The Giant Pumpkin Party and Children's Parade Celebrates its 32nd year



DAYS OF YORE.... Today's History

September 12, 1947 - On Thursday evening Edgar Allison of Grahamsville was hit head on by Mr. George Larsen of Olive Bridge. Mr. Allison and his passengers were taken to Veterans' Hospital and later discharged. His car was damaged beyond repair.

Grahamsville school is almost bursting at the seams with a 15% increase in attendance. There are 180 children attending the district - 24 parochial students attending school in Liberty and 71 children attending high school in Ellenville, Liberty and elsewhere.

The children from Curry are attending the

Grahamsville school.

The September Library Trustee meeting was held. The treasurer reported a balance of \$210.25. Of this, \$100 will be spent for books. Mrs. Jocelyn reported that 80 new books have been ordered. The board regrets the resignation of Mrs. William Krum as librarian and unani-mously elected Mrs. Ted Shaut, who has been acting librarian for the past month, to replace her. Total members of the library are now 123.

The employees of the BWS had a clambake in Montela on Saturday. Over 300 were in attendance.

September 25, 1957 - The fiftieth wedding anniversary of Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Countryman was made very happy by the large number of friends who called upon them on Sunday afternoon and evening. There were said to be approximately sixty or more people that called. Elaborate refreshments were served in the afternoon and a buffet dinner in the evening.

Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Murray are the proud parents of a daughter, Geralyn Jean, born at Hamilton Avenue Hospital, Monticello, on September 22nd. Mr. Murray is on the TVCS faculty. Little Miss Murray weighed seven pounds, seven ounces.

Miss Irma DuBois is now at Binghamton City Hospital where she is training to become a nurse. Her sister, Virginia, spent several days of her vacation with her parents. She is employed in the Mid-Hudson State Hospital in Poughkeepsie and lives in Rhinebeck.

The Grahamsville Home Demonstration Unit won first place at the Fair for its exhibit, "Cheese as You Like It". Their chairman is Mrs. Richard Strangeway.

Sullivan County Community Chorus Winter Chorus Rehearsals Begin

The Sullivan County Community Chorus will resume weekly Thursday evening rehearsals on September 7th from 6:30 to 8:30 in the Orchestra Room of the Liberty Middle School, 145 Buckley Street, Liberty. The chorus, under the direction of Kevin Giroux, with accompanist Keira Weyant, will perform its 41st Annual Winter Concert on Sunday, December 10th at 2:30 p.m. in the Immaculate Conception Church, Woodbourne.

Conductor Giroux's theme for the winter concert is "Choral Snowflakes." Just as no two snowflakes are alike, no two singers, or compositions are the same. Snowflakes gathered together can produce some mighty storms, or mighty performances. The concert selections include: energetic and rousing African "Noels," the powerful 20th century classic "Ave Maria," by Franz Biebl, arrangements of seasonal classics by John Rutter and André Thomas, as well as the majestic baroque glory of Bach's "Magnificat in D," accompanied by Chamber Orchestra. The performance will also feature guest performers, and the Sullivan Chamber Singers, selected by audition from the chorus.

The Chorus welcomes all interested singers to attend their rehearsals. An ability to match pitch is essential and it is helpful if singers are also able to read music. Prospective new members are encouraged to attend the first three rehearsals (Sept. 7, 14 and 19) and have dues waived for those rehearsals with no obligation. Rehearsals are open to all voice parts. Each prospective new member is required to meet with Conductor Giroux on Sept. 7th beginning at 5:30 p.m. for a short series of vocal warm-ups designed to determine vocal range for placement in the appropriate section of the chorus, as well as to ensure an ability to match pitch.

Performances of the Sullivan County Community Chorus are made possible in part with funds from the Sullivan County Decentralization Program, a re-grant program of the New York State Council on the Arts, and a Rural Arts and Heritage grant, both administered by the Delaware Valley Arts Alliance.



Confusion about Lucky Little Crickets!

A cricket is a cricket, right? Well, yes, but they are

There are three types of crickets in the Catskills. The one you don't want in your house is the Camel Cricket, a/k/a called spider cricket. During the summer and fall, spider crickets will seek a dark and damp



Camel Cricket


place like your basement. They congregate in large numbers and are voracious eaters feasting on fungus,

fabric, carpets, wood, cardboard, dust, plants and even each other.

House Crickets are common outdoors, especially around garbage dumps. They usually grow to about one inch in size and are a light yellow brown color.

Ironically the crickets that have a reputation of bringing good luck when they chirp on the hearth of your fireplace this time of year is not a House Cricket; it is a Field Cricket!

Field Crickets grow up to an inch long and have large hind legs and two cerci, or appendages coming out of the back of their abdomens.

