DEC Forest Ranger Search and Rescue Highlights

On September 5, 2016 at 11:25 a.m., DEC Rangers received a call from Ulster County 911 asking for help with the rescue of a 24 year-old man from Bronx, NY. The man was hiking the Giant's Ledge Panther Kill trail and became ill. Three DEC Rangers hiked to where the man was, while a fourth Ranger remained at the command post for communications. The Rangers determined that the hiker was dehydrated. He was given water and food and lead down the trail to a place where the Claryville Fire Dept. had a Utility Task Vehicle waiting to take him out of the woods. At approximately 2:40 p.m. he was evaluated by EMS personnel from the Town of Shandaken and released.

A Unique Little Flower - Bladder Campion

A uniquely designed little wildflower, the Bladder Campion or White Campion measures approximately 1 to 2 feet in height.

It is a perennial plant that can often be found along the sides of pathways, roadsides and at the edges of fields. It is a dainty-looking wild flower that blooms this time of the year in the Catskills.

The Bladder Campion (Silene vulgaris) produces distinctive flower-heads that are easily identifiable. Their inflated calyxes form the bladders from which the plant gets its com-

mon name.

The white or greenveined calyx is surrounded by white or light pink petals. The showy, sweet-scented flowers are visible on long stalks, either in open clusters at the tops of stems or singly



from the bases of upper leaves. Flowers are 1 inch wide with 5 white (or rarely pink) petals. Petals are deeply notched at the tips. Male and female flowers occur on separate plants, and are distinguished by the tube-like structure (calyx) from which the petals emerge: the female calyx is inflated, spherical, and green, with 20 lengthwise veins, while the male calyx is more slender, cylindrical, and purplish-green, with 10 lengthwise veins.

The lanceolate-shaped leaves are opposite (2 per node), 1 to 4 1/2 inches long, and taper to a point. Short hairs cover the upper and lower surfaces and margins. Leaf margins may be slightly wavy. Upper leaves attach directly to the stem but lower leaves

taper into long leaf stalks (petioles).

A vase-shaped capsule (seedpod) forms in the inflating female calyx. The calyx disintegrates after the capsule is fully developed. The mature capsule is smooth, shiny, and light brown, with an opening at the top surrounded by 10 teeth. Each capsule contains numerous small seeds (1/20 inch wide). The brownish-gray seeds are rounded to kidney-shaped, slightly rough and flattened on one side.

Reproduction is primarily by seeds although fragmented segments of the root crown can give rise to

new plants

Seedlings emerge in mid to late spring and again in late summer. Biennial and winter annual forms remain as a rosette through winter and produce a flowering stem the following season. Short-lived perennial forms remain as a rosette for more than one season before producing a flowering stem. Bladder Campion blooms and sets seeds from late May until September. Flowers open at night and release a sweet scent, attracting moths for pollination. Each capsule contains approximately 500 seeds and one plant may produce 50 capsules in one season. Seeds require light to germinate, so it is possible that burying seeds in soil will decrease the number that germinate.

The lanceolate-shaped leaves are opposite (2 per node), 1 to 4 1/2 inches long, that taper to a point. Short hairs cover the upper and lower surfaces and margins. Leaf margins may be slightly wavy. Upper leaves attach directly to the stem but lower leaves

taper into long leaf stalks (petioles).

Campion grows in grassy places and reaches 1-2 ft in height. It is a perennial plant that can often be found along the sides of pathways, roadsides and at the edges of fields. It is a dainty-looking wild flower when in full bloom.

Bladder Campion was introduced into North America from Europe in the early 1800's most likely in contaminated crop seeds. This species is now widespread in the northern half of the U.S. and southern Canada. It is commonly found in grain, legume and vegetable crops, as well as in other disturbed sites, including field edges, roadsides, shorelines, wood edges and waste areas. Bladder Campion grows best in full sun on rich, well-drained soils

Folklore and facts about Bladder Campion:

Members of the genus Silene were used in Elizabethan England to make a concoction with sugar and wine. This mixture was supposed to be soothing to the heart. The roots were used as worm medicine. Extracts from roots and leaves of white campion are extremely toxic to mosquito larvae.


Baking Bread?

For a shiny crust on homemade bread and rolls: just before they have finished baking, take them out, brush crusts with vinegar, return to oven to finish baking.


