the entire state including 10,000 jobs and \$430 million in new annual tax dollars going toward public schools, property tax relief and aid to local governments.

Cuomo made it clear

that gambling already has a presence in the Empire State. There are five Indian casinos and nine racinos. Gambling is in place in Canada, Pennsylvania, Connecticut and other areas in the Northeast luring New Yorkers out of state each year for slots, table games and related entertainment. This migration of people is estimated to be a \$3 billion loss for our state at a time when every cent counts. (Contd. Pg. 9)

On September 5, 1778, in a valley near where the Chestnut Brook flows into the Pepacton Creek, a contingent of 21 mostly inexperienced soldiers of the Colonial Militia under the command of Lt. John



Graham were ambushed by a group of Native Americans and Tories. All but three of the militia were killed. The ambush has become known as the Battle at Chestnut Woods. What was the historic significance of this battle to the county? To the region? Was it more than just an ambush? What strategic importance did it signify to General George Washington and the agriculture in this area?

Sullivan County Historian John Conway will discuss the events leading up to that bloody day as well as the aftermath when he presents "The Massacre in the Woods" at the Daniel Pierce Library, Friday, October 25th, at 7

John Conway has been the Sullivan County Historian since

1993 and has been at the head of the movement to preserve local history for more than twenty years. He is an adjunct professor at SUNY Sullivan, and a contributing editor for the Encyclopedia of New York State. He has won numerous awards, including a New York State Broadcasters Association first place award for Best Public Affairs show in 1995 for "A Look Back," a number of Merit Awards from the Upper Delaware Heritage Alliance, and the Sullivan County Historical Society's History Preserver Award in 2003. He is the author of the weekly column "Retrospect" on Sullivan County history that appears in the *Times Herald-Record* and the **Sullivan County Democrat.**

A tribute to the memory of all of the Townsman ladies that we have lost and loved so much... Peggy DeWire, Avril Pappa, Joan Hall and Polly Hill.

The Bewitching Witch Hazel
Both or our daughters have all of their Halloween decorations out and on display, and I haven't even gotten mine down from the attic! While still thinking about what I am going to do for Halloween one of my daughters is already into making Thanksgiving decorations little turkeys!

She showed me a sample last week and I recognized the pine cones, but the little brown beaks had me

tricked!

She told me her secret. They were witch hazel seeds. Oh yes, the familiar witch hazel does grow in the Catskills, usually alongside of other shrubs or small trees, or underneath oaks, hickories, Red Maples, American Beech and even pine trees.

The witch hazel bush is a a deciduous shrub usually

growing between 9 and 26 feet tall. On rare occasion though, it can grow as tall as 39 feet. leaves are alternately arranged, and ovaf-shaped. They measure from 1 1/2" up to 6 " long and are between 1" to 4 1/2" wide, with a smooth or wavy edge.

They have fragrant yellow blooms. Each flower has four slender

strap-shaped petals a little less than an inch long. They are pale to dark yellow, orange, or red. The fruit is a twopart capsule that is less than 1/2 inch long. Each part of the seed pod contains

one glossy black seed. When mature, during autumn, the seed pod explodes ejecting the seeds with enough force to fly a distance up to 33 feet!

Witch Hazel is a member of the Hamanelidacease family and closely related to the sweet gum. Although hazel has witch

many common names, the generic name means "together with fruit," which refers to the fact that this special tree is the only tree in North America to have flowers, ripe fruit and next year's leaf buds on its branches at the same time.

The witch hazel bush is often called water-witch as its branches were once used to search and find under-

ground sources of water and minerals.

The leaves and bark of the North American Witchhazel has been used to produce an astringent also referred to as witch hazel, and is used medicinally. This plant extract was widely used for medicinal purposes by Native Americans and is still a component of a variety of commercial healthcare products commonly used to treat insect bites, sunburn and as a refreshing after shave lotion.

Through the years the American witch-hazel has gained a reputation as one of those plants that would like to have everyone's undivided attention. You could say it is a bit of a rebel, marching to the beat of its own drum. It is a native shrub that is unwilling to heed to conven-

tion or a single predictable rule.

The name Witch in witch-hazel supposedly has its roots in Middle English coming from the word wiche. In Old English wice meant "pliant" or "bendable". "Witch hazel" was used in England as a synonym for Wych Elm and it seems that the American colonists simply extended the familiar name to this North American shrub. The use of its twigs as divining rods, just as hazel twigs were used in England, may also have influenced the "witch" part of the name.