Female Field Crickets have an ovipositor, a tubular organ coming from the abdomen between the cerci that is used to deposit eggs. After mating, female Field Crickets look for damp soil to lay eggs. They inject their ovipositors, like a needle, deep into the soil, laying about 50 eggs at a time. One female can lay over 400 eggs in her short life. Young crickets are called nymphs that eat a lot and grow quickly. They will molt, shedding their outer skin, eight or more times as they grow.

Field Crickets (of the family Gryllidae) grow up to an inch long and have large hind legs and two cerci, or appendages coming out of the back of their abdomens. They are shiny black in color and have short rounded wings. They eat plant material, especially seeds, small fruits, and living and dead insects.

Adult male crickets "sing and dance" to attract females. The "song" is made by rubbing the front wings together. Females hear the song through tympanum (eardrums) on their front legs. Once a female approaches a male, he will move back and forth, performing a courtship "dance.

Field Crickets do not survive over the winter. Adult crickets and nymphs will die when cold weather arrives. The eggs, however, overwinter and will survive and hatch the following spring.

As summer ends and the temperature begins to fall, the rate of chemical reactions inside the crickets' bodies begin to slow down. Chirping will also slow down. The relationship between the temperature and the rate of chirping is known as Dolbear's Law. According to this law, counting the number of chirps produced in 14 seconds and adding 40 will approximately equal the temperature in degrees Fahrenheit.

Once the temperature drops to below 55 degrees Fahrenheit, the crickets will soon stop chirping, a sign that winter is on its way.

Perhaps the real luck of a cricket on your hearth is that you have a warm home! Today, with high fuel prices as such, here's wishing we all have a Field Cricket on the hearth of our fireplace bringing us good luck in the form of a lower fuel bill!

Clean Out Your Sink Drain


If your kitchen sink drains slow, you, try this. To clear clogs in sink or tub drains, use a funnel to pour in 1/2 cup baking soda followed by 1 cup vinegar. When the foaming subsides, flush with hot tap water. Wait five minutes, and then flush again with cold water. Besides clearing blockages, this technique also washes away odor-causing bacteria.

Steve Rajeff - born and raised in San Francisco, he has been involved with numerous fly casting schools since the 1970's and has conducted fly casting demonstrations around the world. He is a life member of the Golden Gate Angling and Casting Club, and a Hall of Fame member of the American Casting Association (ACA). He has been a dominate presence in competitive casting for over four decades, winning the ACA All Round Championship 42 times and 14 World All-Around Championships. He lives in Washington State.

Theodore "Ted" Rogowski - has a noted career as an environmental attorney, cinematographer, fly tyer and fly fisherman. A long-time advocate for clean water, he helped draft the Clean Water Act while at the EPA. He was a "was a co founder of the Theodore Gordon Flyfishers", and is a member of many fishing organizations. He was behind the camera for classic footage for "The American Sportsman" that popularized the sport. He is married to Joan Wulff and lives in Lew Beach.



October is BQA Month

PINE BUSH, NY- October is Beef Quality Assurance (BQA) Month! According to www.bqa.org, Beef Quality Assurance is a nationally coordinated, state implemented program that provides systematic information to US beef producers and beef consumers of how common sense husbandry techniques can be coupled with accepted scientific knowledge to raise cattle under optimum management and environmental conditions. BQA guidelines are designed to make certain all beef consumers can take pride in what they purchase - and can trust and have confidence in the entire beef industry.

Farmers are invited to attend a free Beef Quality Assurance workshop on Monday, October 2, 2017 from 11:00 am to 3:00 pm. This regional program, offered in partnership with Cornell Cooperative Extension Sullivan, Orange, and Ulster Counties, will be held at Watswyck Farm on 60 Sinsbaugh Road in Pine Bush. Lunch is pro-

vided, sponsored by New York Beef Council.

Dr. Michael Baker, Extension beef specialist of Cornell University, presents the many benefits of BQA including learning best management practices that ensure production of a safe, wholesome food product. Many of these practices can improve the productivity and profitability of a beef cattle farm, regardless of the size or intended markets for cattle. The goal of this program is to maximize consumer confidence and acceptance of beef by focusing the producer's attention to daily production practices that influence the safety, wholesomeness, and quality of beef and beef products. Many beef cattle buyers, feeders, packers, and retail outlets are requiring that the beef

they purchase be produced by BQA certified cattle producers. The workshops are appropriate for those who have never attended a Beef Quality Assurance training before as well as for those who need renewal credits.

BQA Objectives Set production standards in your operation that can be met or exceeded.

2. Establish systems for data retention and record keeping, which will allow validation of management activities and fulfill program goals.

Provide hands-on training and education for participants to meet or exceed the guidelines of the BQA program and to realize the benefits of such programs.

