

Recent NYS Forest Ranger Activities in the Area

Rangers respond to search and rescue incidents statewide. Working with other state agencies, local emergency response organizations and volunteer search and rescue groups, Forest Rangers locate and extract lost, injured or distressed people from the backcountry.

"Across New York, DEC's Forest Rangers' are on the front lines helping people safely enjoy the great outdoors," said DEC Commissioner Basil Seggos. "Their knowledge of first aid, land navigation and technical rescue techniques are critical to the success of their missions which take them from remote wilderness areas, with rugged mountainous peaks to white-water rivers, and throughout our vast forested areas statewide.

Recent missions carried out by DEC Forest Rangers included: Ulster County, Town of Denning. Sundown Wild Forest, Catskill Forest Preserve - There was an injury on State Land at approximately 1:00 PM on Saturday, August 20, DEC rangers were notified that a 21-year old man from the Bronx had injured and possibly dislocated his shoulder while visiting the Blue Hole in the Peekamoose Valley. Two rangers evaluated the man at the entrance to the Blue Hole and confirmed that it was a dislocated shoulder. They were able to adjust the shoulder and bandage it. The man refused additional medical treatment. The incident conclud-



The Mighty Oak Tree - L. Comando

This weekend when we were getting ready for the Labor Day family BBQ I noticed the ground in the picnic grove was covered with acorns. Despite the lingering warm weather, acorns are a sign that fall is just around the corner!



Oaks have spirally arranged leaves, with lobate margins in many species; some have serrated leaves or entire leaves with smooth margins. Many deciduous species are marcescent, meaning they do not drop dead leaves until spring. It is in spring, a single oak tree produces

both male flowers (in the form of catkins) and small female flowers. The fruit is a nut called an acorn, borne in a cup-like structure known as a cupule; each acorn contains one seed (rarely two or three) and takes 6-18

months to mature, depending on species.

There are approximately 500 species of oaks worldwide and 75 are native to America. All belong to the family Quercus, a name from two ancient Celtic words, quer/line and cuex/tree that truly fits this long lived tree as most oaks mature at age 100 and live an average of 200 years and older!

The oak is a common symbol of courage, strength and endurance. According to legend the Mighty Oak stands strong through all things. In Norse mythology, the oak was sacred to the thunder god, Thor.

Often referred to as the world tree the motif of the oak leaf or acorn is present in several religions and mythologies, particularly Indo-European religions, Siberian religions, and Native American religions. The world tree is represented as a colossal tree which supports the heavens, thereby connecting the heavens, the world, and, through its roots, the underworld. It may also be strongly connected to the motif

The oak tree has a long enduring history. But here is some recent news about the mighty oak tree. In a recent study during the spring 2007 and 2008, Stephanie Y. Searle, a Washington, D.C., environmental researcher and her colleagues planted seedlings in northeastern Central Park, near 105th Street; in two forest plots in the suburban Hudson Valley; and near the city's Ashokan Reservoir, in the Catskills. They cared for all the trees with fertilizer and weekly watering. Maximum daily temperatures around the city seedlings averaged more than 4 degrees F higher; minimum averages were more than 8 degrees higher. By August, the city seedlings had developed eight times more biomass than the country ones, mainly by putting out more leaves.

It seems even though city streets can be adverse to the environment, the oak tree grew far better in Central Park than its country cousins! According to Searle this was mainly due to chronically elevated city heat levels. The study, just published in the journal Tree Physiology, shows that common native red oak seedlings grow as much as eight times faster in New York's Central Park than in more rural, cooler settings in the Hudson Valley and Catskill Mountains.

Perhaps the urban forest will help improve the air quality and remove pollutants, however another report shows that if this is true, and the air quality does improve, air temperatures will also be reduced.

The oak tree has long been cherished for it's beauty, abundant shade, and top-quality lumber.