Cambodia Noir

Nestled between south Thailand and south Vietnam is the small Asian nation of Cambodia. Fronted on the Gulf of Thailand and bisected by the Mekong River, the capitol city is Phnom Penh. It's a transit point for the opium-producing region known as the Golden Triangle. As such, it's a lawless place where corruption is rampant, drugs are plentiful and the only thing that's cheaper – is life itself. The sex trade is open, vigorous and widespread; the army, the police and the politicians are all corrupt, constantly battling for more control and an ever-larger share of the illicit drug trade. Phnom Penh, Cambodia is where a critically-acclaimed, and world-class, but emotionally devastated, photo-journalist named Will Keller has gone to get wasted, stay wasted and waste away - trying to forget the day a single photograph won him a Pulitzer Prize nomination at the same time it broke his heart. Now he's drifting along in a self-medicated fog of alcohol and cheap, easy-to-find narcotic drugs, hoping to forget that one awful moment in Afghanistan. Hard-boiled crime fans are going to love Nick Seeley and howl in anticipation of his next awesome, dark, brooding, masterful and compelling work of fiction. He's gonna to be a monster. An absolute, book-selling monster!


NY Firefighting Team Returns from Battling 180,300 -acre Wildfire in Idaho -Crew of DEC Forest Rangers, Employees and Volunteers Spent Two Weeks Helping to Contain Boise National Forest Pioneer Wildfire

Governor Andrew M. Cuomo announced a 20-member New York firefighting crew that traveled to Idaho to assist in the containment of the Pioneer wildfire returned to New York this afternoon.

The crew, comprised of DEC Forest Rangers, employees and volunteers worked to contain the more than 180,300acre wildfire located in the Boise National Forest for the past two weeks.

"New Yorkers help their neighbors in their time of need and these brave men and women selflessly put their lives on the line and proudly upheld this state's great tradition," Governor Cuomo said. "I am proud of their courage and professionalism displayed by these great New Yorkers during this mission and I am thankful for their safe return."

Following their two-week stint, the crew was flown back to Manchester, New Hampshire and rested overnight before boarding buses for their return home this afternoon.


The New York crew included Forest Ranger Slade, Kevin Crew Boss Ulster from County. New York first

sent a firefighting crew to assist western states in fight-

ing large wildfires in 1979, and, usually, one or two crews have been sent to assist each year. In addition, to helping contain the western wildfires and minimize damage, these crews also gain valuable experience that can be utilized in fighting wildfires in New York.

All personnel travel and administrative costs for the crew is paid directly by the U.S. Forest Service or

reimbursed to the state.

DEP Completes Replacement of Gates at Ashokan Dividing Weir -\$14.1 million project restores full function to Dividing Weir at Ashokan Reservoir

to Dividing Weir at Ashokan Reservoir

The New York City Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) announced that it has restored full function to the Dividing Weir at Ashokan Reservoir by replacing the four massive cast iron gates that control the flow of water between the reservoir's two basins. The \$14.1 million project allows DEP to move water from the reservoir's west basin to east basin in a controlled manner. By drawing the west basin down, the new gates will also maximize retention time for water in that portion of the reservoir, which acts as a settling basin for sediment that is washed into the reservoir during heavy runoff events.

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"As portions of our Catskill Water Supply turn a century old, this project is one of many that New York City will be undertaking to keep our system in a state of good repair," DEP Acting Commissioner Vincent Sapienza said. "Of the 19 reservoirs in the water supply system, Ashokan was the only reservoir designed with two basins to allow for additional retention and settling time. By replacing these gates, DEP has ensured that this key infrastructure continues to operate as it was designed."

Replacement of the four gates began in 2012 and was completed in 2016. The cast iron sluice gates are each 5 feet wide and 15 feet tall, and each weighs approximately 18,500 pounds. Utilizing a crane, workers lowered each of the new gates through the roadway of the Dividing Weir Bridge and into a chamber situated below the water. Before they were replaced, three of the four original gates were stuck in a closed position, hampering the ability of water supply operators to move water from one basin to the other. The old gates, installed in the early 1900s as part of the original construction of Ashokan Reservoir and its facilities, had been operated by a single motor. The four new gates are operated by individual motors, along with hand-crank backups, to prevent a single point of failure. In addition to the gates, bar racks were installed on the western side of the Dividing Weir to prevent large debris from coming through the weir or slamming into the gates when they are closed.

When Ashokan Reservoir was planned during the first decade of the 1900s, engineers designed it with two basins to provide additional retention time that would allow fine sediments to settle out of the water. Pre-construction studies had shown that Ashokan would benefit from this design because its watershed included fine silts and clays that were left behind during the Ice Age when glaciers flowed through the eastern portion of the Catskill Mountains. These fine sediments can be picked up and carried by streams into the reservoir during heavy rain storms, melting snow, or a combination of both. The west basin of the reservoir was designed to capture this water and allow the sediment to settle to the bottom. Once the water clears, the Dividing Weir could move the water into the east basin, which is generally the source of water conveyed to New York City through the Catskill Aqueduct. (When water quality conditions are favorable, DEP often draws drinking water from the west basin or both basins simultaneously.) The full function of the Dividing Weir is key to this process, and the new gates were already helpful this past winter when DEP transferred water between basins ahead of some large rain events.