I have my own opinion and that is anything that is that small, black and can fly 33 feet is a bit bewitching! And to think that my daughter has turned the little pods





Auerbach Urges Caution in Choosing County Auditor
Ulster County Comptroller Elliott Auerbach has advised the County's Audit Committee to be cautious

in its choice of the County's independent auditors.

The Committee is comprised of five legislators, all of whom are voting members. In addition, representatives of the Comptroller's Office and the Executive's Office serve as non-voting members in an advisory capacity. Recommended by the Comptroller's Office as part of the 2012 charter revision process, the primary function of the committee is to choose the external auditing firm which audits the County's finances. As part of this engagement the firm is to annually produce a "management letter" identifying any audit and control issues that must be addressed by the County.

A recent Request For Proposal (RFP) process resulted in the voting members narrowing the field of independent auditors to be interviewed to only two firms, one being Toski & Co. (the County's current independent auditor), the other, O'Connor Davies (which is currently engaged by the legislature as its budget analyst).

We felt that prior to those interviews being conducted, we needed to ensure that the voting members of the Committee had a clear understanding of our

concerns, most of which we have stated in the past and focus on best practices for Ulster County," said Auerbach. Among his concerns were that O'Connor Davies be advised that if they were awarded the contract they should withdraw as budget analyst to the legislature to avoid the appearance of impropriety. He also restated concerns that the present proposal is

to award a three year contract to the firm chosen, which his office views as too long an engagement, since it would be in effect past the term of the current legislature. Auerbach further sug-gested that consideration be given to reissuing the RFP to determine whether a broader pool of applicants could be considered. "Both of the firms currently under consideration are quality firms, and either might ultimately be chosen the Committee," Auerbach, "but the best purpose of an RFP is to expand the field of firms considered, and the fact that both firms being considered are currently engaged by the County seems to us to be too narrow a focus at this stage."



UC Officials Highlight Major Concerns with the Consent Order Between the NYC DEC and the NYC DEP Regarding the Lower Esopus - Time still remains to dramatically improve the draft F.A.D.

Kingston, NY- Ulster County officials have completed a review of the Consent Order between the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation and the New York City Department of Environmental Protection. The order was agreed to by the two agencies after Ulster County Executive Mike Hein and other stakeholders aggressively advocated for the enforcement of critical State regulations. Although the Consent order validates Ulster County 's assertion that New York City DEP's continued unauthorized released from the Ashokan Reservoir into the Lower Esopus constituted pollution as per the Clean Water Act, the Consent Order does not go far enough to protect the Lower Esopus or the citizens of Ulster County .

County Executive Hein's Administration has highlighted four serious omissions from the order:

There is no requirement to develop a long term structural solution or further explore alternatives to the turbid releases from the Ashokan Reservoir. This means the entire order is premised on the fact that turbid releases are acceptable.

that the use of the Lower Esopus as a release channel to remove turbid water from the Ashokan and the resulting damage it causes is allowed to continue. This is evidence that the desire to control the costs to New York City water rate payers with respect to developing alternatives was the prime determining factor and far outweighed the cost of continued destruction of Ulster County 's environment and regional economy.

• It does not address the voids needed in the Ashokan to reduce downstream flooding, even in the face of additional data demonstrating the effects of climate change. Once again, this leaves the citizens of Ulster County the unacceptable choice of either "mud or flood."

 Most glaringly, there is a lack of connection between the Consent Order and draft Filtration Avoidance the Determination (F.A.D.) which further isolates the Lower Esopus from being the subject of any meaningful improvements or alternatives to turbid releases. This disconnect means that whatever new information or positive alternatives are learned from the Environmental Impact Statement required by the Consent Order, the fear is that the New York City DEP may ignore them and continue the flow of turbid water down the Lower Esopus because the draft F.A.D. stands independent of the

"My Administration has been at the forefront of the fight against the pollution of the Lower Esopus by the New York City DEP and has fought to hold them accountable for their actions throughout Ulster County," said County Executive Mike Hein.

Consent Order.

"Although the Consent Order validates what Ulster County has said all along, that the DEP is polluting the Lower Esopus, it does not go far enough to protect Ulster County 's environment, economy and communities. It is my great hope that the discussions regarding the Lower Esopus turn from continued releases of turbid water to systemic alternatives, regardless of the cost to the New York City DEP. I will continue to fight in the best interest of the great citizens Ulster County and will hold the DEP accountable at every turn; and now, more than ever, it is critical for everyone in our community to be informed that there is still time to improve the F.A.D."