In 2004 the Oak Tree became the National Tree of the United States. Americans of all ages and from all walks of life helped to choose the oak tree as a national symbol through a vote hosted by The National Arbor Day Foundation (arborday.org). Passage of the bill was led by Congressman Bob Goodlatte of Virginia and Senator Ben Nelson of Nebraska.

Senator Nelson stated, "It is a fine choice to represent our nation's strength, as it grows from just an acorn into a powerful entity whose many branches continue to strengthen and reach skyward with every passing year."


Deodorize lunch boxes, footlockers, and car trunks



The Second Life of Nick Mason, (Putnam/Penguin Random House, \$26.00, 288 pages, ISBN 978-0-399-57432-0) by Steve Hamilton is the tour-de-force debut of a new series character that's receiving rave reviews from everyone who reads it

including me.

Nick Mason's stacking time in a maximum security federal penitentiary. He's done five of the twenty-five year sentence he got for a confrontation that left one of his friends and a Chicago police officer dead, and two other accomplices on the loose. But Nick's been a stand-up guy. All through the interrogation and trial, he's kept his mouth shut, never giving up the names of the others who got away, and for the last five years he's neither given, nor taken, any grief from the other convicts – he's just swallowed his pain, signed the divorce papers when they came, and done his

time, day-by-day-by-day. Then a guard passes him a message: Mr. Cole wants to see you. Darius Cole is a mastermind who's running a criminal empire from behind bars. He's serving "all night and a day"—life without parole in prison slang—two life terms in his case, he won't take "No" for an answer. Never has. Never will. He makes Nick an offer he can't refuse and within a few weeks Nick's been exonerated-the cop who caught him recanted his testimony-and he's out, living in luxury, driving a vintage muscle car and has plenty of money to spend. But there's a catch. Whenever his cell phone rings, Nick has to answer and do whatever the caller tells him to—no matter what it is—or those he holds dearest will suffer the consequences. As Nick is forced into more and more violent acts, he finds he's made a deal with the devil and trapped himself in a Faustian bargain that keeps him from ever regaining control of his life, or reconnecting with his ex-wife and the daughter he loves so much.

Nick Mason is a novel that opens at full-throttle on page one and never backs off. The pace is relentless, the action and the plot twists come at the reader from every angle. Read it, and see for yourself why the likes of Lee Child, Don Winslow, Michael Connelly and ol' Stephen King hisself wrote such enthusiastic blurbs on the dust jacket, and get in on the ground floor of what promises to be an awesome new series. I'm all in on this one. It turns the crime fiction genre inside out,

and damn – It's so, so good!

FCSD Receives a Sullivan Renaissance Healthy Community Grant (From Pg. 1)

Benjamin Cosor Elementary School teachers Ms. Leah Exner and Mr. Mark Spina wrote the grant proposal focused on the revitalization of a nature trail within the school premises directly behind the building. The project "will create multiple opportunities including physical, educational, social, emotional, and most important wellness." The wellness component is based on the FCSD Wellness Policy in accordance with the federal government Center for Disease Control and Prevention's Comprehensive School Based Physical Activity Program (CSPAP) that encourages walking and other physically active opportunities before, during and after school.

The \$2500 grant will cover the costs of materials and equipment for Phase I of the project-clearing the first 1/8th mile of the old trail, including design of a new entrance, design and building of a small bridge, information kiosks and safety barriers by the stream that meanders just off the trail. The completion date for this phase is October 15, 2016. As a grant requirement, FCSD will be obtaining matching funds in donations of labor and materials from various individuals, agencies and businesses in the area.

On account thus far are significant labor hours to be donated by Lucy and Lee Smassanow. He developed the original trail with BCES Environment Club several years ago before his retirement as a teacher. Lee's wife Lucy is a Master Gardener at Sullivan County BOCES. Also there is a possibility that BOCES students and staff will be designing and building a storage shed that will be a permanent structure outside the trail. Cornell Cooperative Extension will be providing benches and signage as well as ongoing consulting services and plants.