DEP manages New York City's water supply, providing more than one billion gallons of high quality water each day to more than 9.5 million New Yorkers. This includes more than 70 upstate communities and institutions in Ulster, Orange, Putnam and Westchester counties who consume an average of 110 million total gallons of drinking water daily from New York City's water supply system. This water comes from the Catskill, Delaware, and Croton watersheds that extend more than 125 miles from the City, and the system comprises 19 reservoirs, three controlled lakes, and numerous tunnels and aqueducts. DEP has nearly 6,000 employees, including almost 1,000 scientists, engineers, surveyors, watershed maintainers and other professionals in the upstate watershed. In addition to its \$70 million payroll and \$157 million in annual taxes paid in upstate counties, DEP has invested more than \$1.7 billion in watershed protection programs-including partnership organizations such as the Catskill Watershed Corporation and the Watershed Agricultural

Council-that support sustainable farming practices, environmentally sensitive economic development, and local economic opportunity. In addition, DEP has a robust capital program with over \$14 billion in investments planned over the next 10 years that will create up to 3,000 construction-related jobs per year. Fifth Annual Big Eddy Film Festival Advance Screening of "Bleed for This"
The Big Eddy Film Festival is honored to host an advance screening of

Narrowsburg resident Ben Younger's newest film BLEED FOR THIS on Saturday, September 17 at 9 pm at the Tusten Theatre in Narrowsburg, NY.

BLEED FOR THIS tells the true story of boxer Vinny Pazienza (Miles Teller), who won two world title fights only to be taken down in the prime of his career by a car accident that injured his spine. Trainer Kevin Rooney (Aaron Eckhart) works with Vinny to not only get him to walk again, but get him back in the ring.

Younger made his directorial debut in 2000 with the crime drama BOILER ROOM (2000) with Giovanni Ribisi and Ben Affleck, and followed up in 2005

with PRIME starring Meryl Streep and Uma Thurman.

Younger had taken a nearly decade-long hiatus from Hollywood when film producer Chad Verdi, who was a longtime friend of Vinny Pazienza's, approached him with the story.

"The script started as a writing assignment," explains Younger. "Once I was well into the writing process, I realized I had a personal connection to Vinny's story. I hadn't directed in awhile, and he hadn't fought. In the story, there was a

sense of despair and of wanting to 'come back.' Verdi introduced Younger to Martin Scorsese, who directed the classic box-ing film RAGING BULL (1980), and who used BOILER ROOM as reference

for Leonardo DiCaprio's character in WALL STREET. The story of an Italian American fighter hit all the right notes for Scorsese, and soon he signed onto the project as an executive producer.

BLEED FOR THIS was edited by Narrowsburg native Zac Stuart-Pontier, who met Younger when he was a local high school student. Pontier had plans to go to film school. Younger hired him for his first Hollywood job as a production assistant on PRIME.

"He went off and did amazing things since then," says Younger. Pontier won an Emmy last year for his work on HBO mini-series THE JINX: THE LIFE AND DEATHS OF ROBERT DURST.

"We used lots of archival footage in this film-not just in the end credits, but peppered throughout the film. So, Zac's work on THE JINX was key, Younger says.

On the subject of the cast of BLEED FOR THIS, Younger says, "I chose Miles Teller based on his performance in THE SPECTACULAR NOW, which a lot of people saw. WHIPLASH hadn't come out yet.

"I chose Aaron Eckhart because I felt he hadn't been used to his full poten-

tial," Younger says. "He's unrecognizable in this film. And he's being talked about for awards for this performance."

BLEED FOR THIS is screening at a very limited number of film festivals this fall, including Telluride (September 2 - 5), Toronto (September 8 - 18), Big Eddy (September 16 - 18), and London (October 5 -16) before its November theatrical release by Open Road (who distributed last year's Oscar-winner

SPOTLIGHT). This film is not yet rated, and is 116 minutes in length.





Protective Gear For Firefighters

U.S. Senators Charles E. Schumer and Kirsten Gillibrand today announced \$349,610 in federal funding for three fire departments in Hudson Valley. The funding was awarded through the Department of Homeland Security's Assistance to Firefighters Grant (AFG) Program. Specifically, the Roosevelt Fire District in Dutchess County will receive \$270,090 to purchase new Self Contained Breathing Apparatus (SCBA) air packs. The Loch Sheldrake Fire District in Sullivan County will receive \$42,377 to install a diesel exhaust system for the fire station. The Dutchess Junction Fire District in Dutchess County will receive \$37,143 to upgrade old equipment.

"With this funding, our Hudson Valley firefighters can focus on their critical, life-saving work knowing they have new and reliable protective equipment," said Senator Schumer. "Our first responders are our local heroes and our primary line of defense - it is crucial we provide them with the resources and up-todate tools they need to continue their important work

of saving lives.'