 Provide technical assistance through: state cattlemen's associations, BQA certified veterinarians, and BQA certified university extension staff. These individuals will be available for on-site assistance if desired.



The Masters Fly Collection

Tom Zacoi donates flies to Catskill Fly Fishing Center

LIVINGSTON MANOR - The Catskill Fly Fishing Center and Museum (CFFCM) is the recipient of a major collection of flies, tied by the world's pre-

eminent fly tyers, past and present.

"The Masters Fly Collection" has been a three-decade-plus project curated by Tom Zacoi of Venetia, PA. It includes over 2000 flies in nine museumquality fly cases. Three hold 48 vials of preserved entomological specimens (representing the major hatches throughout North America) with flies tied for each life cycle stage of the insect's development. Three more boxes house realistic and salmon flies, saltwater and bass bugs, and caddis flies.

The collection was tied by 575 people representing 32 countries, including: Argentina, Australia, Austria, Belgium, Bulgaria, Canada, Chile, Denmark, Fiji, Finland, France, Germany, Greece, Holland, Iceland, Ireland, Italy, Japan, Lithuania, New Zealand, Norway, Pakistan, Poland, Scotland, Slovenia, Spain, Sweden, Ukraine, United Kingdom, United States and Wales.

Eleven-year-old Anton Rist from Claverack, NY is the youngest boy tyer; 13-year-old Amalie Nielsen of Silkeborg, Denmark is the youngest girl. The

eldest tyer is 97-year-old George Grant from Butte, Montana.

"There are talented fly tyers throughout the world - innovative men and women who have practiced the craft, honed their skill and are able to transform a utilitarian object into a work of art," said Zacoi. "They are gracious people who willingly share their knowledge and generously donated one of their beautiful creations to this collection.

CFFCM received half the collection last fall and displayed it at an event in December. The remaining flies are scheduled to be delivered in September. The collection is housed in the

museum's archive with a major exhibit scheduled for 2018.

In the past, the collection has been displayed at the Federation of Fly Fishers Conclave, regional Trout Unlimited meetings, the yearly Masters School of Fly Fishing, Penn State's Great Insect Fair, local and regional Boy Scout and Girl Scout Jamborees, Trout in the Classroom and many other events.

"It is no secret there are fly fishers worldwide who have amassed extensive collections of beautifully tied and handsomely framed flies. Many hang where they can be privately viewed. Sadly, my friends, the day will come for all of us when our collection will need to be dispersed. My hope is you will consider bequeathing your collection or, for that matter, any historically significant fly fishing tackle to the Catskill Fly Fishing Museum or any accredited organization where your donation can be an inspiration and enjoyed by those of prominence as



"A 2015 survey by FEMA, found that nearly 60 percent of American adults have not practiced what to do in a disaster by participating in a disaster drill or preparedness exercise at work, school, or home. National Preparedness Month provides us with a great reminder to be proactive and be prepared because a disaster or emergency could have life threatening implications. One of the key messages of National Preparedness Month is to be prepared in the event an emergency in order to be self-reliant for three days without utilities and electricity, water service, access to a super-

market or local services, or maybe even without response from police, fire or rescue. Preparing can start with four important steps:

 Be informed about emergencies that could happen in your community, and identify sources of information in your community that will be helpful before, during and after an emergency;

Make a plan for what to do in an emergency. Develop a written, family (and business/organization) disaster plan and review it with everyone, so that everyone knows what to do, where to go and how to communicate in the event of a serious emergency;

Build an emergency supply kit; and

Get involved.

A.G. Schneiderman Issues Consumer Alert on Charitable Giving in Response to Hurricane Harvey

NEW YORK - Attorney General Eric T. Schneiderman today urged New Yorkers to support the charitable organizations assisting the victims of Hurricane Harvey, while also offering tips to ensure that their donations reach their intended recipients.

"The damage and destruction caused by Hurricane Harvey throughout Texas and the Gulf Coast is simply unfathomable. There will be tens of thousands of victims who will lose their homes because of this storm, and I encourage all New Yorkers to assist in the ongoing relief efforts," said Attorney General Schneiderman. "Unfortunately, there are always some who attempt to take advantage of a tragedy to line their own pockets at the expense of those who are truly in need. New Yorkers who give to charitable organizations supporting the victims of this storm can review our tips to ensure their donation will be put to good use.'

The Attorney General offers the following tips for

those contributing to the relief effort:

Take Time To Research The Organization. Make sure you are familiar with the organization, its mission, and its effectiveness before giving. Always ask for information in writing - be wary if an organization will not provide information about charitable programs and finances upon request. Any legitimate organization will be happy to send you information. Check the Attorney General's website - www.charitiesnys.com - to ensure that it is registered, and to learn more about its mission and finances.