Sullivan Renaissance will be providing horticultural support and advice. Fallsburg High School Technology Teacher Ms. Pamela Garrett will have her students working on various design and build projects, such as small bridges as needed. Ms. Karen Larson will have her high school Life Skills Class working on design and construction of pallets to acknowledge in-kind and other contributions of participants on the nature trail. Ms. Megan Ollive will have her high school Environment Club involved in the project alongside Ms. Lori Lindridge and Ms. Dawn McCarthy with the BCES Ecology Club. The FCSD Wellness Committee will be supporting the entire project through liaison with member Ms. Sarah Ungerleider, who will be providing construction updates in the quarterly Comet Healthy Newsletter. To date, two local businesses Fallsburg Lumber and Home Depot will be donating railroad ties to help create safe boundaries for the trail.

The entire completed project is scheduled over a three to four year period and will encompass over two miles of trails-the East Pond Creek Aquatics Trail alongside the water and the BCES Terrestrial Trail at the west side of the school building. Ms. Exner and Mr. Spina will be busy writing additional requests for grant monies

from Sullivan Renaissance and others to support this ambitious endeavor.

One future source of funding may come from Project Learning Tree (PLT). As part of the educational component of the current grant, the two teachers are enrolling in PLT's online course, "Environmental Education for K-Eighth Grade." Ms. Exner is taking the Early Childhood 3-6 year-old part of the course, and Mr. Spina will do the other part so as to cover all the grades involved. PLT teaches students how to think, not what to think about the environment. It incorporates elements of Common Core Curriculum and STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics), a national initiative to promote collaboration between government, business and education in improving the ways America's students learn about these four fields of instruction. Successful completion of this course will certify Ms. Exner and Mr. Spina to share new teaching skills and materials (including a binder with 96 teaching modules) with their colleagues in reading, science, math, and other academic subject areas.

Enthusiasm for this Nature Trail project is running high at BCES and throughout the Fallsburg School District. In awarding the grant, Sullivan Renaissance's Assistant Director Denise Frangipane emphasized that the Awards Committee was impressed with the school's efforts and creativity, and they were especially inspired to hear about the collaboration with Cornell Cooperative Extension to create new policies for children to be outside.

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
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
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
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The Olive Jar - By Carol LaMonda Food Frenzy

Rondout Neversink Stream Program Update

Claryville Projects

In July, a stream buffer project to stabilize 480 feet of eroded stream bank was completed on the main stem of the Neversink River with root wads, bank grading, willow fascines and seeding. Upstream, accumulated debris at two bridges was removed, carrying out the first recommendations of the Claryville Local Flood Analysis conducted last summer. This was completed in August at two locations on the East Branch of the Neversink River. Together with Town partnerships, staff planning and DEP funding, landowner cooperation is key to achieving goals of greater resliliency with projects like these. The project site field tour set for August 31 will not be held next week, however a yearly review of all projects since 2010 is here and regular updates are posted on our Rondout Neversink Stream Program Facebook page.

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

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



Next Year Marks the 100-year Anniversary of the New York State Police- State Police to Debut New State Fair Exhibit in

2017 with Live Demonstrations and Interactive Features

Governor Andrew M. Cuomo today announced the kickoff of a year-long celebration to mark the 100th anniversary of the New York State Police, one of the largest and most respected law enforcement agencies in the nation. The State Police, which was founded in 1917, has unveiled a new website to mark next year's centennial and is planning numerous public events, including a new State Fair exhibit and open house events at each Troop headquarters.
"Throughout its history, the New York State Police has distinguished itself

as one of the elite law enforcement agencies in the nation," said Governor Cuomo. "Whether it's protecting our rural communities, keeping a watchful eye on our transportation hubs in New York City, or bringing dangerous criminals to justice, State Troopers put public service ahead of their own safety every day they are on the job. I encourage New Yorkers to get involved in the celebration and let the State Police know how much you appreciate their service and sacrifice.