"These federal funds will allow our fire departments to purchase the up-to-date equipment they need to do their jobs effectively and stay safe while they are protecting our communities," said Senator Gillibrand. "We need to do everything we can to protect the men and women who risk their lives every day in the face of danger, and I will always fight in the Senate to make sure that our fire departments are funded and equipped."

"The board of Fire Commissioners and the members of the Loch Sheldrake Fire department want to thank Senator Chuck Schumer, Senator Kirsten Gillibrand, and Todd Felter (Service Rep for Congressman Chris Gibson) for their help in the award for a grant, to furnish and install a diesel exhaust system for our firehouse. New Law Expands Sunday Alcohol Sales at Restaurants and Bars as Part Comprehensive Blue Laws Overhaul and Broadens Retail Sales by Producers -Legislation Consolidates Licensing and Eases Regulatory Requirements for Wineries, Breweries,

Distilleries and Cideries Governor Andrew M. Cuomo signed legislation to modernize New York's archaic 80-year-old Alcoholic Beverage Control Law, which included provisions prohibiting the sale of alcoholic beverages at onpremises establishments before noon on Sunday. The comprehensive legislation allows alcohol to be sold earlier on Sundays, adds common sense provisions to broaden retail sales by producers, and reduces burdensome fees for wineries, distilleries, breweries and cideries statewide. Over the last five years, Governor Cuomo has taken sweeping action to simplify regulations for the beverage industry, resulting in an unprecedented, three-fold increase in licensed wineries, breweries, distilleries and cideries across the state. The Governor signed the legislation at the Genesee Brew House in Rochester.

"New York's burgeoning craft beverage industry has served as an economic generator for communities across the state and with this legislation, we are building on that progress," Governor Cuomo said. "By cutting red tape, breaking down artificial barriers and rolling back arcane and burdensome regulations, we are setting the stage for this industry's continued resurgence and future growth and I am proud to sign it into law."

Dear Friend.

With unanimous support today, the House adopted the Justice Against Sponsors of Terrorism Act (S. 2040), which permits terror victims and their families to sue foreign states that support acts of terror on our soil. As a New Yorker and a veteran, I was proud to co-sponsor the House version of this important legislation because it applies to any civil action that arises out of an injury to a person, property, or business on or after September 11, 2001. S. 2040 also amends the Anti-Terrorism Act to clarify that if someone aids and abets a foreign terrorist organization that injures Americans, that person can face civil suits brought by victims seeking to recover damages.

As we approach the 15th anniversary of 9/11 this weekend, we are sending a message to the world that we will do everything in our power to secure justice for the victims of terror. For too long, a loophole in the law permitted foreign governments to escape liability for supporting terror attacks within the United States. Our bill closes that loophole, permitting the families of victims of the 9/11 attacks to proceed with a lawsuit against Saudi Arabia for its alleged involvement in those atrocities. The Senate has already passed this bipartisan legislation, and I

call on the President to sign it into law.

Our actions in Congress this week are also a reminder that we have more work to do as a nation if we are to reestablish peace through strength, deter our enemies, assure our allies, empower our diplo-

mats, and protect the American people.

We will always remember those who died on 9/11. We pray for them, and we ask that the peace and love of the Lord be with their families. This weekend we also pause to give thanks for the scores of first responders and servicemen and women who went into action on 9/11 and the days that followed. Our fire, rescue, police, and Armed Services personnel have made extraordinary sacrifices to keep us safe, and I am pleased communities across New York will come together in the days ahead to honor these brave Americans.

On Sunday, September 11, I will participate in the Patriot Day Ceremony at the Melvin Roads American Legion Post in East Greenbush, the New Paltz Community 9/11 Memorial Dedication Ceremony, and a similar event at Volunteer Park in Kinderhook. Thank you to the many veterans, volunteers, and community members who will share their time and talents this weekend to help us recognize this solemn anniversary

State Department of Health Issues New Regulations to Mandate Lead Testing in New York Schools by October 31; New York First State in the Nation to Complete Lead Testing in All School Districts by End of 2016

Governor Andrew M. Cuomo today signed landmark legislation (S.8158/A.10740) mandating that schools across the state test drinking water for lead contamination. Lead is a toxic material that is extremely harmful to young children and can result in lowered IQ, behavioral problems and brain damage. The state Department of Health also issued emergency regulations pursuant to the new legislation, requiring that school districts test their water for lead contamination by Oct. 31, 2016 and report results to parents, the state Department of Health and local government officials. These new regulations will reduce the risk for exposure to this dangerous substance and ensure all New York's students have access to clean, drinkable water.

"These rigorous new protections for New York's children include the foughest lead contamination testing standards in the nation, and provide clear guidance to schools on when and how they should test their water," Governor Cuomo said. "As children begin another school year, I'm proud to sign this legislation, which marks a major step forward in protecting the public health and ensuring the future growth and success of

students across the state.