"The concerns raised by County Executive Hein regarding the DEC Consent Order are valid, and it is critical that all of these issues be addressed moving forward in this process," said Congressman Chris Gibson. "There has to be agreement among the key stakeholders to resolve the ongoing problems in the Lower Esopus. I will continue to support the County Executive in his efforts on behalf of the citizens of Ulster County to achieve fairness and accountability regarding this issue."

"DEP's watershed operations not only impact watershed communities but downstream communities as well," said Amanda LaValle, Coordinator of Ulster County's Department of the Environment. "Even though the Consent Order does validate Ulster County's long held position regarding the Lower Esopus, it allows the DEP to perpetuate its "divide and conquer" mentality by failing to connect it to the FAD, which is a serious oversight."

Ulster County officials plan to release an in depth technical review and critique of the Consent Order in the coming weeks. Additionally, the County will be very active in the Environmental Impact Statement process which is required under the Order as well as the draft F.A.D. public comment process.

NYS Attorney General & Comptroller Announce Arrest of Town Supervisor for Stealing Campaign Funds - Coordinated Action Of Federal-State Anti-Corruption Partnership In Albany

ALBANY - Attorney General Eric T. Schneiderman and Comptroller Thomas P. DiNapoli today announced the arrest of Melinda "Mindy" Wormuth, the Town of Halfmoon Supervisor, for stealing more than \$6,000 in campaign contributions from her campaign fund.

This case arises out of a cooperative federal-state partnership between the Attorney General, the State Comptroller, Federal Bureau of Investigation, and United States Attorney's Office for the Northern District of New York to combat public corruption. This initiative compliments ongoing efforts of the Joint Task Force on Public Integrity launched by Attorney General Schneiderman and Comptroller DiNapoli, which has already resulted in numerous arrests and felony convictions across the state.

"New Yorkers rightly expect that their campaign contributions will go to fund a candidate's run for elected office, not a candidate's lifestyle," said Attorney General Schneiderman. "This arrest demonstrates that federal and state authorities will work together to stamp out corruption at every level and bring those who would abuse the public trust to justice."

"This individual's sense of entitlement resulted in her putting her own best interests above her duty to her constituents," said State Comptroller DiNapoli. "These types of attempts by elected officials to abuse their position will not go unpunished. My office will continue to partner with state and federal authorities to jointly root out public corruption. I want to thank the Federal Bureau of Investigation, the United States Attorney's Office and Attorney General Schneiderman and his staff for their ongoing anti-corruption efforts."

Wormuth is charged with Grand Larceny in the Third Degree, Grand Larceny in the Fourth Degree, and Offering a False Instrument for Filing in the First Degree, all felonies, and with Petit Larceny, a misdemeanor. All four charges stem from her theft of more than \$6,000 from her campaign committee - Friends of Mindy Wormuth and the filing of a false financial disclosure report with the New York State Board of Elections. Wormuth was arraigned today in Waterford Town Court by Justice Nancy M. Sunukjian, entered a not guilty plea, and was released on her own recognizance. She faces a maximum of seven years in state prison if convicted of the highest charge filed against her.

According to the felony complaint, a joint investigation found that between July 2009 and July 2013, Wormuth cashed seven contribution checks, totaling \$6,250, intended for Friends of Mindy Wormuth. She then pocketed the proceeds without reporting the contributions to the committee's treasurer or on the Financial Disclosure Reports that were filed with the State Board of Elections.

The felony complaint relies, in part, on statements that Wormuth made to the FBI, including an admission that she cashed and spent certain checks made payable to her campaign. In one FBI interview, Wormuth attributed some of her actions to her bitterness at not receiving her political party's endorsement for reelection in November 2013.

Since 2007, Wormuth has served as the Supervisor of the Town of Halfmoon in Saratoga County. In that capacity, she heads the Halfmoon Town Board and serves as the town's representative on the Saratoga County Board of Supervisors.

The Attorney General expressed his appreciation to the Office of the New York State Comptroller for its assistance in this investigation.

The case is being handled by Assistant Attorney General Darren Miller, with the assistance of Investigator Mitch Paurowski, under the supervision of Deputy Bureau Chief of the Public Integrity Bureau Stacy Aronowitz, Bureau Chief William Schaeffer, Executive Deputy Attorney General for Criminal Justice Kelly Donovan, the Albany office of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, and the U.S. Attorney's Office for the Northern District of New York.

The charges against Melinda Wormuth are merely accusations, and she is presumed innocent until and unless proven guilty. Anyone with additional information on this matter or any other instances of public corruption is encouraged to contact the Attorney General's Office at (800) 996-4630.

### Congressman Gibson Hosts Rural Broadband Symposium in Sullivan Co

Congressman Chris Gibson (NY-19) hosted a symposium on expanding rural broadband access. The sumposium was held on Monday, October 21s at the Sullivan County Community College in Loch Sheldrake.