The new State Police centennial website includes a comprehensive timeline of historical events, photographs, as well as details on the Centennial celebrations as they are scheduled. The site will also provide the public with the opportunity to participate in the events, as well as purchase commemorative items. The website can be found at centennial troopers ny gov.

As part of the centennial celebration, the State Police will debut a new State Fair Exhibit in 2017. The new exhibit will include a new interactive crime scene exhibit, a new rappelling tower, and a larger tank for the State Police Dive Team demonstrations. Climate-controlled dog kennels will also be con-


structed for the State Police canine teams.

The current State Police exhibit is housed next to the International Pavilion and features daily live demonstrations from the State Police Special Operations Units, including the very popular Canine Unit. This year, the State Police added a new cockpit-style interactive driving simulator to illustrate the dangers of distracted driving. These elements will continue at the new exhibit, along with a special display that will focus on the Division's 100-year history.

The New York State Police was founded on April 11, 1917, when the New York State Legislature approved a new law establishing the Department of State Police. The idea for a State Police force started in 1913, when a construction foreman named Sam Howell was murdered while delivering payroll to a jobsite in Westchester County. Before he died, Howell was able to identify his attackers as a group of men he recently released from the construction site, due to poor performance. Even with this information, the men were never apprehended. His employer, Miss Moyca Newell, and her friend, author Katherine Mayo, concerned by the state of rural law enforcement, started the movement to form a state police force to provide police protection in all of New York's

In June of 1917, the first Recruit Troopers started their training in Manlius, NY at Camp Newayo, named for Newell and Mayo. When training ended that fall, the original 232 Troopers were sent to their first assignment to patrol the New York State Fair, then set out on horseback to start policing the State's rural areas. There are currently more than 5,400 sworn and civilian members in 11 Troops across the State, including Troop NYC based in New York City.

The New York State Police is a full service police agency. In addition to the uniformed force, there are more than 1,000 members of the plainclothes Bureau of Criminal Investigation, which investigates felonies and major crimes, and is able to assist local law enforcement agencies that don't have the resources to undertake major criminal investigations. The State Police also support the state Office of Counter Terrorism and manage the New York State Intelligence Center, which brings together federal, state and local agencies to analyze and share information on terrorism and related crimes. Other specialized details include the Aviation Unit, Special Operations Response Team, Canine Unit, Dive Team, the Community Narcotics Enforcement feam, and the Bomb Disposal Unit.

Ulster County Executive Mike Hein Announces Ulster County's Strong Bond Rating has Been Affirmed - Fitch Ratings Affirmed The County's AA- Rating and Listed Its Outlook As Stable

Ulster County Executive Mike Hein is pleased to announce that Fitch Ratings has affirmed Ulster County's AA- bond rating. According to Fitch Ratings, the AA- bond rating is due to the County's "sound budget management," "superior budget flexibility," "sound reserve levels" and "low long term liabilities." Fitch Ratings also highlighted the County's choice to "...forego the opportunity to receive higher revenues...in favor of tax relief."

"We are pleased that Fitch Ratings has acknowledged the strong financial management of the Hein Administration to protect taxpayers, invest in infrastructure and reinvent government," Commissioner of Finance Burt Gulnick. "With that being said, we have turned our full attention to the 2017 budget that we expect to present additional challenges, especially with respect to healthcare costs."

A strong bond rating is beneficial to taxpayers by reducing the overall borrowing costs associated with standard bond issues. Fitch Ratings has assigned a bond rating of AA- to Ulster County's previous issued bonds which is an affirmation of the previous AA- rating. Fitch Ratings long-term credit ratings range from a top rating of 'AAA' to 'D' for debt issues that are actually in default and for issuers who did not meet their financial obligations. Currently, Standard & Poor's lists Ulster County's bond rating as AA, one of the highest ratings Standard & Poor's offers.