Know Where Your Money Will Go. Find out from the charity what it will do with your money. Review the charity's financial reports for information about how it spends donations. If you have been contacted by a telemarketer, review Pennies for Charity, the New York Attorney General's annual report of telemarketing campaigns in New York, to see how much is spent on fundraising costs and how much has been kept by the charity. Ask specifically how the charity plans to use your donation, including the services and organizations your donation will support. Ask if the charity already has worked in the local area or has relationships with any local relief organizations. Also, ask what the charity plans to do with any excess donations. Avoid charities that make emotional appeals but are vague in answering your questions. Be wary if an organization will not provide written information about charitable programs and finances upon request. Any legitimate organization will be glad to send you this information.

Give to Established Charities. Donate to organizations you are familiar with, or have an experience assisting in disaster relief. Get information about charities that pop up solely in response to the hurri-

cane or those with unfamiliar names.

Be Cautious With Telephone Solicitations. Telephone calls asking for donations to charity are often made by a professional fundraiser who is required to register with the Charities Bureau. Remember - you can always hang up. If you choose not to end the call, ask whether the telemarketer is registered and how much of your donation will go to charity and how much the telemarketer is being paid. Many telemarketers receive most of the money they raise. Giving directly to a charity avoids those costs.

Check Before You Text A Contribution. Check the charity's website or call the charity to confirm it has authorized contributions to be made via text message. One thing to keep in mind is that donations via text messaging may not reach the charity until after your phone bill is paid. It may be faster to contribute directly to the charity.

Before Donating to an Online Giving Site. Make sure your contribution to campaigns set up by individuals on sites such as GoFundMe or CrowdRise

will go to charity and not to the person raising the funds. Don't contribute unless you know that person. Don't Respond to Unsolicited Spam Emails. These formats are usually not associated with legitimate charities. Check the Department of Homeland Security's tips, such as Avoiding Social Engineering and Phishing Attacks that are posted at http://www.uscert.gov/ncas/tips/ST04-014.

Never Give Cash. Give your contribution by credit card or a check made payable to the charity.

Be Careful About Personal Information. Avoid giving credit card or personal information over the phone or by text message. In all cases, make sure you are familiar with the organization and check to see that the fundraising campaign is legitimate before donating. Report Suspicious Organizations. If you believe an organization is misrepresenting its work, or that a scam is taking place, please contact the Attorney Charities General's Bureau charities.complaints@ag.ny.gov or 212-416-8401. Reduced Gas Supply Impacts NY; A.G. Urges NY's to Report Potential Consumer Exploitation To His Office

Schneiderman: We'll Hold Accountable Those Who Capitalize On The Storm At The Expense Of Hardworking New Yorkers

NEW YORK-Attorney General Eric T. Schneiderman today issued a consumer alert warning both consumers and businesses about gasoline price gouging following Hurricane Harvey and the subsequent reduction in supply that has impacted New York

"Experience has shown that some gas station owners use severe storms as an opportunity to exploit consumers," said Attorney General Schneiderman. "Hurricane Harvey has led to gas price spikes across the country, including in New York - but we'll hold accountable those who seek to capitalize on the storm at the expense of hardworking New York families.

On the Thursday following Hurricane Harvey, gasoline prices across the country rose to a twoyear high. Similarly, the statewide average price of gasoline has risen 23 cents per gallon since Harvey made landfall in Texas over a week ago. The shutdown of major refineries and the closure of the Colonial Pipeline used to carry gas from Texas to the Northeast are respectively having a significant effect on nationwide and local prices.

In the aftermath of the hurricane, New Yorkers have seen the following fluctuation in gas prices.

The General Business Law prohibits excessive increases in prices of essential goods and services like gasoline resulting from natural disasters like Hurricane Harvey that significantly disrupt the market. Furthermore, New York State's Price Gouging Law (General Business Law § 396-r) prohibits merchants from taking unfair advantage of consumers by selling goods or services for an "unconscionably excessive price" during an "abnormal disruption of the market," as represented by a gross disparity between the price of the product immediately prior to and after such an occurrence. The price gouging law covers New York State vendors, retailers and suppliers.

While some increases in the price of gas are to be expected following a natural disaster, the Office of the Attorney General will not tolerate excessive price increases for consumers farthest far exceeds the increase in cost to companies. Since taking office, the Attorney General has fought to protect consumers from similar cases of price gouging and has taken action against predatory companies. As a result of the Attorney General's investigation into high gas prices during Hurricane Sandy, Attorney General Schneiderman secured over \$300,000 in penalties and costs from more than 40 gas stations in New York City, Long Island, and the Hudson Valley that gouged their customers.