The event was directed toward individuals, community leaders, local businesses and government officials who were invited to discuss best practices and local, state, federal, and private programs to expand broadband. This is one in series of symposiums the Congressman has sponsored regarding rural broadband. Congressman Gibson answered questions regarding his work on broadband issues in NY-19 and Congress.

Congressman Announces Support Bipartisan Agreement

Washington, DC - Congressman Chris Gibson released the following statement after the announcement of a bipar-

tisan agreement:

"I will support the bipartisan agreement to fund government operations until January 15 and to extend the debt ceiling until February 7. This agreement also overturns a rule issued by the Obama Administration to ignore verification requirements in the Affordable Care Act. The provision included in today's agreement enforces the requirement to verify the income of those receiving subsidies in the healthcare exchange. This is a fundamental and commonsense provision that will combat potential fraud, waste, and abuse.

'As I've said all along, this government shutdown was completely unnecessary. The bipartisan CR that passed the House on September 30 was simple, fair, and reasonable and should have been enacted, setting the stage for longterm budget negotiations. Instead, it was tabled by Senate Majority Leader Harry Reid who, along with President Obama, said he 'wasn't going to negotiate.' That was the action that shutdown

the federal government.

"Since that point, I have continued to work every day with my bipartisan colleagues - particularly in 'No Labels' on agreements that have had support from both sides of the aisle, reopened the federal government, lifted the debt ceiling, and contained policies that were good for Upstate New York. Finding an agreement is not that difficult when we come to the table.

"In the end, all parties, including President Obama and Senate Majority Leader Reid, negotiated to reach this short-term deal. Of course they did our Constitutional design, especially in an era of divided government, requires we negotiate and work out differences. And, once negotiations started, an agreement was reached in a matter of several days - had these negotiations started earlier in September, instead of over 10 days after the start of the shutdown, we could have avoided this entire disappointing episode in our country's

"Working out differences in an era of divided government requires reasonable expectations, fair negotiation, and compromise - something both parties clearly need to do better. As a leader in 'No Labels', I'm working to bring this leadership to the House of Representatives and I'm encouraged that, among our 80 members, we have made progress building trust and the framework for good faith negotiations moving forward.

"We have much to do, and I'll be continuing to work for much needed tax reform, thoughtful spending plans that guide us back to a balanced budget, and effective health care reform that truly drives down costs while expanding access and retaining quality care. Finally, given that this agreement funds the government until January 15, we cannot wait until January 25 to begin the hard negotiations that await us.

"Some say that the divide in this country is too wide to bridge. I disagree. The divisions that I saw firsthand in Iraq, Kosovo and Haiti were wider and our servicemen and women helped those war-torn nations reach a better place. As Americans we have much more in common than we ever have apart. Let's take inspiration from our veterans and bring this country together and move forward."

"In addition, with this agreement reached, we can move on to work on other policies essential for Upstate New York. Notably, we are finally in formal conference with the Senate on completing the Farm Bill and we must finish and enact these necessary policies in the coming weeks for our communities and family farms.

Gibson Statement  $\mathbf{UC}$ from for Executive Mike Hein on Support of County Comptroller's Policy

"As someone who has always been committed to integrity-based government, I fully support the County Comptroller 's policy recommendation. A thoughtful and thorough review of the County Budget Proposal by certified professionals is an essential part of the budget process, as is a full and complete independent annual audit of County finances. An inherent conflict arises when any CPA firm is exposed to the potential for political pressure to shape their final budget analysis in return for being awarded a much larger and more lucrative annual audit contract. Even though no one is saying this has occurred, the Comptroller is correct in identifying that the current policy is in need of improvement.

This potential for abuse can be easily eliminated by instituting the Comptroller's policy recommendation. It is simply the right public policy to ensure that if a CPA firm is awarded one of these contracts, it is thereby automatically ineligible for the other. It is important that government not only avoid impropriety, but also the appearance of impropriety as well."

Comptroller addresses NY's 'uneven" Recovery

by NCPR News, in Canton, NY New York's top accountant says the state needs to re-double its efforts to regrow its economy across all regions.

Comptroller Thomas DiNapoli says that while New York has regained the number of jobs it lost during the recession, growth has been spotty.

Speaking in Syracuse, he said, "for most of our state, we're not back to where we were when we go back to '08 and '09 and that's obviously a concern. So job growth, yes, heading in the right direction. State-wide numbers, looking strong, but it's been an uneven distribution so we need to redouble our efforts."