Police Agencies Across the State Hand Out 1,285 Tickets and 1,416 Warnings

Governor Andrew M. Cuomo today announced that police agencies across New York State issued 1,285 tickets and 1,416 warnings to drivers and pedestrians as the result of a pedestrian safety enforcement campaign. The enforcement period ran from June 20 through July 3 as part of a \$110 million comprehensive pedestrian safety initiative.

"This multi-pronged effort is setting new standards that will help make our roadways safer for motorists and pedestrians alike," Governor Cuomo said. "I commend the law enforcement agencies in these 26 counties for partnering with us in this important initiative, and for their continued vigilance and tireless work to protect all New Yorkers.

During the two-week campaign, which was funded by grants from the Governor's Traffic Safety Committee, local police agencies in 26 communities across Upstate New York and Long Island patrolled busy pedestrian corridors, handing out warning notices, tickets and informative tip cards to both

motorists and pedestrians found violating the law. Police issued 1,416 warnings to both pedestrians and motorists and issued 520 tickets for pedestrian safety related offenses and 765 tickets for other offenses. Police also provided information to pedestrians and motorists, with the Suffolk County Police Department handing out 3,000 pieces of pedestrian safety information and the Buffalo Police Department handing out 1,500 pieces during the two-week blitz.

The safety education campaign emphasizes the "See! Be Seen!" message for driver and pedestrian

awareness.

New York State Department of Transportation Commissioner Matthew J. Driscoll said, "We are committed to doing all we can to improve road safety especially for pedestrians, our most vulnerable users but we cannot do it alone. By leading the effort to enforce pedestrian safety laws, Governor Cuomo is helping transform our neighborhoods into more walkable communities and improving the quality of life for all New Yorkers.

The enforcement blitz is one part of a campaign to proactively address widespread safety issues through the Three E's - engineering, enforcement and education. The initiative, being implemented cooperatively by the State Department of Transportation, Governor's Traffic Safety Committee and State Department of

Health, includes the creation of an in-depth Pedestrian Safety Action Plan. Data analysis found that approximately 300 pedestrians are killed and 15,000 are injured by motor vehicles each year in New York State.

The multi-agency approach to improving pedestri-an safety calls for the following:

 DOT will work to minimize the potential for pedestrian crashes by implementing low-cost countermea-sures at 2,000 crosswalks without traffic signals and 2,400 signalized intersections.

o GTSC will provide education for law enforcement and organize annual pedestrian safety law enforcement

blitzes.

 DOH will develop public service announcements, engage local traffic safety boards, schools and others in public outreach, and provide training for safety organiza-

New York State Department of Motor Vehicles Executive Deputy Commissioner and Acting GTSC Chair Terri Egan said, "Pedestrians and motorists need to work together to mitigate risks and reduce crashes on New York's roadways, which is why this enforcement campaign launched by Governor Cuomo is so vital to our traffic safety efforts. Working together, we are raising awareness of the dangers to pedestrians while promoting sound engineering, education and enforcement practices. We urge all users of our roadways to share the road with courtesy and safety in mind."

New York State Commissioner of Health Dr. Howard Zucker said, "The Department of Health has always encouraged New Yorkers to walk more as a way to improve their health and prevent chronic disease. But if we want that habit to continue, it's absolutely essential that we protect our pedestrians from reckless behaviors on the roads. We want our roads to be safe for all users."

Schumer, Gillibrand and Gibson Announce over \$574,000 in Dept. of Agriculture Funding for the National Young Farmers Coalition's Beginning Farmer and Rancher Development Program - Funding creates national financial training opportunities for beginner farmers - USDA provides funding for 37 projects totaling \$17.8 million; NYFC one of two New York State recipients

Hudson Valley, N.Y. - U.S. Senators Charles E. Schumer and Kirsten Gillibrand and Congressman Chris Gibson today announced \$574,150 in federal funding for the National Young Farmers Coalition (NYFC). This fund-ing was allocated through the U.S. Department of Agriculture's (USDA) Beginning Farmer and Rancher Development Program (BFRDP). The National Young Farmers Coalition will use the funding to help beginner farmers and ranchers across the country make informed financial decisions when purchasing land so they can build strong, sustainable farm businesses.

Specifically, NYFC will provide technical assistance to navigate land access options including long-term leases, land trust partnerships, mission-driven farmland investor opportunities, and traditional farm loans through an interactive Land Affordability Calculator Tool. NYFC will also host a series of ten webinars and eight in-person trainings focusing on assessing and evaluating financial decisions.

"Now, more than ever, we must ensure that young and beginning farmers have the tools and knowledge they need to lay the groundwork for successful farms, said Senator Schumer. "This funding will help plant the seeds of a long, prosperous future for the state's agriculture industry. I'm proud to stand with New York's farmers, and I'm committed to securing the resources they need to succeed."

This federal funding will help new farmers across the nation learn the skills they need to start and grow successful farms," said Senator Gillibrand, the first New York Senator to serve on the Senate Agriculture Committee in nearly 40 years. "The National Young Farmers Coalition will provide financial advice and learning opportunities for aspiring farmers to begin or build their operations. The NYFC will help new farmers build strong financial foundations in the Hudson Valley, where NYFC is based, and throughout all of New York. I'll continue to fight for investments like this one to help make sure New York agriculture continues to thrive and be an economic anchor in our state."

"As a member of the House Agriculture Committee, I have been proud to partner with the National Young Farmers Coalition to protect the Beginning Farmer and Rancher Development Program and advocate for legislation that will bring more people into agriculture," said Congressman Gibson. "As the majority of our farmers near retirement, we will need at least 100,000 new farmers to take their place. I am delighted the NYFC has secured this grant to help us reach that goal, safeguarding the rural landscape and economy and providing Americans with the food and fiber we need to be a selfreliant nation.'

The National Young Farmers Coalition is thrilled to receive funding through the USDA's Beginning Farmer and Rancher Development Program. This funding will enable NYFC to deliver critically needed financial decision making tools and training to farmers to help them navigate the land access process. With more than two-thirds of privately-held U.S. farmland changing hands in the next two decades and farmers over 65 outnumbering farmers under 35 by six-to-one, now is the time to ensure that the next generation of farmers have the tools and resources they need to gain access to land and establish strong, sustainable farm businesses," said Lindsey

USDA will provide funding for 37 projects across 27 states and the District of Columbia totaling \$17.8 million. The National Young Farmers Coalition is one of two New York State recipients of funding for BFRDP.

The Beginning Farmer and Rancher Development Program was first established by the 2008 Farm Bill and continued in 2014. The program provides support to those who have farmed or ranched for less than ten years. BFRDP supports educational programs to assist beginner farmers and ranchers who have less than ten years of experience in the industry, including veterans and socially disadvantaged farmers. The program supports workshops, educational teams, training, and technical assistance throughout the United States.

Assemblymember Kevin Cahill and the Aftorney General Provide Information on Low Cost Banking

Pamphlets from the New York State Attorney General containing information on low cost banking methods are available at Assemblymember Kevin Cahill's District Office in Kingston. Lifeline bank accounts and prepaid debit cards are two ways to keep

track of money without going broke.

"New York State requires banks to offer affordable banking services," New York State Attorney General Eric T. Schneiderman said. "All banking institutions in the State, including commercial banks, savings banks and credit unions, are required to offer 'basic banking' accounts, commonly known as 'Lifeline Accounts' to any and all customers."

According to the Attorney General, lifeline bank accounts can be opened with a deposit of only \$25. A minimum balance of one cent keeps your account open. These accounts also have low maintenance charges as financial institutions cannot charge more than \$3 a month to maintain them.

The literature also explains the pros and cons of using prepaid debit cards. Having bad credit can often prevent a person from qualifying for charge cards. Prepaid debit cards may help control spending, but they do not build credit like a typical bank card. They may also have unexpected fees and do not come with protections if lost or stolen.