Most new jobs have been in New York City. In contrast, Syracuse has only regained 40 percent of jobs lost.

Dinapoli said a number of things need to happen to even the recovery out. "Certainly, smarter and more efficient local budgeting. Fortunately at the state level we've made significant progress in that area. And certainly, from my point of view, we talk a great deal about the infrastructure in our state. We're an older state, we have many infrastructure needs.'

DiNapoli says the state's pension fund is also doing very well. It's at its highest level ever with around 160 billion invested. He says he's encouraging his office to invest more in New York companies.

(Kingston, NY) - Assemblymember Kevin A. Cahill (D-Ulster, Dutchess) reminds the community that October is Domestic Violence Awareness Month. He joins with others to promote education and awareness to end domestic violence.

NYS AG's Organized Crime Task Force Arrests Three Exploited And Preyed Upon Underage Girls

Attorney General Eric Schneiderman today announced the arrest of three members of a sex trafficking ring that operated in Syracuse, Watertown, Ithaca and elsewhere in New York State. Investigators allege that Eric Oliver, age 30, of Syracuse, was the leader of the ring, and was assisted by Tirra Pate, age 19, of Syracuse and Jessica Moro, age 19, of Cicero, New York. Together, these individuals preyed on women as young as 15 years old, recruiting them to work as prostitutes; and in certain instances intimidating them with the use of physical force to compel them to commit acts of prostitution; and, in other instances, providing cocaine, heroin and the drug MDMA (known as "molly") to the prostitutes in order for them to continue working.

"There are few crimes as heinous as forcing women into prostitution and transporting them against their will. Unfortunately, this case is emblematic of the horrors of human trafficking, which is an issue of international importance. We must redouble our efforts to protect people forced into a horrible life from which they feel they can't escape," said Attorney General Schneiderman. "I commend our Organized Crime Task Force, the State Police, and local law enforcement for their diligent work and critical support in bringing these criminals to justice."

New York State Police Superintendent Joseph A. D'Amico said, "This modern-day type of slavery will not be tolerated in New York State. With these arrests, a sex-trafficking ring has been dismantled, and victims, some as young as 15 years old, have been freed from a forced lifestyle. While human trafficking can be a difficult crime to detect, public awareness and the continued hard work of law enforcement and agencies like the New York Attorney General's Office and the Organized Crime Task Force will continue to bring these groups to justice." The sex trafficking ring was so brazen that Oliver made phone calls directing its operation from jail even though he was warned that the calls could be recorded. Oliver called Moro and Pate from the Watertown and Ithaca jails during the past year to direct them to transport prostitutes to various locations. He also phoned Moro from jail with instructions to provide drugs to a prostitute to get her to work.

Members of the sex trafficking ring were so brazen that, despite the fact that Eric Oliver was twice incarcerated over the past year - once in Watertown and once in Ithaca - and despite the fact that each time Eric Oliver made a telephone call from jail, he was warned that the call could be recorded, Oliver directed Moro and Pate from jail to transport prostitutes to various locations-and in the case of Moro, to provide drugs to a prostitute to get her to work.

The defendants are being arraigned today before the Honorable Anthony F. Aloi in Onondaga County Court. Oliver faces charges including two counts of Sex Trafficking, a Class B felony that can land him in prison for 10 to 25 years; Compelling Prostitution, another Class B felony; Promoting Prostitution in the 2nd and 3rd Degrees, Class C and D felonies;

Task Force Arrests Three felony, and Conspiracy in the 5th

Moro faces facing charges of Promoting Prostitution in the 2nd and 3rd Degrees, Class C and D felonies, and Conspiracy in the 5th Degree, a Class A Misdemeanor.

Pate faces facing charges of Sex Trafficking, which is a Class B felony; Promoting Prostitution in the 3rd Degree, a Class D felony, and Conspiracy in the 5th Degree, a Class A Misdemeanor.

The investigation was conducted by Senior Investigator Peter Burns of the New York State Police Special Investigations Unit, Investigator Michael Pastuf of the New York State Police, Troop D Bureau of Criminal Investigations and Detective Dawn Daly of the Syracuse Police Missing Persons Unit. The Jefferson County Sheriff's Office, Jefferson County District Attorney's Office, Tompkins County Sheriff's Office, Onondaga County Sheriff's Office and Onondaga County District Attorney's Office also provided valuable assis-

The case is being prosecuted by OCTF Assistant Deputy Attorney General and Senior Investigative Counsel James J. Mindell, under the supervision of OCTF Deputy Attorney General Peri Alvse Kadanoff and Executive Deputy Attorney General for Criminal Justice Kelly Donovan.