"It is always good to know what your options are when it comes to managing your finances," Assemblymember Cahill said. "It is even better to know what best fits your budget. Always read the fine print before making any decisions," he concluded.

UC's Ethical Opportunity Enhancing Ethics and Intensifying Integrity

"What's going on in New York State government lately is simultaneously heartbreaking, head -scratching and almost comic," stated Preet Bharara, the United States Attorney for the Southern District of New York. And according to a recent report released by Ulster County Comptroller Elliott Auerbach entitled ETHICALLY ULSTER, Ulster County has an opportunity to address this complacency by expanding their ethics law and updating the current county code.

The report made recommendations directed toward several policies including campaign contributions, gifting and advertising by elected officials. Some of the recommendations include:

o Capping the frequency of allowable gifts to an elected official or employee

 Regulating taxpayer funded advertisement of elected officials, and

Limiting vendor campaign contributions

The review considered existing language and provided comparisons to ethical procedures of other counties, as well as commended the oversight by the County's Board of Ethics.

Auerbach noted that Ulster County "should not use the Albany excuse when it comes to adopting meaningful ethics reform." He went on to say that the County has an "opportunity to be a trailblazer among municipalities, restore the public's faith in government and take a proactive approach to ethics reform."

The 375-acre fairgrounds have undergone the most significant transformation since the New York State Fair first opened its gates in 1890. Prior to the Governor's sweeping \$50 million plan to redesign the fair, the New York State Fairgrounds have remained essentially the same for over a century- no major redesign has been undertaken and investments have been for basic rehabilitation such as repairs of roofing systems, electrical systems, water and sewer mains and roadways. The lack of green areas, storm water infrastructure and rain collection systems caused severe flooding during rainstorms.

<u>Upgraded Facilities</u>

Today, significant construction improvements have been made on key components of the Governor's plan, including: the dramatic new Main Gate- the arches of which recall the carriage gate that greeted fairgoers in 1900, the larger, 15-acre Wade Shows Midway that will hold more rides than ever, and the brand new 315-site Empire RV Park that is equipped with underground water, sewer and electrical service.

Additional changes are visible throughout the grounds. Vendors have been moved out of the historic area and into the fair's new region for vending and activities on either side of the new boulevard known as Broadway. These improvements allow for more open spaces throughout the grounds with more seating and shade, and more misting stations to help cool fairgoers on hot days.

More plants and new trees have been planted and new energy-efficient LED lighting has been placed in the new areas of the fairgrounds. New uniform signage easily identifies the fair's many historic buildings. A fireworks display will take place after the September 1 concert.

Visitors in the Taste NY Market will have the chance to try free samples of food and beverages from all 76 participating New York vendors and to meet the

Date of Local Flood Analysis Session 3 Changed to September 1

A new flood planning process is underway this summer in the Sundown area of Denning. The goal of the Sundown Local Flood Analysis or "LFA" is to end with a map that describes flood levels at homes and businesses to be utilized for the benefit of the community. This community project is the first step in eligibility for the Town and its residents to access a number of programs offering technical assistance and watershed funding to mitigate hazards caused by flooding.

The creation of a flood model for the area can help us weigh the potential benefits (i.e. reducing the level of flood waters) of practical modifications to infrastructure against their costs in relation to specific impacts, such as

storms of different sizes.

The LFA process is happening right now in many Catskills towns that have been given the same resources to explore solutions - from simple actions like securing fuel tanks to prevent them from floating away and dispersing their contents in a flood - to more complex problems created by flooding on our roads, culverts, bridges, and homes that are situated in the floodplain.

Shaun McAdams and Wendell Buckman from the engineering firm of Barton and Loguidice are working on this project together with Rondout Neversink Stream Program and NYC DEP Stream Management staff. Two informational presentations were held so far. The next session date has changed: the meeting originally scheduled for August 25 will be held Thursday, September 1 at 6:00 p.m. Sundown Church Hall. Come learn more




